Gift Aid

Thank you to all those members who completed and returned the Gift Aid Declaration forms that were sent out earlier in the year. The SIFD's first claim to repayment in respect of subscription income is now being submitted.

If anyone who did not complete a Declaration would like to do so..... it's not too late. Just contact me for another form. Under the scheme for every £1 of subscription you have paid we can reclaim 28p, if you are eligible and complete the form. That's £4.79 on a £17 subscription, and £3.80 on a £13.50 subscription, (and more on the new family membership).

Once you've completed a Declaration and sent it to me you do not have to do anything else. However if you are a Higher Rate taxpayer and want to claim relief for your subscription against the higher rates you should declare the payments to HM Revenue & Customs. In this connection I have been asked to publish a note of the relevant subscription rates for the years in question. They are £17 (single town) and £13.50 (single country) for all the years covered, ie. for the year ended 31st July 2001 to date.

Notes from May's Committee Meeting

The last committee meeting was held on 13th May at Cecil Sharp House. Many items come up at each meeting, and only inch forward towards completion. **Gift Aid** is one of these. There had been no advance on the 150 people who had already responded, so Judith will now complete her application to reclaim tax from HM Revenue and Customs. Simon is preparing a new membership /renewal form to encompass the category changes agreed at the last AGM, which will include a tick box for Gift Aid agreement. We hope this will encourage more people to participate.

Money has been offered by a company wishing to use the **recordings** of two of our dances on a CD for Primary School children. We are pleased to co-operate with this venture.

Applications are arriving from groups applying for a renewal of their **Associated and Affiliated** status. A "Join Us!" leaflet is now available! Please let me know if you'd like some of these and/or some Dance With The World leaflets.

The preparations are proceeding nicely for the Cecil Sharp House **Dance** in September to celebrate 60 years. MCs, dance lists, bands, food, accommodation and ticket prices were all discussed, and decisions taken.

It was decided to make a few minor changes to the proposed **Constitution** received from the Subcommittee, circulate it once more, then send it to the News for publication in June, with notification of an EGM * to be held at Swansea in July, where the proposal to adopt the constitution will be put forward. The agenda should appear in July's News.

Big Dance Week - 15th -23rd July 2006. Janet Woolbar confirmed that eight groups have accepted her invitation to participate in a demo in the Embankment Gardens on July 16th.

Only one person had replied to the suggestion of **changing the start time** of the Sunday Dances at Cecil Sharp House – in favour. It was then suggested that just a few Dances each year could be held at an earlier time. How would you all feel about that?

It was reported that preparations for the **children's event** in June were going well, badges and certificates are being prepared for the children.

Issues had been raised on how the **website** is managed, and how a hand-over of webmaster would be achieved. As it was getting late, it was decided a document outlining possible courses of action would be circulated before the next meeting.

The **Member's Booklet** has reached the proof-reading stage – exciting times.

The Proposed Constitution

The Constitution review was supposed to address certain issues in line with the commissioned report as recommended by the AGM motion in 2004. However, other than deleting some redundant sections, it has not met the purpose intended and, in some cases, does the opposite. It is significantly worse than the existing Constitution, does not resolve any of the expected issues but instead introduces a whole raft of unforeseen changes which may or may not be intentional. The draft guarantees that situations will occur such that the Society will become ungovernable.

I had expected things like automatically granting powers to officers and honorary members to keep the Society going if the Committee became non-quorate. Where are the fail-safes that the Society will always be governable? Where are the clarification on the roles of Officers? Where are the rules for elections at other times of year? What are the roles of Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary now? Where are the forward looking ideas? - the one new item is a way of dissolving the Society!

Some unforeseen changes are that the Chairman, Treasurer and Secretary are to be elected by the Committee and not by members, affiliated delegates no longer can vote in elections, branches may not send a delegate to Committee meetings, groups of five or more members of affiliated groups will not get reduced entry to SIFD events, the News is under threat, and the list goes on...

The lack of time for proper debate is bad considering there are many changes that need proper consultation and separate debates. A vote on a subject as far ranging as this should be decided by postal ballot with enough time for members to discuss and comment. A new Constitution should be looking to keeping the Society going for the next 60 years and this needs ideas from everybody not just a small group. I would therefore urge the General meeting to reject this proposed constitution.

It's time to bring the Society into the 21st Century. An efficient way forward is through an Internet forum (e.g. http;//boards.interfolk.co.uk) allowing a larger proportion of the membership to become involved. Each section of the proposed draft can be thoroughly reviewed by 'many eyes' before being submitted to the membership as a whole. Members could see and be involved in a more democratic process, contributing to and understanding the reasoning and the discussions for each change. People with better skills and knowledge of this type of project need to be involved.

A few examples of the many errors and ambiguities are:

- 1) References to sections that have been deleted (4.2 Branch rules, 9.8 Standing Orders)
- 2) references to a 'SIFD teacher' have been replaced by 5.6 'from any Teacher approved by the Executive Committee', 6.2 'from an approved Teacher' and 7.7 'subcommittee which shall determine the standard of teaching and shall keep and publish an official list of Approved Teachers' with unchanged 6.1 ii)'acceptable as a Teacher' the same term (Approved Teacher) should be used throughout to indicate that they are the same (if indeed that is the intent).
- 3) 2.2 'which may include a periodical', 5.7 'Affiliated Groups or Classes shall be entitled to receive two copies of the Society's printed periodical.' 6.1.a 'be entitled to receive a copy of any printed periodical on behalf of the Group or Class which is additional to their own copy as a member' ambiguous entitlements to receive the News that now 'may' not be produced at all?
- 4) If the Committee become non-quorate, no election can be called as elections are annual.
- 5) The Executive Committee shall consist of ten members elected annually by postal ballot (but nominees no longer have to be members!). So if there are not 10, they cannot form the Committee. If they are 10, they 'will make decisions by a simple majority' so what if there is 5/5 split?
- 6) The committee 'may co-opt up to three members who do not have a vote' (so cannot fulfil their role as Trustees of the Society!), but the 'committee shall consist of 10 members elected annually'
- 7) The Committee are no longer bound to obey motions agreed at General Meetings

Nightmare scenario: 20 members call for and attend a General Meeting. 11 members vote to add an amendment to any motion to dissolve the Society and give the money to an eligible charity and pass it, dissolving the Society irrevocably - no postal ballot of members, no going back, The End!

Rainmakers celebrate 30 years

Foundation. Rainmakers started when Jill Bransby moved to Letchworth in 1976. She had danced in Cambridge with Kathy Tribe and wanted to continue international dancing. The idea of starting a group crystallised into action when she met Roy and Renée Bowtell and Gordon and Dalphine Stacey at the local English dance club. The five founder members launched Rainmakers on 10 September 1976 in Stevenage. Mayim mayim was an early and popular dance, which coincided with the breaking of the long drought of that hot summer – the name of the group chose itself.

Also notable was the formation of the band Cloudburst, again on the initiative of Jill, in 1977. Cloudburst still plays for both international and English dances, and has performed at the Eastbourne festival.

Regular activities. The group has met every Friday, apart from in August, at Christmas and on Good Friday, since 1976, with Jill teaching the vast majority of evenings. Many Fridays in August have been Garden Evenings where we meet in a member's garden, before adjourning for refreshments. The group has taken part in some 150 displays and demonstrations, from old peoples' homes, fetes and pubs to the Embankment Gardens, the Barbican and Covent Garden. The regular display at the Hitchin Gathering each March was a real stimulus to meetings in the spring term and made us work at improving our dance skills. Another stimulus has been the annual, and usually excellent, day courses by SIFD teachers, including the present SIFD Chairman, Janet Woolbar, on numerous occasions. These, together with evening workshops and other sources, mean that Rainmakers have learnt 512 dances, from four continents.

Structure. Rainmakers has always been a members club, run by an elected committee. Five chairmen have served after Jill's initial 13 year term. We do not pay club teachers. The club has developed a strong tradition that all members help, so the committee, while necessarily hard working, gets much support. Apart from early jumble sales and a couple of grants for equipment, the club has been financially self supporting and charges modest fees – an encouragement to the new members we are always looking for.

Highlights. There have been many highlights, from the sublime to the ridiculous. In the latter was the occasion when Henry Lee stood on Jill's skirt just as he lifted her up into the air in front of an attentive audience of several hundred people at the Gathering – at least dancers have quick reactions! Our tour in 1994 to Bingen in Germany for their Wine Festival, with several displays in front of large audiences, many of whom had enjoyed the local produce to the full, was a test, as was an interview of Jill in German where she didn't speak a word of the language. Less friendly was the riot that broke out when some drunken youths gate crashed a dance Rainmakers were leading in Hemel Hempstead in 1989. But most memorable was the near appearance of Rainmakers on the Barrymore show. Several days of rehearsal and instruction, and then a long day of filming ended on the cutting room floor. This was a relief, given the likely reaction of SIFD members to Rainmakers being asked to dance Kreuz Koenig to the music of Hammersmiths!

Links with SIFD. Rainmakers has supported SIFD in many ways, and has benefited from many of SIFD activities. Jill Bransby was Chairman of the Society from 1991 to 1995 and has contributed as caller, teacher and as choreographer for the 1985 Albert Hall display. Claire Steeley has run the Society's shop for the last 12 years. The leader of the Society's band, Martin Butler, came to international music through Cloudburst and Rainmakers – we are grateful to him for playing at many Rainmakers dances and displays.

Anniversary year. Members wanted to celebrate their enjoyment of dancing over 30 years by doing something for others less fortunate than themselves, as well as more usual activities. A quiz night held on 20 May, which was organised by Julie Brix and her team, raised some £600 for our local

hospice, the one at which long standing and recently deceased member Adrian Barter was a volunteer. Other activities include a walk/display//pub lunch, a boat trip, a visit to a show, and production of a special T-shirt/sweatshirt.

Anniversary Dance. The biggest event of our anniversary year will be our dance on 28 October. Called by Jill Bransby, with music by Cloudburst, it will be a lively evening. We warmly welcome all SIFD members to come and help us celebrate. The dance is at St Ippolytes Parish Hall and costs £6 – tickets from Richard Thom on 01438 316651.

It was most unfortunate that the proposed Constitution attached to last month's News appeared without the article which should have accompanied it. This would have told you that it was enclosed for your consideration, in accordance with the terms of reference of the Constitution revue, and that it was planned to hold an EGM at the Summer School in July to discuss it, and hopefully propose its adoption (depending of course on the volume and nature of proposed amendments). Comments and proposed amendments were invited, which would have been considered prior to the meeting.

However, as most of you will have been unaware of this, and to give proper time to consider all the suggestions, it is now recognised that it will not be appropriate to propose adoption of the draft at an EGM held so soon. Instead, it is proposed to discuss the progress of the new Constitution so far, from 4-5pm on July 28th at Swansea. We will keep you in touch as the new Constitution progresses, and hope to propose its adoption later this year.

More Memories by Ken

With all stage or arena productions there can be unforeseen difficulties. Groups can be late, causing an embarrassing silence in the arena. Sometimes groups got lost in the underground labyrinth, and although there were people to take them to their entry point, they sometimes decided to find their own way. Once at least there was a large bang when one of the antiquated arch lamps blew. The dancers stopped as the music was not loud enough. But there were also some embarrassing moments to be laughed at after the event.

On one occasion when Lucille Armstrong's Iberian group were dancing a Portuguese item, poor Pamela lost one of her many skirts which fell about her ankles. She calmly stepped out of it and continued to dance. After a few minutes she lost another which she calmly kicked out of the way. Then there was a third which was greeted at first with laughter and then with applause as she stepped out of and continued to dance. This was the only review the Society ever had in the then notorious News of the World.

At one show the Oxford group had been invited to dance Serbian dances many of which were new to the Society. For the occasion the men of the Zivko Firfov group (then called Opanki) danced the men's line dance, Sopsko kolo. The men grasp each others belts and the line moves backwards and forwards very quickly, and does improvisations on the spot which are called by the centre dancer. Unfortunately during a squatting figure one of the centre belts snapped and the men landed on their posteriors, legs in the air. A makeshift repair was carried out and the dance restarted. Diverting for one moment, the same dance met with another misfortune at a concert arranged by the Holiday Fellowship Association at the Royal Festival Hall. Roly had made us some Serbian trousers from some old blankets that I had dyed blue. Unfortunately during the squat the back seams came apart and our white shirts were sticking out. Luckily it was on stage and we managed to finish the dance and exit sideways. (The girls who were sitting behind could hardly contain their mirth) However, back to the show and I believe it was the Brazilian item. At the end of the item there was a traditional carnival dance, called "Fedo", a madly improvised dance in which the men hold tatty old large umbrellas. At one point Mourrie's umbrella collapsed around him and all that could be seen was a pair of tiny legs under the umbrella - Mourrie was a very small person.!

For one reason or another it became more and more difficult to find the resources to produce these large scale productions and they were abandoned. Specialised groups were emerging as some members of the Society wanted to develop their interests in a particular area in more depth and to pay more attention to the appropriate style of dancing; which had been the intention of the Friday advanced class that no longer existed. The classes of the SIFD had come under the umbrella of the Inner London Education Authority, which brought about many changes. More on this later. Several specialised groups emerged in which members did not have to be members of the Society. There existed already well established groups that had been around for a number of years. To name a few, The Balalika Russian group, the Bulgarian group, the Czeckoslovakian group, and the Iberian group.

The Harrow Green and Hornchurch groups continued to exist. The Balkan class (Zivko Firfov group) and L'Escargot French group (Simon and Joan Guest) had total or predominantly SIFD members. Some groups formed up as and when needed, Swedish and Austrian, and others. Narendra Kotiyan (Dunav Band) organised several international dance concerts at various Town Halls in London and elsewhere. During the 1970s the Zivko Firfov group was large enough to mount a complete show, with its own musicians playing traditional instruments and a sufficient collection of authentic costumes in sets to perform dances from different regions. It also joined up with the Polish group (run by Betty Harvey) to put on shows.
