## Yves Moreau Bulgarian dance course at Malhamdale, April 2006

As I relaxed in the bath on returning from this course (exhausted from 3 days of dancing all day and all night, head still spinning full of wonderful music and enjoyable experiences) it occurred to me that I have rarely seen a review of one of Cathy's weekend courses in SIFD News and that this event certainly deserved sharing with others.

I have thoroughly enjoyed both the London weekends with Yves Moreau that I have attended, but here in a residential situation with 'smaller' groups of 40 or so, the whole Yves experience was intensified. His seemingly untiring infectious and inspiring joy and enthusiasm, great sense of humour, and ease of being with people created a real sense of community — a wonderful complete escape from everyday life, that you did not want to end (even though your feet told you they could not have carried on!)

Newfield Hall in Malhamdale has an idyllic setting with views of the rolling hills of the Yorkshire dales. Walking along by the rushing rivers and enjoying the peace of this beautiful countryside gave us welcome refreshment in between the dancing sessions. The views were particularly stunning on Sunday morning – after an unexpected blizzard arrived during our meal on Saturday evening, and we woke on Sunday morning to bright sunshine with everything coated in a bright white dusting of snow.

Each day there were two course classes: general and intermediate – packed with new dances – all immaculately prepared and presented with wonderfully uplifting music. Even the difficult bits finally became manageable; with Yves' patient explanations and attention to detail, not too many of us experienced his DSS (disappearing smile syndrome)!

After each day full of dancing or walking, and swimming there was a delicious three course meal – after which we danced again, with the added treat of live music played by course participants from Norwich and Leeds. The inimitable Yves was still there well after midnight, leading some of the dances and still finding the energy to learn a few new ones himself, from the various people who led the very enjoyably varied evening sessions.

Our thanks go to Yves, Cathy and all who took part for a truly excellent weekend. Make sure you don't miss Yves' return visit to Malhamdale in October 2007.

## More memories by Ken Ward.

At the time I joined the Society it was attracting young or youngish people and a large number were enthusiastic walkers and members of the YHA, energetic and perhaps dance crazy! Quite often a walking and dancing weekend would be arranged and we would meet up and travel as a group. This was the era when few people had their own transport and the YHA would not allow parking at the hostel. We would meet at the station or bus stop and while waiting would have an impromptu dance, with or without music. Also the era of the heavy and breakable shellac gramophone 78 rpm record. No portable ghetto-blasters. After a meal at the hostel we would have drink at a local pub and then dance either at the hostel or the village hall, hired for the occasion.

Next morning, weather permitting we would put on our rucksacks and walk, stopping at a pub midday for lunch. We would then dance in the forecourt - there was usually one small accordion around and I can remember walking with my accordion and luggage on my back, mounted on an ex-army ammunition box carrier! Arriving back in London we made our way to the Inns of Court Mission for the evening dance. If it was the Cecil Sharp evening we went home to change and pick up a costume, it was a tradition to wear a folk costume if you had one.

Twice a year there was a dance and walking weekend at Surrey Crest near Godstone Green in Surrey. This consisted of a group of 'rustic' wooden buildings - overlooking open countryside. In winter the huts which contained the two tier beds were heated by sometimes smoky cast iron coke stoves except for the large living room which had a large wood burning grate. Often before dinner a few of us - Simon Guest, Len Sawyer (who emigrated to Canada), Gerry Wakemen, myself and a few others who I cannot remember would run across the sometimes muddy fields to the Fox and Hounds at the Green for a pint or two of traditional beer and then run or stagger, back across the fields in time for dinner. Afterwards we danced into the early hours. Next day we would walk in the morning and perhaps dance again before making our way back to London. Back in London many of us went on to the Inns of Court for the Sunday evening dance. The winter dance was usually the Guy Fawkes weekend and we would erect a huge bonfire and make a guy. However on one occasion I remember travelling with Len Sawyer on a Green Line to Godstone Green each carrying a half of a rather large guy! I don't think the driver was very pleased.

However when called upon, for a special occasion, we could put on a stylish performance of dances wearing traditional costumes from the country represented. The Swedish were made by Pug, our Swedish teacher, from materials collected in Sweden or France, or Austrian garments, etc. We were often mistaken for nationals because we had so mastered the style of dancing. We also took part in other festivals. We were invited on several occasions by Douglas Kennedy of the English Folk Dance and Song Society to participate in their annual festivals at the Royal Albert Hall. On one occasion the French Group 'Les Escargots', formed by Simon and Joan Guest in which Lily and I enjoyed dancing so much, was invited and Janine flew in from Paris to play the vielle for us. Our performance was very well received.

On another occasion, the Swedish Group, augmented to sixteen couples, danced a rarely performed harvest dance called Renegen, accompanied by the three Willies. Pug and the musicians had learnt the dance for the occasion; it was very demanding and lasted about five minutes. The festival was attended by the president of the EFDSS, Princess Margaret. The group also danced around a Maypole every Midsummer at the Swedish Church in London, after being wined and dined at Pug's flat. I fondly remember the Swedish schnapps! One Swedish guy used to come to London every Midsummer just to see us dance. He told us that our dancing had a freshness and spontaneity about it,

often absent in homegrown groups, which he classed as text book dancers, a situation not improved by musicians whose eyes were glued to the music. I appreciate that with the Society's large repertoire of dance melodies this is difficult, but not impossible. The four of us used to manage it on a Sunday evening.

It is important that people communicate when they dance and not remain a collection of individuals, even in a circle dance. We lived our dances, playing around with them, stealing each others partners, but never losing our respect for the dances. We loved the flirting sequences in the Swedish Fjallnesspolska. I experienced this kind of natural enjoyment on social occasions during my visits to the former Jugoslavia. Of course it depends on the dance in question.

## **Notes from March's Committee Meeting**

Now the Dance With The World **leaflets** are in circulation (next time they will only need an update and be out *far* more quickly) attention has turned to the "Join Us!" leaflet – good progress was reported. We feel we're on a roll as the Membership Booklet, to coincide with the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary, is also steaming ahead.

An **anniversary T-shirt** was shown at the meeting and much admired – details from Claire Steeley appeared in last month's News. Please consider supporting Claire and the people who made this new T-shirt possible. The real ones look even better than the picture.

News has been sent to us of a **Big Dance Week** in London, organised by the Mayor's Office for  $15^{th} - 23^{rd}$  July 2006. We decided to participate by organising a multi-group display in the Embankment Gardens, with audience involvement (around the deck chairs). Sunday July  $16^{th}$  has since been booked.

The committee has been asked to consider **changing the time** of the Sunday Dance at Cecil Sharp House. If it were held earlier it would make it easier for people with children or long journeys to attend. It might be possible that it could be changed – but we really need to know how you, the Sunday Dancers, feel about this. Could you let me know, please, how you would react if it started earlier in future? An email or phone call with your views would be most helpful.

The Membership Secretary reported another 3 **new members**, which is really good news. We welcome them to the Society, and hope they will make good use of what the Society has to offer them.

The **AGM** was not discussed through lack of time, but will be prioritised for the next meeting. The next committee meeting will be held on May 13<sup>th</sup>.

### A Question of Style

Simon and Joan Guest's "Bourrées et autres choses" in the March News raised some interesting and important issues. The Constitution subcommittee posed some related questions about "preserving" dances in the May 2005 News. In the same issue, John Walford presented some illustrations of how ideas about tradition can evolve.

I believe further debate would be useful, both among SIFD members and among the members of groups outside the Society such as those cited by Simon and Joan. I have no definitive answers to offer on any of these issues, but I would like to contribute a few thoughts to the debate.

First, I have two illustrations, from England and Sweden, of the difficulty of establishing what IS the authentic form of a dance.

For much of the 20th century, morris dancing mainly meant dances from the Cotswolds, performed in a style collected and taught initially by Cecil Sharp. Undoubtedly Sharp's work was of immense value BUT it wasn't the whole story. Even in his own day there was a schism with Mary Neal's radical ideas for promoting folk dancing among the urban working class.

Then, in about the last third of the century, there was a gradual realisation that Sharp had collected the dances from old men, who had danced in the style of old men. That style would not have won any prizes in the competitions between sides from different villages when those same men were young. Young men, and even middle-aged men who have got away from Sharp's influence, dance much more vigorously.

Last summer a few of us were taught two polska variants (one fast and one slow) from Jämtland. Our teacher had collected them from an elderly man and was keen to pass them on accurately. They are delightful dances, which we greatly enjoy doing. A couple of months later, however, some of us were taught by another teacher from Jämtland. He declines to teach these two dances, because he fears they represent the personal style of one individual, who may have been atypical for his locality.

So, returning to the Berrichonne bourrées -- I know less about these, but I do know that some of the regulars at On Bouge and other French dance events in England also visit France frequently, so their dancing styles are likely to reflect those of (at least some of) their French contemporaries.

Are there people nowadays in Berry, or elsewhere in France, who endeavour to dance in a specifically Berrichon style? If so, is their style exactly the same as was taught by Pierre Panis or have ideas developed, as ideas about Cotswold morris have? How representative was the style collected by Panis of the way that those old people would have danced forty or fifty years earlier? Were their children or grandchildren dancing at the time, and if so what was their style? Should we now be learning from a current generation of Berrichon specialists in France? Or should we (foreigners) be trying to "preserve" the style that Panis taught?

As I said at the start, I have no definitive answers; but I do think we should be wary of believing that we know the one true style for any tradition, even from our own country, let alone one from another country.

#### "Cliffie" Beck

I first met Clifford, then known as "Cliffie" in early 1940. He was the young brother to a school friend of mine, Audrey Beck, and would have been about 8 or 9 years old at the time with dark curly hair and was engagingly cheeky (even then). In those wartime days we often spent Saturday afternoons at the cinema with Cliffie sitting between us, which I seem to remember, had been Mrs Beck's instructions to Audrey as one method of keeping him under control. Did it work?. I don't remember. Likewise I do not remember much about his schooldays except of jokes that would be played on various visitors.

For instance, once I was introduced to a mythical and jolly looking uncle who was sitting in an armchair, which on closer inspection proved to be a type of Toby jug with a large smiling shiny face with clothing attached. Another time I made the mistake of visiting 30 West End Lane on the 5<sup>th</sup> November. Guess who made the fireworks? Terrifying!

Later, as has been described by Roy Clarke and Brian Dowsett, Cliffie became involved with Y.H.A. and S.I.F.D. and he caused my life to be changed when he introduced a friend and I to Harrow Green Folk Dance Group in 1957. The friend dropped out after a few months but I stayed on and enjoyed it all and, of course, eventually met Oscar there.

Cliffie's death was a tragedy. He had already had one heart operation but was very brave and outwardly cheerful and still even jokey when facing this second, fatal one. He will not be forgotten by anyone who knew him and we join in sending our condolences to Anne, Adrian and Trevor and his siblings Gerald, Gordon, Valerie and Audrey. Clifford was the youngest member of the family.
