As we welcome Janet Douglas as the new editor of the SIFD News, we must take this opportunity to thank Lily for the 38 years that she has held the post. It is a staggering period of service and she will be a hard act to follow.

The News is one of the few magazines that I read from cover to cover and it always amazes me how Lily manages to cull interesting articles, from members and from other sources, and to provide reliable information on events in the folk world. She has also had to contend with balancing the 'voices' on controversial issues.

Although I have known Lily for many years I do not know her well personally. She is a person I greatly respect and has an extensive knowledge of the cultures, dances and costumes of other countries. Since she moved to Bexhill from London we have seen less of her, but she came to be part of the team in assessing the new teachers, and if they satisfied her they have reason to be pleased as she is a very discerning judge.(I am told that her marking of the dance groups at Llangollen seldom varies more than a mark from the official results). In the past she has danced with L'Escargots, the Society's French team, and with Zivko Firfov, the Jugoslavian group. She was also very fond of Greek dancing.

The first time I came into close contact with her was working on the Badge and Day Course sub-committee. Until then she had just been a name in the News letter as I suspect she is to many of our newer members, but I hope that this appreciation will help you to understand what a debt of gratitude we owe to her.

I am pleased that in her letter in the News last month she admitted to having enjoyed the work. I hope that now she will enjoy sitting back and reading the results of Janet Douglas' efforts.

On behalf of the officers, the committee and all members of the SIFD, I thank you Lily.

# The Lost Tribes of Europe

This is the title of a ten-page feature in Time magazine for 29<sup>th</sup> August, which claims that the continent's original minorities are fighting to reclaim their ancient cultures and identities.

After a general survey; there is more detail on the Veps of Russia, the Rusyns of Slovakia, the Sorbs of Germany and the Bretons in France. A map locates them as well as the Cornish, Basques, Corsicans, Walsers in Switzerland, Liechenstein, Austria and Italy, the Sami reindeer-herders of Sweden, Finland and Norway, the Livonians of Latvia, the Selkup and Nenets of Siberia, the Roma of Hungary, Romania and Bulgaria, the Kasubians of northern Poland, and the Gagauz mainly in Moldova. Some colour photographs show national dress being worn.

It is a pity that no sources or material for further reading are mentioned, as books have been written on the subject. Nevertheless, even with just one tiny mention of folk dancing and barely more on their music, there is much of interest in the article.

### **Notes from Camberwell**

Margaret Peggie of the CCPR Movement and Dance division produced a slick, fast-moving and entertaining programme for the 2005 'On Show'.

The professional groups, such as the Jiving Lindy Hoppers with their 'Big Apple and Momma Lou', an evocation of the popular American dances of the 40's, would not have disgraced the West End stage, with its explosion of energy. Among the community based groups, the Fitness League (once the League of Health and Beauty), with 'Flexibility' showed how a simple item, but well rehearsed and performed in total unison, can be very satisfying: I mention only those two, but many demonstrated the enthusiasm and dedication of the performers.

Coming to the folk dance groups, the EFDSS was represented by the Fosbrook Folk Education Trust. The dancers were all young, from 7 to 20, and as I could see no boys, I assume it was a girls' school. It was a good, enjoyable item, but I am puzzled as to why it was thought necessary for the EFDSS to present Irish dances as the English tradition is so rich and varied. The Scottish Country Dance Society put on their best show for years. The big arena was covered with dancers, the girls in white, and there were enough kilted men to make a good contrast; all this to the music of a lone piper.

Our Serbian item had both colourful costumes and live music, but it was clear that the dancers were struggling to fill the arena and this tenseness showed. It is probable that that was the reason the choreography was kept simple. If a prestige event as this is attempted again we need to have more input from the Society as a whole to ensure proper representation. Nevertheless, all concerned should be congratulated on their efforts to give the Society a presence. I was glad to see some members from the south giving the dancers some support, among them Lily Avery, which leads me to my next bit.

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Indeed it is the end of an era. Lily has filled the Editor's chair for many years and there is no doubt that the regular and prompt appearance of the News was an important factor in keeping the Society together.

I had a stint as Editor in those days and therefore I am very much aware of the tribulations of producing the News-sheet then. We kept the already well worn duplicator at Oxford House where it would ooze ink at inappropriate moments or get the paper stuck in its entrails. The stencils were difficult to cut and the typist, (Mary Fergar), had to hammer away at the typewriter to pierce through the protective coating. As there were other Editors before Lily took over, the machine was even more temperamental by then. The arrangements for collating, stapling, etc., were haphazard, but Lily soon found more efficient ways. Her eagle eyes soon spotted any errors in spelling or grammar, so for all these reasons as well as less definable ones, her contribution was enormous. I am very happy that Janet has taken over the onerous task of filling her shoes, and I am sure she will make a very good Editor.

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As a P. S., I would like to add a few notes to Alison's interesting views on past events. These were everyday matters for us then, but it is revealing to see how they look from to-day's perspective. Kelsey's notes on teaching were important to us as her qualifications enabled her to take over the class at Harrow Green when Peter Oakley moved away. I think Alison will find that Billingham started before 1970 as I had two good friends who went there for a Russian work-shop and my best estimate for that is around 1965. They found accommodation was a problem as there was no camping site anywhere near, as well as little B&B places which might account for its unpopularity.

### **Intensively Balkan**

Garth Cartwright in 'Princes Amongst Men, Journeys With Gypsy Musicians' totally immerses the reader in an excellent contemporary tour through Serbia, Macedonia, Romania and Bulgaria meeting players and singers everywhere. The locations and social conditions are vividly described in a lively narrative augmented tellingly by apt photographs. Garth suggests where "the world's gone wrong" (p.234) in the 21<sup>st</sup> century, "as Western popular music grows forever more banal and mercantile it is to the Roma and their Gypsy musicians, these soothsayers of song, we increasingly turn". The book ends with a select Bibliography, Discography and Filmography – an interest in itself. It is published in 2005 by Serpent's Tail in paperback at £11.99.

# Doe Dans 2nd-4th September 2005 Ipswich goes to the Netherlands.

The Dutch take folk dancing seriously: there were over 1,000 participants at Doe Dans 2005, and the number increased to 1300 if performers, teachers, orchestras, cooks, stewards and volunteers were included. This biannual event was held at the whimsically named Walibi World in Flevoland.

The aim wasn't to collect dances, just to dance and also to watch in admiration the various performances on offer. And the performances were outstanding. Many of you will be familiar with Ozorniye Naigrishi, the Ukrainian group, as many of Hennie's dances are choreographed to their music. They are a delight to watch and it was exhilarating to dance to them playing live in the hall. The other major performance groups were Irish (spectacular) and Macedonian (vibrant). We were also entertained by a black street group and a lively Dutch group.

We didn't only watch. There were 6 workshop sessions over Saturday and Sunday, and at each session there were 8 options, so it was possible only to sample a handful. I danced with Shmulik, as I consider him to be one of the best Israeli teachers, and with Tom Bozigian (twice) because I've known some of his dances almost since I started dancing and this is the first time I've seen him. I also did Russian and Romanian, but didn't manage to get to Hip Hop, Indian, Irish, Greek, Gypsy, Bulgarian, Tap, International, Singing or any of the other delights on offer.

In the evenings there was a choice: on Saturday Martin Ihns had set up a wonderful Macedonian cafe party with live music, coloured lights, potted palms and some tables and chairs and a bar at one end and virtually non-stop dancing. We wandered between this and the International evening, which suited us fine, as International in Holland is largely Balkan and Israeli. I do remember going the wrong way in *The Willow Tree* and searching for a partner for the *All American Promenade*, but otherwise it was all circles and lines with the occasional 'partner moment', as Fiona might call it.

There were plenty of young people and energy levels were high. Shmulik's answer to this was: "If you make it exciting, the young will come". Perhaps it helped that teenagers formed two of the performance groups? The pace was always varied; fast and manic followed by gentle and slow. How do the Dutch do it? It ran like clockwork, with loudspeakers, mixing decks, theatre lights all working; wonderful music, top class teachers and people in the right place at the right time. You could bring your own tent (or caravan, this being the Netherlands), but we opted for the luxury of a self catering bungalow. The weather was glorious, the people friendly, the dancing was great: what more could you want? Where were the rest of you?

### **Notes from September's Committee Meeting**

We were particularly grateful to John Boyd for joining us, and answering our questions on the draft of the **New Constitution** which John and his colleagues on the sub-committee had prepared. Clearly a lot of work had gone into this draft, and Janet Woolbar expressed our gratitude. The proposed new constitution promises to be much shorter and clearer than the present one. However there was concern that possibly a little too much had been taken out, discussions on what should be put back are ongoing. At present the aim is to present just a report at the AGM, and a finished draft for approval next year.

The benefits of the Society remaining a charity were outlined; the financial benefits *are* worthwhile, especially as Judith Payling's application to claim **Gift Aid** might well be bearing fruit. The Society may well be able to make claims for the past few years, and this would be very financially rewarding – hundreds of pounds for *each* year. Again I stress that we will need your support and cooperation to make this happen.

Judith also presented a **draft balance sheet** for the year ending 31<sup>st</sup> July 2005, and I'm glad to report that the figures are healthier than anticipated. Gift Aid receipts would ease the financial situation considerably – as would the production and projected sales of another **music CD**; but to produce another successful CD we really need to know what you – the people who might buy it – would like to include. So Richard Mellish will again be asking for your wish-lists. *Please, please don't leave the replies to "someone else"* – he really needs to know what you'd like included. Wouldn't it be splendid if a new CD could be part of our 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations?

All but two Affiliated groups have reapplied for **membership** – but 101 individual members have failed to renew. Following them up will involve expense, which is a shame.

The **Agenda for the AGM** was discussed at length, and should accompany this copy of the News. An offer from Devon of **dozens of 78s** featuring international folk dance music proved irresistible, and has resulted in their acquisition, courtesy of many members forming links to a chain (thanks to them all). We hope the records will reward the work that will need to be put in to make them useful.

By now the show at the **Royal Albert Hall** has taken place, but at the meeting we expressed our gratitude to all who were about to take part to represent the Society, and especially Helen Clancy and Julie Korth and Janet Douglas, for all the hours, and miles, they were devoting to the necessary organisation and rehearsals. We're very grateful to all the participants, and hope they enjoyed taking part.

The lack of **T shirt designs** for the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary was much regretted, and has forced the committee members to attempt uncharacteristic feats of artistic endeavour. If you feel a design idea stirring in the back of your brain, then please – we really would like to hear from you...

By now you know that Janet Douglas is taking over as the **new editor of the News**. We are very grateful to her for taking this on after the amazing example set by Lily Avery, and hope she will enjoy it as much as Lily has done. It is hardly possible to thank Lily sufficiently for all she has done. She has produced the News for more years than many of us have been members, and her dedication, reliability and patience have shone through and impressed us. Mercifully after all the years of encouraging people to send in news by the 17<sup>th</sup>, and write clearly she has managed to retain her sense of humour! We all wish her well in her 'retirement', which we hope will be very active and happy. Lily – thank you.

## "Mainly Balkan" course in the North

# March 11<sup>th</sup> & 12<sup>th</sup> 2006

In March 2001 Barlow IFDG and the Derbyshire Dancers held their first joint weekend course, with the aim of bringing excellent dance teaching to the North of England. These courses have been a fantastic success, being sold out well in advance each time. In 2006 we are bringing not one, but two superb teachers.

Jan Knoppers is already well known to us from two SIFD summer schools and numerous weekends. He has been teaching since 1979 and after getting his first teaching qualification studied at the Rotterdam Dance Academy for 4 years, specialising in folk dance, jazz and tap, which he later used as a basis for a study of all forms of step dance. Further specialisations followed, first Bulgarian, then Armenian and latterly Asian. Following 23 years as Artistic Director of the Theatre Group 'Radost' he became an artistic director at the professional Folk Dance Theatre in Amsterdam. He initiated the Youth Group and made countless pieces both for them and for the main company.

Jan has always been interested in the way in which dance is taught. He developed his method of 'learning while dancing' because of frustration at spending more time on courses listening than dancing. Jan states that his aim is to teach dancing, not dances, taking the music as the starting point and inspiration.

Richard van der Kooij was trained in this method and eventually took over from Jan as the Chief Teacher Trainer for the LCA (the Dutch folkdance organisation). Richard's main profession is that of physiotherapist but he now assists Jan at 'Radost'. As well as the teacher training he has been an examiner and advisor for the LCA. He brings his understanding of movement to the course, and the warm-ups led by this duo are a revelation!
