NOTES FROM JANUARY'S COMMITTEE MEETING

The Committee met in January and were pleased to welcome Janet Woolbar as the new Chairman, Bob Robinson as a new Committee member, and Maggie Kaye who came as a representative from the Midlands.

The main items discussed were:-

Retirement of Membership Secretary

After eighteen years, Alan Morton has decided the time has come to step down as Membership Secretary. We shall be very sorry to lose him as Alan has done a magnificent job all these years. He has always been extremely efficient and dependable, seldom missing a Committee meeting, and membership lists and labels appeared like clockwork. We are all very grateful to him for this enormous amount of behind-the-scenes work. He will, of course, be a hard act to follow but, gratifyingly, two people have offered to try. It is hoped they can work together to start with, taking on the various tasks. They will take over officially on 1st April; full details should be available next month. In the meantime, thank you very much Alan, from all in the Society, for all your hard work for eighteen years.

Setting up a review group to re-write the Constitution of the SIFD

This was recommended in the report presented at the A.G.M. by Roger Sturge and his Enquiry Group colleagues and will be very important for the Society. The present Constitution has been added to and amended frequently over the years and as a result is very ambiguous and confusing in places, and badly needs clarification and bringing up to date. Several people were suggested as possibles to form a Sub-Committee to do this and they will be asked in the next few weeks whether they would be willing.

<u>Investigating whether the SIFD should remain affiliated to the current organizations</u>

At present, the SIFD is affiliated to three organizations - EFDSS (English Folk Dance and Song Society), CIOFF (International Council of Organisations of Folk-lore Festivals and Folk Art) and CCPR (Central Council for Physical Recreation). At the A.G.M. worries were expressed that there could be unwanted repercussions in being affiliated to any group that hadn't been fully investigated - could there be financial or constitutional implications in certain circumstances? It was felt that a thorough investigation was merited, to make sure that the SIFD might not suffer inadvertently. So the Committee chose three SIFD members, not on the Committee, and will ask them whether they would be prepared to look at one organization each in some depth and report back their findings.

Lack of Publicity Officer

The lack of a publicity officer is a great disadvantage as no leaflets are available for handing out at events etc. If anyone feels they might be able to help, the Committee would be delighted to hear from them.

The next Committee meeting will be on 12th March.

THE ANNUAL ZIVKO FIRFOV BALKAN RAVE-UP!

Once again I left my still sunny home in the beautiful coastal town of Sitges, near Barcelona, for the Zivko Firfov Balkan Party which I still have close links with as I pre-record the programme of dances from Bulgaria, Croatia, Greece, Macedonia, Romania and Serbia, a daunting task but enjoyable as I listen to a chunk of Balkan music during the process.

As usual, it was a very successful and enjoyable evening and in a new location which I think will become our new home. We had been at Bunhill Road School for twenty-four years but had to leave due to alterations to the school fabric. The new hall, which was found after some difficulty as Saturday nights are usually well in demand, has a nice floor, good accoustics and catering facilities, a very nice and helpful caretaker, and it is larger, which means that the number of people is not now limited because of fire regulations. Archway is not difficult to reach by public transport, and the hall, which has parking facilities, is in a much nicer location. However, the hall was more expensive and there had to be a slight increase in the cost of admission.

The group worked very hard to get the new hall organized and the buffet was up to its usual high standard. The singing was also much appreciated. I had thought that the larger space might prove to be a bit daunting but it had no effect on the atmosphere created by the dancers.

The Balkan party has been held annually for over thirty years. I think the first must have been held in the late 1960s and has moved from one venue to another until settling at Bunhill Road School. At one time there was also a Midsummer dance held at the Royal College of Art, next to the Royal Albert Hall, and in its early days was a collaboration with the Bulgarian group run by Diane Waller and the late Danny Lumley. For a while, when the group had its own musicians playing traditional instruments, live music was mixed with recorded tapes but after some of the musicians returned home to various parts of the globe the band folded up. As some of the musicians, notably Linsey and Adam, lived with a master musician in Skopje, Macedonia, they studied with him every day and were able to play the bagpipes and other wind instruments like natives.

Pre-recorded music has its advantages. The programme can be timed and more dances included, and with dances coming from various Balkan countries there is the contrasting sounds of each country, played by indigenous musicians using both traditional and more modern instruments, and in the correct styles. This does help the dancing as one group of musicians, no matter how well they may play, cannot provide the same feeling or contrast.

I look forward to the next dance.

The item that occasioned by far the most debate at the AGM was Roy Clarke's motion concerning the possibility of the Society's affiliation to the Folk Arts Network (FAN). In support of the motion, dark things were said about putative negative effects that affiliation might have on the Society's reputation, governance or finances; though quite how these might come about was not made clear.

Some of us who were unconvinced about this, and reluctant to spend scarce Committee time chasing ghosts, nevertheless felt that sauce for the goose should be sauce for the gander. Insofar as affiliation to FAN might cause the Society any serious problems, under unknown circumstances, the same might happen with affiliation to any similar organisation, including the three that we are already affiliated to (EFDSS, CIOFF and CCPR).

The outcome of the debate was the passing of an amended motion instructing the Committee to thoroughly investigate the pros and cons of all existing or proposed affiliations.

The pros are fairly easy to identify, because the organisations concerned naturally seek to promote themselves. George Sweetland's item in the January News has started the ball rolling with a fair statement of the possible benefits of our present affiliation to CCPR.

This leads me to a specific request to members. Will anyone who joined SIFD as a result of a CCPR event, or who might never have joined but for our affiliation to CCPR, please let the Committee know.

As George himself has noted, CCPR was originally concerned with sport, and dance was added later. Dance seems still to have had a minor profile in recent events under CCPR's auspices, so CCPR is less obviously relevant to SIFD than some other organisations such as FAN, EFDSS and CIOFF.

But the extent of the benefit to the Society from affiliation tells us nothing about possible detriment. The cons to affiliation (with any organisation) are much harder to assess than the pros. Where can we start? Although the possibility of harm to the Society's reputation, governance or finances has been postulated, we are in the dark as to how this might arise.

Furthermore, as any scientist is painfully aware, it is impossible to prove a negative. However much time and effort we might expend without identifying any specific risk to the Society, that would not eliminate the possibility entirely.

My personal view is that we should not renew our present affiliations when they fall due unless the benefits clearly outweigh any credible risk; and likewise with adding any new ones.

Anyway it will help if those who have concerns about FAN can please explain:

- a) exactly what harm to the Society they believe could result from our affiliating to FAN;
- b) exactly how this could arise, and
- c) why the same or similar risk could not exist with EFDSS, CIOFF or CCPR.

To avoid any uncertainty, I should state that I have written this in a personal capacity, as a member of the Committee but not on behalf of the Committee.

I am reading Michael Palin's latest book, "Himalaya" (who else got one for Christmas? Last Christmas, most of my friends' stockings were filled with Lynne Truss's "Eats, Shoots & Leaves"!), and I was amused to read "my heart sinks as the dreaded spectre of a 'folklorique' evening looms" while Michael Palin was in a remote part of the Hindu Kush Heights and being welcomed by a local tribe. However, I was gratified to read the end of the paragraph, written after the dreaded entertainment of esoteric dancing and music (performed for centuries in this remote culture) that "there was a sense of real joy as the music and dancing went on"....."the magical warmth banished my worst memories of things folklorique". His approach to his next encounter with folklore was with more enthusiasm!

PIECE FROM THE PAST

I have recently acquired a box filled with old copies of the SIFD NEWS. They make fascinating reading and I thought you might like to share a few articles from them.

Something that struck me straight away when I started to read them was how many contributors of 25, 30, 35 years ago are still dancing and active in the SIFD today. This confirms for me that dancing keeps you young. Lily Avery was editing the NEWS throughout, and just as she does now was pleading for more news from affiliated groups — and contributions IN ON TIME, PLEASE!

In <u>January 1970</u> Bert Price was Chairman; there were 279 members, and entry to Cecil Sharp House Sunday dances was raised to 5/-. In those days, these dances included demonstration items.

There is a report of a Christmas Fair Jumble Sale run by the Polish Group. It was to include an International Song and Dance Display, which worried Betty Harvey a little - "as we weren't at all confident about how well it would be received. When we first opened our doors and were inundated by rather grimfaced bargain-hunting ladies, we couldn't imagine them wanting to relax and watch dancing. However, after a while, beguiled by the stalls, by cups of tea and gay music, they watched the dancing and listened to the singing with evident pleasure and absorption. When I heard two of them remarking, "Well, you can't complain of all this for value - they ought to have charged 6d entrance", I knew we were a success". And a success they certainly were, making over £90 profit despite the entrance fee of only 3d, with a Jumble Sale more exciting than any I ever attended.

January 1980 featured an article from John White, secretary of the Zivko Firfov Group who were part of the cabaret for six thousand hairdressers at the Royal Albert Hall. "We had to take the audience from cold and had no time for a rehearsal.....With a minimal build-up from the compère, our girls led the way on to the floor....in their gorgeous embroidered Posavina dresses.....the strains of that haunting Croatian song, Tancec, must have sounded weird indeed. You could hear people muttering and fidgeting and wondering just what had arrived. But a great cheer went up when the men walked on, dressed in what to the uninitiated must have looked like long white pyjamas with fringes. More fidgeting during our close-harmony rendering of Polegala Trava Detela, and then over the enormous loudspeakers came the tinkly sound of Zagreb tamburicas leading us into the L'etovanic, and as soon as we got to the fast bit the whole audience was with us, clapping and stamping its feet in time to the music.... After we had whirled through Repa, swung through Kalendara, done the quick Staro Sito shuffle and Ducec jump, we wound in a Posavski Drmes around the arena and escaped downstairs". All this in a 15-minute slot - it sounds marvellous.

Do events like either of these happen these days?
