The investigation of current organisations to which the SIFD is affiliated, is looking up. Two of the organisations are now being looked at, but we are still looking for a volunteer to scrutinise the CCPR!

Finance

Judith reported that running costs this year are proving to be higher than usual for many reasons, so her forecast was a little pessimistic. The committee will watch this situation carefully. Judith has obtained a booklet on Gift Aid, which she will investigate.

Membership

The letters requesting current information from teachers have been posted, and as soon as the new teachers list is compiled, Simon will despatch his letters to the groups offering renewal of affiliated or associated membership. Prompt replies to these will help enormously in our aim to produce the new publicity leaflets as near to September as possible.

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Piece from the Past

30 years ago this May much was going on in the Society.

Bert Price reported that the Saturday Day Courses had been running for 8 months, and were most successful. He felt they had passed the pilot stage, and now planned that they should be held regularly on the 2nd Saturday of each month. I'm sure he would be gratified to know that they are still going strong.

The secretary reported that the Sunday dances at Cecil Sharp House had "picked up", showing a profit of £36.08 for the previous six months. As admission was 40p, this shows more profit than we make nowadays, when we are pleased if we cover our costs.

Ken Ward and the Zivko Firfov Group provided a concert lasting an hour and twenty minutes at the Horniman Museum, to coincide with the opening of an exhibition of jewellery and embroidery from Bosnia and Herzogovina. For the previous six months they had worked hard – absorbing new dances, new songs, new members, new musical instruments and stitching new costumes. Fortunately their efforts were "very well received", and Yugoslavs who attended were delighted. It occurs to me that this sort of event doesn't seem to happen any more – why is this? Should we be suggesting our services more actively?

The official demonstration team reported on three demonstrations in March alone, and the Polish group were organising a children's dance.

It is gratifying to note that of the seven affiliated groups mentioned, five still thrive thirty years on – the groups at Barlow, Barnet, Folkestone, Merton Park and Woodvale. Congratulations to them.

Richard Thom, our Insurance Broker, writes regarding the recent introduction of regulation of the General Insurance industry and how it affects the Society and associated and affiliated clubs:

"As from 14 January 2005, the General Insurance Industry, on the instructions of the Government, is now regulated by the Financial Services Authority (FSA). As you are no doubt aware the SIFD holds a combined policy for itself and any affiliated or associated club for equipment and costumes and Public Liability.

Under the FSA's regulations only those who have received authorisation from the FSA can sell insurance. The policy is a group policy and can remain in force. However, all future payments will have to made payable to the broker – R S Thom Insurance Brokers Ltd, and any insurance questions must be raised with the broker and not the Society. All the SIFD is allowed, under the FSA's regulations, to do is state that there is a group policy arranged through our brokers - R S Thom Insurance Brokers Ltd. It is then down to the club to decide whether they wish to be part of the group policy or arrange their own insurance privately through a different broker or insurer. The Society can hold the full policy wording on behalf of all those insured thereunder and make it available for inspection by any club, if the club chooses. The broker, as he has already been doing, will provide a summary of the cover and any major conditions, terms or exclusions.

Group policies, by inference, attract special rates so it is unlikely that better rates could be achieved elsewhere, especially as most insurers impose minimum premiums far in excess of the actual premium charged under the group policy.

The policy extends to include Employers Liability in respect of volunteers (who are now deemed, by the insurers' interpretation, to be classed as an employee even though they do not get paid), Public Liability as well as All Risks on equipment and costumes. As you are no doubt aware the SIFD's current policy (and they reserve the right to alter this at any time) is that associated clubs (those with a recognised qualified teacher) are entitled to free Public Liability insurance. However, affiliated clubs pay a premium of £20 for this cover. The limit of indemnity is £5M any one incident but in all in respect of food poisoning, in any one period of insurance.

Those affiliated clubs who are not insured through the Society policy should think very carefully about being added. If you belong to a club that are not affiliated to SIFD you should consider getting them to join as the total subscription and insurance would still be way below anything obtainable by a club in isolation.

The insurer changed at the last renewal and the rates for equipment and costumes has been reduced. If any club does not have its equipment insured they should consider being added to the policy. There is no minimum premium. Peace of mind would be obtained by knowing the club does not suffer when a loss occurs."

As always, the welcome from the 'natives' was heart-warming and then I couldn't believe that after such a long gap Paul Mulders remembered us (in detail, so no doubt he was prepared again for our ready laughter and unprompted giggle fits).

Even more impeccable than our memories, he effortlessly maintained the interest, enjoyment, feeling of non-stop dancing and music, presenting and honing so easily and effectively. This workshop could have been a "How to do it" video for would-be teachers. As is our delight, there was always the clear picture of the full dance with music to set our brains in gear before the teaching, subtly geared to the specific group in front of him. (I for one sometimes never recover completely from a scrambled first impression of a dance from a muddled teacher; so glad to give another accolade to Paul Mulders). Notable was the indefatigable non-stop top performance before our eyes (all the time, like Deleyan and Vladimir etc.) - except for the test periods - could we remember on our own?).

It is that clear ingrained picture of the dance faultlessly presented which is so crucial for maintaining style and 'heart' in subsequent recall. One of the many bonuses was the encouragement of questions and then the really fulsome, fascinating, rich answers, often with ensuing dialogue and fuller comment, gently elicited from the class - very enriching.

Although there was no singing session, the chorus in particular was fixed from the outset with word placards large enough for the most short-sighted to read from any point in the circle while dancing non-stop. No wonder the response was convincing. Full marks for charm, easy unruffled atmosphere, readiness to laugh, excusing our giggles, noticing everyone's efforts and so sensitively helping anyone with a temporary 'problem/stutter' without underlining it or interrupting the class; everyone was included in the ubiquitous camaradie.

Nearly forgot - it was super to see Frank Dowling and Mike Machin again for the evening dance, along with the other lovely M.C.s. The magic wand even gave an extra little flourish with the platter of delicious sandwiches donated for Sunday lunch.

With dear Julie Korth's outstanding unique hospitality, snippets of beautiful scenery and so many joyful laughs, we felt we had been away for a week's holiday! 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Rewrite of SIFD Constitution

Having sent some thoughts on the Constitution to the Sub-committee, the Chairman has asked me to put my views that relate to the "Objectives of the Society" in the News, which "should provoke a much wanted discussion amongst SIFD Members"!

Clause 3 (a) reads: "To preserve Folk Dances of all peoples, to make them known and encourage the practice of them in traditional form". The word "traditional" is not defined and means different things to different people and takes on different meanings depending upon context. In my view SIFD events includes non-traditional folk dances such as the Scottish dances. Cecil Sharp took an English demonstration team to Glasgow that resulted in Miss Milligan, who became co-founder of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society, resurrecting the Scottish dances that were dying out. I guess she was classically trained from the significant changes made to the way it was done by the 'traditional' dancers. Tom and Joan Flett in the 1950s extensively researched and collected Scottish dances from as far back as living memory extended up to 1914 (see their book TRADITIONAL DANCING IN SCOTLAND). Much of their knowledge was passed on by a co-founder of the Reading Traditional & Step Dance Group (Reading Cloggies) where we danced some of the 'traditional' dances. I sure SIFD members will not want to give up RSCDS dances and few are likely to want to learn the traditional ones.

A somewhat similar situation exists with English dances. The first book of Country Dances by Cecil Sharp who restored to the people the folk dances of England, were the traditional ones collected in various parts of the Country. Subsequent books were from the 17/18th century dances of the aristocracy as published by Playford. I believe in the middle of the last century the EFDSS dropped the Playford dances on the grounds they were not 'traditional'. Playford devotees continued with Instructors in evening classes and weekend courses where I learnt these dances. 'Traditional' and Playford style dances are now done at the EFDSS and SIFD events.

Many English and Scottish dances in their "traditional form" involved stepping that has virtually been dropped when danced these days. The RT&SDG's experience is that few people want to learn stepping, the "traditional form" that does not conform to modern practice.

I accept that dances practiged over a long time will become traditional and can accept that the Playford dances that Cecil Sharp revived nearly a century ago may be coming eligible to be 'traditional', but dances at SIFD events made up in my own dancing lifetime, some by people I knew, I find difficult to accept as being 'traditional'.

3 (c) of the Society's Objects reads: "To provide and encourage for the public benefit research into and study of the origin, development and traditional practice of all Folk Dances." Does the Society carry out this activity? I cannot recall such activities (apart from Teacher training theses), any catalogue of researches and studies or who is the Custodian of this information. I question the wisdom of embracing "all Folk Dances"; surely this amongst other things, involves duplication of EFDSS activities. I suggested the words "traditional" and "all" be dropped from this clause.

I admit I am not clear if the "Objects of the Society" define all the activities the Society should be carrying out, the main objectives of the Society or just serve to limit the scope of what the Society can do. The answer affects the significance of my views, which were raised to try and bring the Constitution more in line with my perception of what we are doing.

INTENSIVE RUSSIAN DANCE WORKSHOPS WITH HENNIE KONINGS

During 2004/2005 a group of people who are enthusiastic about Russian dance have been developing the idea of having regular intensive weekend workshops with Hennie Konings.

Those who have danced with Hennie at the Eastbourne Festival a couple of years ago, or at the workshops which Janet Douglas runs in Bognor and Judy King runs in Shropshire, will know what an excellent teacher he is. The workshops we are developing offer the possibility of working with Hennie at a higher level, deepening our knowledge of the dance, practising for better style and learning more challenging variations. However, never fear, the dances are not necessarily more difficult than those we learn in beginners' workshops!

I book Hennie to come twice a year - on the last weekend in January and June. It is an expensive operation bringing Hennie from Holland but the SIFD were kind enough to underwrite our last workshop and contributed to make up a small loss which we made. These workshops are more expensive than some, but people who come say they are well worth it.

Eventually we hope to have a solid group of regulars who will be able to start where we left off each time, rather than always having to start from 'square one'. 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Members views sought on a major objective of the Society

There has been and is considerable room for discussion about the first object in the SIFD Constitution which reads as follows:

"To preserve Folk Dances of all peoples, to make them known and encourage the practice of them in traditional form."

One view is that this object implies that the SIFD is responsible for preserving dances in all other countries. Is the SIFD to be the guardian of all dances across the world from Arabia to Zimbabwe? In practice can this be the case? Is not the preservation of dances in Sweden the prime responsibility of the Swedish people? What do we mean by 'preserve' and 'traditional'? Have we any right to claim that we are preserving the traditional dances from other countries where dances may change over time? Are we able to do so better than the people in those countries?

Currently the Society keeps records of some dances from other countries but for the purpose of dancing mainly for enjoyment in Britain. Should the objective of the Society be amended or left alone as above?

The committee redrafting the SIFD Constitution invites readers to make brief and succinct contributions in a discussion on this matter, to take place in *SIFD News* on this opening objective in the current Constitution of the Society.
