Once again the Eastbourne festival was a success and I want to pass on my appreciation and thanks to all those who made it possible and most of all to those who bought a ticket.

It begins when Helen Ezra staggers in under an enormous load of sound equipment (and this time also with a heavy box of old SIFD News for me to trawl through - more of that later \*). Then the first band of helpers pitched in to decorate the hall, and Rowena mustered her stewarding forces.

We had the benefit of brilliant teachers: Delyan, Cristina, Angie, Helena (and Ian), and musicians Dancho, Roger, Narendra, (and Ian), held together by MCs Julie, Brian (and Ian).

There were dance displays to delight us while we gasped for air and gulped water; Helena and her two guitarists performed for us on Saturday, and a local Eastbourne bellydance group, The Sea Gypsies, also entertained us. On Sunday The Morena Dance Company performed Slovakian dances and taught a dance which some of us attempted with varying degrees of success. Delyan gave an impromptu virtuoso display of Bulgarian dance accompanied by Dancho on accordion.

But the prize for fun must go to Ian - see cartoons below (\*from the box), for another workshop of what I now see as 'alternative' dance, but was apparently SIFD staple diet back in the days of yore, when men were men and maids were....

So, having given my all over the weekend, and enthusiastically stamped my way through an afternoon of flamenco, I spent an entire day resting my limbs and reading \*the entire box....



\*The box of old issues spanned four decades and were always informative on all matters relating to international folk dancing. Nevertheless, I noticed that the 60s had great humour, the 70s became very serious, then the humour returned in the 80s (hairdressers at the Albert Hall... I may treat you to a repeat of that one if there is an article drought).

Reading the sequence of News issues (Lily Avery was Secretary first, Assistant Editor and then Editor for thirtyseven years) was rather like following a 'soap' with characters taking centre stage and then exiting (sometimes tragically). There were announcements of engagements, then marriages and births; people left London and spread international folk dancing around not just Britain but the world.

But for me the main interest was visual, like the cartoons above which fit Ian Willson's 'Golden Oldies' workshop at Eastbourne so aptly! And also lots of cover designs illustrating various regional costumes by Caroline Thomas and Lesley Boorer and 'Anonymous'(!),some of which will be making a comeback.

## The Founding of Woodvale International Folk Dance Group in 1968

We were so pleased to attend the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations of Woodvale IFDG, the Group we founded jointly with Eileen and Ernie Nolan, and now one of the Society's longer-established groups.

Ian and I moved to Kent in 1967 – Eileen & Ernie already lived in Borough Green, Kent. There was a harvest festival celebration advertised at the local Church in Borough Green – during the evening there was to be a demonstration of international folk dancing given by a group based in Gravesend. The four of us were intrigued by this (having danced in London with the SIFD and Harrow Green for many years), so we attended the evening, which was a great success. Unfortunately we cannot now remember the name of the group or the person who ran it.

The people from the Church were very enthusiastic about the dancing and we told them that we could also do this. After a discussion with the Minister he offered us free use of the church hall until the end of the year, so we were ready to have a go. Between us we had antiquated equipment but quite a lot of records, so the first task was to record as much as we could onto a reel to reel tape recorder. Ian had his accordion, but at that time he wasn't as proficient as he is now.

Eileen & Ernie worked in Borough Green so knew many people, which was a great help. We had quite a lot of support in those first few weeks from the adults, many of whom had families, and so with their help the group began to thrive, and quite a lot of youngsters joined us; Alan Cant (now Chairman), two of his sisters and two brothers came also; Jan Bryce, a committee member today, and members of other families too numerous to mention. By January 1968 we decided to set the Group up properly – this meant we needed a name, so there was a competition and one of the youngsters suggested 'Woodvale'; she won a year's free membership to the group.

And so Woodvale was born, and thanks to its ever-enthusiastic members, the Group thrives to this day. Our active involvement in the running of the Group came to an end in 1974, when we moved to Harrogate, but not before Woodvale became twinned with a large group of similarly aged young people in the Champagne Region, "Association Folklorique Chalonnaise". The twinning ceremony took place in 1973 at Borough Green, (with Bert Price officiating), and in Chalons-sur-Marne (now Chalons-en-Champagne), one year later. Ian and I still maintain links with Jacqueline Prieto, the founder of AFC, and a few of the original Woodvale members are still in touch with friends made at that time.

We look forward to another celebratory get-together with the Group, when we meet up at the Alnwick International Music Festival in August for a few days of dance and reminiscence!

Roy Bowtell died of liver cancer on April 9<sup>th</sup>, aged 80. Those members, who are even older than I am, will remember Roy dancing in the early SIFD days, especially with the YHA. I first met Roy in May, 1976 when I moved from Cambridge to North Hertfordshire and joined the Staplers English Dance Club in Hitchin. By coincidence, Roy and Renee (his ex-wife) and Gordon and Dalphine Stacey, had also joined the Staplers that May so it was then that we discovered we were all keen International Folk Dancers. We were the founder members of Rainmakers, formed in September 1976.





Roy was a very enthusiastic and skilled dancer who contributed to the Rainmakers in many ways. He served on committees, helped to raise funds with our jumble sales and was always on hand as a loyal member of our club. He took part in so many displays – I looked in my photo albums to find a suitable picture of Roy for this article and in every album, until very recently,

there is a picture of Roy dancing his heart out. When we went out on a day of dance, or to a festival, or wherever with Roy, we always had fun.

## Thoughts on the Polonaise

In 1951 I was with a group of students from Balls Park Teacher Training College who were invited on an exchange visit to German students from a similar college in Osnabruck.

We arrived just in time to be included in the student 'going down' ball which was being held in Celle Castle. We were all very tired after our long journey and, I must admit, that much as I love dancing I can't remember much about the actual ball – it was all just a daze. But I do remember very well when everybody went out into the magnificent grounds of the castle. A large orchestra had assembled and was preparing to play. We were all partnered off to dance the polonaise to beautiful music in that wonderful setting.

I have never forgotten the magic of that time - lines and lines of people dancing in unison with as many as 16 couples abreast with so much room. That was my introduction to polonaise and I was hooked from then on.

The next year, on leaving college, I became a member of the SIFD. I had watched the SIFD shows in the Albert Hall as a schoolgirl and I remember always looking for Bert Price and Philip Thornton! Imagine my surprise when I attended German language classes at Goldsmith's college and Bert arrived to teach us German dances. (He was a neighbour of the German teacher.) Bert took me along to Carlisle School in Chelsea where the SIFD classes were held in those days and from then on this was my life!

At the Polish YMCA Dance group I rediscovered the polonaise usually lead by Kostek Siemasko and often by Bert. Later I joined a new Polish group called Opoczno which, when it was disbanded, gave rise to Syrenka (little mermaid) led by the very charismatic Josef Walczac (Zuitek). Simon and I enjoyed a very long association with this group and later when Zuitek went to Australia we took over the group and taught there for nearly 20 years.

With Syrenka we danced and taught, among many other Polish dances, the Polonaise – not as a dance for everybody but as a choreographed dance for a given number of couples. With beautiful costumes and lovely music this was always attractive and very regal. I always understood that the Polish court and, indeed, many other European courts would compose music and formations of the 'Polish Dance' in order to show off costumes and partners.

At the SIFD Summer Schools, originally in Swansea, the Polonaise started by being danced by those in costume so that the others could admire them! Over the years everybody, in costume or not, joined in and the cake procession was introduced.
