SIFD Chairman's Report 2008

My general impression of the year is of great energy and activity to be seen in many of the local groups which are the lifeblood of our Society, and in the flourishing summer school. Unfortunately it is increasingly difficult to match that inspiration in the central work of the Society. Constitutions and committees can seem boring stuff but they are essential for the effectiveness of your Society and its vital role in promoting the international folk dance movement in this country. And we do have some successes!

Some activities during the year

Sunday dances - The experiment of some early-start Sunday dances has been continued. They attract younger dancers and also may be more convenient for members who wish to come from outside London.

Publications - We have had a boost in sales, as members replaced their tapes with the Society's new CDs, thanks to the work of transcribing. We are still working on the production of a new set of dances, P10.

Bingolotto - We have invited bids from local groups to make use of the £1000+ from the first round of the Bingolotto scheme. The result has been a resounding silence. The committee has ideas for using some of the money but it would be much better if local groups could take it up to boost their outreach activities. If we are unable to make good use of the money we shall have to pay it back and participation in the next phase would seem problematic. So, groups, please get in your bids. Summer School - In July we had another successful summer school. It was Dorien Bates' first as organiser and her efficiency and good planning (particularly compared to her predecessor - and I am allowed to say that!) greatly improved the smooth running and enjoyment of the event. I'd like to express my thanks to the team, Dorien, our leader, Peter Bransby who looked after the money, Jill Bransby who organised the publicity and Janet Woolbar who recruited the teachers. Newsletter - All members will have appreciated Janet Douglas' work as the editor of this newsletter.

She has kept up the high standards we have been used to and has introduced some useful innovations. The colour covers are a much welcomed innovation.

Looking ahead

As well as the continuing work on producing P10 and on Bingolotto, we are also seeking a volunteer to complete the work we have done so far on producing a policy and code of practice for working with children and vulnerable adults.

We have accepted with gratitude Janet Douglas' offer to organise the SIFD contribution to the National Festival of Movement & Dance, 2010. This important event is organised by the CCPR Movement & Dance Division on which we are represented.

Running your Society

No report of the year would be complete without paying tribute to the hard work done on your behalf by your committee and by a number of other members who work outside the committee on behalf of the Society. Just to mention some key people: Judith Payling continues to keep our finances in order. This year she also steered a change of our bank accounts to the Charity Aid Foundation Bank which is geared to the needs of charitable bodies and pays a good rate of interest. Anyone who has changed banks in recent years will appreciate her patience and persistence in completing that process. Thanks to Alison Scrimshaw who stood down as Secretary at the end of 2007 but continues as an active member of the committee. Fran Crawley took over and we are very grateful for the work she does for us. Fran is unable to attend committee meetings but still manages to keep track of our agendas and the between meetings activities.

The new constitution has now bedded in and with some helpful amendments the standing orders were agreed at the AGM. But it still is not bringing the new blood into the working of the Society. With Bob Robinson's resignation from the committee for pressure of his work we are in danger of moving back towards being a committee made up of London members who have given long willing and faithful service to the Society but increasingly need a break. Yet again we fell short of nominations for the 10 places at the 2008 AGM.

So we remain in the ironic position of having spare money but lacking the willing volunteers to use it. We shall have an opportunity to have another look at the constitution when we consider the costs and benefits of becoming an incorporated charity under the 2006 Charities Act; when the time comes we shall, of course, consult the membership. Some way we have to recruit new members to the committee if the Society is to survive and continue to help keep alive the international folk dance movement in this country. Can YOU help? Your Society needs you.

Dance Around The World October 2008

The Dance Around The World festival took place at Cecil Sharp House on 25 and 26 October 2008 and I think it is worth a mention. I saw it all. I thought it was a wonderful festival that was better than ever. I felt that in general standards of performance and presentation were higher. The organising team (OT) dug deep into the dance archaeology of London and the surrounding areas to unearth a splendid diverse treasure trove of dance. About 50 dance clubs displayed and that included some very interesting new groups that we had not seen before. Approximately a quarter of all the clubs were affiliated to the SIFD. It was a great opportunity to see what a lot of the SIFD in the south east do.

Both days started at 10.00am with general dancing for all and then there were continual displays from 11.00am to 7.0pm. During this time each participating club also taught a one hour workshop in either Storrow or Trefusis and these workshops were good and well attended. There was also a musicians' workshop. Saturday evening was given over to Latin American events which were effervescent, fun and very popular. On Sunday evening there was a lecture/conference in Trefusis and also, in the main hall, an international barn dance with Cloudburst band and Anne Leach and Brenda Godrich as callers. It was strictly not elegant but boisterous jolly come dancing.

The OT could face problems in the future because of the increasing popularity of the festival. For example in previous years clubs were allowed a display time of 30 minutes. In 2008 this was cut to 20 minutes. Further reductions could cause difficulties.

The OT have evolved a new pioneering style of economic management which could be a template for other institutions and organisations to follow. It avoids the perils of the wild and volatile instability of the global monetary system. They have turned to barter. It more or less works like this. They say to dance clubs that we will not pay you fees or expenses with filthy lucre but if you come and display and take a workshop you will get in return a free entrance ticket for your performers to enjoy the days events, also possible interest from other dancers in joining your club, and, above all, the sincere admiration and applause from an audience of fellow dancers. Sometimes, but not often, the festival suffers a form of credit crunch: i.e. a club does not turn up. An emergency rescue operation is put into action. An expert gets the audience to come onto the floor for some general dancing which they like and credit is restored.

Planning the festival and running it over the weekend must be time consuming, very hard work and also stressful because the OT is dealing with so many clubs and people. I picture them as being exhausted at the end of the festival and being in need of a visit to a five star spa hotel for a month for rest, relaxation and recuperation and especially counselling to inspire them to do it all again next October for our enjoyment.

Christmas Dance in North Norfolk

One of the highlights of the dancing year for Jelenka, North Norfolk Balkan Dancing, is our now regular and popular dance workshop on the weekend in between Christmas and New Year. This year we invited Frank Dowling, who made the journey from Middlesborough by First Class train to Cromer (which by some quirk of the rail ticketing system was cheaper than second class to Kings Lynn – a shorter journey!)

Over twenty dancers came from as far afield as Diss, Yarmouth, Wisbech and Norwich despite the possibility of icy roads after a very cold night. They were welcomed with hot drinks and biscuits, before, being suitably fortified, they began the dancing day.

Frank's teaching was very clear and easy to follow, delivered in a relaxed and humorous manner. There was a concentration on authentic folk dance rather than choreographed material with a wealth of interesting background information on the dance, music, culture and country of origin which attested to his thorough preparation and knowledge.

The eleven dances he taught from Romania, Croatia, Bulgaria, Serbia, Turkey and Brittany presented us with a great variety of apparently accessible and uncomplicated dances, with approachable basic steps, to which he skilfully gradually added more challenging elements of foot and arm co-ordination, and finer points of style, to finally give us some great enjoyable dances that will reward our further attention and practice.

So many thanks to Frank for his excellent teaching on what proved to be an extremely enjoyable day. We are looking forward to our next day workshop with Cathy Meunier on Saturday 25th April – why not come and join us?
