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A vixen has settled in disused outbuildings beyond our garden wall, an event which has stirred strong emotions in our pets, Spot and Topsy. I watch her from an upstairs window and understand why the fox is often part of folk culture (eg: our English folk song 'Red Rover'). She is gorgeous and puts me in mind of a very old Macedonian dance Ibrahim Rizevski taught (it is also known in Greece). Zajko Kokorajko is a ballad (with a moral!) It is danced as a basic Makedonska with variations and gestures to indicate the different animals and their story:

Zajko is a rabbit who falls in love with a beautiful vixen called Lina; she is a widow and very famous, and apparently she visits everyone's house. Dressed in his 'Fiscoli' hat, fine clothes and curled moustache, he takes his friends - the Bear (meat eater), the Wolf (godfather), the Eagle (tapan player), the Sheep (treasurer), the Frog (zurla player) and the Donkey (town crier) - to make arrangements for the wedding. They arrive to discover Lina's trousseau – lots of meat and chickens! Zajko realises she might eat *him* and changes his mind. As they retrace their steps three hunters try to kill them, Zajko rips off his finery, manages to race home and swears he will never get married.

Judith is hoping to include a **Gift Aid** form with this copy of the News, and if you, as a member of the SIFD, are eligible and willing to sign it (ie you pay UK Income Tax and would like the Society to claim tax back on your membership subscriptions) then we would urge you to do so. Please return it as soon as possible in the envelope provided. As I've mentioned before, the extra money will make a considerable difference to the Society's income allowing - among other things - continued support for the SIFD-recognised teacher's scheme. I visited Kew Gardens the other day, and was impressed to be asked if my entrance fee could be considered for Gift Aid. My name and postcode were entered on the computer - and it was done. Sadly we don't have such technology, but Judith is working just as hard as that computer, and deserves your support.

Much talk centred on London's **60th Anniversary Dance**. Jill Bransby has very kindly offered to help Helen Ezra organise it, and I'm sure they will keep us up-to-date with their progress.

The Membership Secretary reported the addition of 5 **new members**, which is excellent news. We welcome them to the Society, and hope they will make good use of what the Society has to offer them.

Great Alne - Your Questions Answered

Have you ever seen adverts for the Midland's "Great Alne Long Weekend", and wondered what it was like? Well, now is you chance to find out, so read on......

Where is Great Alne? Great Alne is a small Warwickshire village, 2½ miles east of the town of Alcester on the B4089 to Wootton Wawen. From www.greatalnefolk.org.uk you can access a map.

How does it come to be the venue for an annual folk weekend? David and Linda Bradley live in this delightful village and it was Linda's suggestion to use the village hall as the centre, when André Hobro first had the idea of organising a folk weekend. Thanks to the help of a number of willing friends, he is still doing so.

<u>What is the idea behind these weekends?</u> To provide an opportunity for people to spend a relaxed and informal **long weekend** in pleasant, rural surroundings and share a wide range of folk activities, some of which may be quite different from those they have experienced before.

<u>How long have these weekends been taking place?</u> 2006 is the 23rd year, the first having been in 1984. They start early Friday evening and finish now on a Monday afternoon, but *NOT the Bank Holiday weekend*.

<u>When do these long-weekends happen?</u> Usually over the weekend *before* the May-Day Bank Holiday. There are exceptions when Easter is late, like **this year** when **the long-weekend will be the 7th to 10th April.**

What happens at these weekends? There is a programme of workshops each day that cover all sorts of folk dancing plus music, singing and a variety of other activities. Over the years these have included handbell ringing, crafts, circus skills and short-wave radio, - it all depends on who is to be there and what they are prepared to lay on for other people to try. Activity teachers are not paid, they just contribute their skills in exchange for their own participation in workshops laid-on by others. However, we like to subsidise travel for one of several excellent dance teachers to visit from the Netherlands. Afternoons include walks and a Sunday cycle ride.

Evenings start with a <u>music session</u> followed by a variety of <u>dancing</u>, mostly to live music.

What sort of dancing is involved? Anything that could loosely be described as 'folk' dancing has been included over the years: English, Scottish, Morris and Sword dancing and International folk from all over Europe and beyond. In addition there has been Appalachian, Line-dancing, Cajun, Salsa, Swing, Jive etc.

Do I need dancing experience? No, anyone is welcome to have a go and you don't need to bring a partner. The dance workshops are run by a variety of teachers with experience in their different type of dance. Dances are taught from scratch. Many regular attendees are experienced dancers, but all, including those who lead and teach like to join in, to try new things and we're always pleased to welcome and offer help to newcomers.

<u>Can anyone join in the music sessions?</u> If you have an instrument and can produce some sort of reasonably acceptable noise from it, you can join in! **Reading music a bit does help**, but is **not** essential, as many people learn folk music by ear. The sessions include British and American traditions, European dance music, often Balkan and Israeli amongst others. We play together for fun, to learn new music and styles, and some of us continue playing for a good deal of the evening dancing. The programme will suggest suitable times when you'll be able to join in. You can play as much or as little as you like, and if you want to try a new instrument or are not able to bring one with you, people will often lend you one.

<u>Do I need to book? Must I come for the whole weekend?</u> No, just come for as long or short a time as you want. There is some financial advantage in a 'season ticket' or in staying for several workshops, just to encourage people to try out several new experiences, but you are most welcome just to turn up and pay at the time. If this is to be your first visit, why not try out a day and see how you like it? If you are able to come just for an evening (perhaps that's all you can fit in) do try the Friday evening, which is specially geared to those with less experience of International dancing, or you might like to sample the Sunday evening, which has an enjoyable and a very varied programme, but is less likely to be over-crowded. Saturday evening is fun, popular and usually the busiest, but new visitors might therefore feel a bit overlooked rather than being received in the friendly way that we would prefer. We particularly want to encourage children and young people to develop interests and skills in folk music and dance, and so try to reflect this in our pricing structure.

If I come for the weekend, where do I stay? There's space by the hall if you have a camper-van or caravan (though please ring André beforehand, to let him know you'll bring one). If you've a tent we use a pleasant nearby meadow, and a few people sleep in the hall itself. If you don't fancy that, there are plenty of varied places to stay nearby - caravan sites (static and touring), bed and breakfast, hotels or the YHA - more information on request and on the website (thanks to James Hobro).

What happens about food? A good selection of freshly-prepared meals is now available to buy daily at most times from breakfast through to suppertime. Tea or coffee and frequent squash are provided (inclusive) mid-morning and evening. There's also a pub round the corner, and restaurants and takeaways within easy reach.

<u>What else is there to do nearby?</u> Alcester is an attractive and interesting small town with half-timbered buildings. Coughton Court (NT) and Ragley Hall are two nearby mansions well worth a visit. The many attractions of Stratford-on-Avon are only 6 miles away, Mary Arden's house and Anne Hathaway's cottage nearer than that. There are pleasant nearby **walks** in the **Alne Hills**, and in **Oversley Wood**, where it is usually about the right time to see the bluebells at their best, or you can walk the Stratford canal towpath. This is only the immediate neighbourhood. You'll need to extend your stay to do full justice to the area.

What is on the programme for this year? All the usual things and some new ones:

International dance is taught each year by one of several visiting teachers of dance from the Netherlands. This year it's Mariette van Gelder with a CD dances she'll teach. Israeli is by Adrian Pointon; some English Dances from the 1940's (Knees-up Mother Brown, Lambeth Walk etc) by Cath Greenway; Couple dances (Cajun etc.) by Linda Moon; Scottish, German and NW Morris by Paul Lindley. Paul will also organise handbell ringing once again. Music sessions of British, American and International folk will be led by David Bradley and Gordon Taylor. Weather permitting, there will be walks and a cycle ride. On Friday evening there will be some straightforward English Playford dancing with Peter Eames as well as easy International. The Saturday and Sunday evenings will be a mixed programme of International and English dancing interspersed with highlights from the day's workshops, together with entertainment spots. We especially look forward to having again a Sunday old time singalong with Jack Steele. After a late dance session, there may even be singing around the fire for night owls. This promises to be the usual varied and exciting programme in the extended and improved village hall.
