

The past year has been an interesting and busy one for folk dancers. All the Saturday monthly classes, with such diverse styles and teachers - brilliant. So instructive and great fun. The many regional day courses and the special weekend courses, all so much a feature and part of the SIFD structure. A popular event, and a must for all folk dancers, is the Eastbourne International Folk Dance Festival. An exciting event. Then there is the Llangollen, Billingham and Sidmouth Festivals, an opportunity to see and hear groups and musicians from overseas. A real experience.

For those who are interested and enjoy Spanish dance, there have been some really excellent companies visiting these shores. Other visitors have been the Russian Cossacks who did a marathon tour of the country, and also Russian Spectacular, a blend of music and dance, the dancers being from Belorus. To celebrate 125 years of Diplomatic Relations between Great Britain and Bulgaria, there was the Bulgarian Spectacular at the Royal Albert Hall, but for one night only. One must not forget all the festivals and courses overseas.

Then there are the very popular SIFD Sunday dances at Cecil Sharp House, all the work carried out by Balkanplus, and the SIFD groups appearing at Victoria Embankment in the summer. To brighten up the autumn October days, on to the scene came "Dance Around The World", two days of non-stop performing groups and workshops. This, the third year, and it gets better. Also this year, Magyar Magic, Hungary in Focus, a year-long series of cultural events celebrating Hungary's recent membership of the European Union. Did you catch any of them?

To wind up the year, there were Christmas folk parties galore. Anyone in the Northampton region may have caught the ISTD National Dance Awards, all very theatrical but extremely popular. Life as a folk dancer is never dull; there is never enough time (or money!) to see and do everything, but what opportunities the SIFD offers. So many dedicated teachers, so many organisers, so many groups, so much knowledge. Aren't we all the lucky ones.

Have fun in 2005....can't wait.

C.C.P.R.

Central Council for Physical Recreation

The CCPR was founded in 1935 by a PE teacher who was concerned by the poverty caused by the Depression and the consequent problems for the young and others in the poorest areas so she conceived the idea that leaders of sports should co-operate and find opportunities for them to live an active life. The CCPR soon grew and the value of movement and dance was soon appreciated and added to its aims and it was understood that 'sport' and 'sports clubs' included those organizations involved in dance.

Generally, the CCPR is a democratic body run by members for members and often finds itself in opposition to the Government, an example being opposition to some of the provisions of the recent Licensing Bill. It now represents over 270 sports bodies including some 25-30 groups in the Movement and Dance Division. Very roughly, these can be divided into three or perhaps four types. One is the ballroom dance bodies which are well organized and deal with teaching standards, awards etc. and are involved in DanceSport. Next is the largest group in terms of individual members, the movement section which covers Keep Fit, Medau, Margaret Morris, Laban and others. Although these have some male members most are women. The third covers ourselves, the EFDSS, the Scottish Country Dance Society and the Dolmetsch Historical Dance Society. All these feature partner dances so that membership includes both sexes. There are a number of bodies which do not fit into any category, such as Yoga, Cheerleaders and so on. All these have different aspirations but there is a real attempt to find common ground so we can all go forward.

For us there a number of advantages. At one time, the CCPR arranged dance 'fairs' under its own direction, giving the NGBs space to show their specialities through workshops and to display their publicity and to sell their products. Now, financial constrictions make this impossible so that it has to be done in co-operation with commercial bodies, but the CCPR usually has a stand where information on dance groups can be obtained and their publicity shown in addition to the M & D's own well-designed leaflet which gives our details. Some of John Douglas' material was available at the recent show at Wembley. A number of the dance NGBs at the last meeting felt the organization at this event left something to be desired and the CCPR passed their comments on to the organizers. The earlier one at Bexhill, it was agreed, was a great success and again our material was displayed but unfortunately we had no workshops.

Another CCPR event in which the Society is closely involved is the Dance Fest at the Royal Albert Hall. Jill Bransby (General European), Frances Horrocks (twice - Romanian and Bukgarian) in past years, and now Helen Clancy will be staging our 2005 item. Potentially useful to us would be the guidance that can be obtained from the CCPR's financial and legal advisors, made possible by the Council's status and access to Ministers. On occasions, their advice has been asked and one example, following it, as members will have seen, the "S.I." (Society Insured) has been added to our events diary.

The SIFD has been affiliated to the CCPR since the early '50s and our relation—ship has always been good and I have represented us at the Division meetings for some time. Because of their wide coverage, not everything the CCPR does is of interest to us. The M & D officers are highly regarded in the CCPR as a whole. Both Hilary Weedon, recently retired Chairman, and Margaret Peggie, who produced many of the Royal Albert Hall shows and now heads the British Sports Trust, are now Vice—Presidents of the Council.
