Jugoslav Dance

The former Jugoslavia was about the same size as the UK but with huge mountainous regions and plains, and a long Adriatic coast with about a hundred islands. The present republics are contained within the same area.

It has been said that the new republics, formally autonomous republics within Jugoslavia, have a folk culture worthy of a continent in its richness and diversity, a mosaic. The tribal Slavic groups of Slovenes, Croats, Serbs, and Macedonians, absorbed the cultures of the existing inhabitants and those of the neighbouring Slovaks, Hungarians, Austrians, Italians, Romanians, Albanians, and the occupying Turks.

Some of the oldest dances in Europe are to be found in the mountainous regions inland from the famous Adriatic Sea, and hundreds of dances have been notated and filmed since the 1930s notably by the Serbian Djankovic sisters who published eight books, with dance and music notation. Many dances are simple and easy to do. They were social dances, enabling people to chat and sing while they were dancing. Others are of a ritual nature, and others have subtle irregular rhythms and speeds.

Most of the dances are in a circle or open crescent formation, with mixed men and women formation or blocks of men and women. In some regions there are couple dances and along the coast, quadrille formations.

Shaking or trembling of the body (drmanje) are common - strong in Croatia, but lighter in other regions. Other ancient symbolic movements, i.e. kicking, jumping, squatting, limping, spinning around survive as well as movements suggesting hunting and working.

Dances identical in movement often have different names and music when used for a specific occasion. Weddings will have a bridal or mother-in-law dance, or dance No. one, two, three and so on.

In Croatia the dances usually use the drmanje in a closed circle sometimes with jumping and kicking (dučeč and staro sito), Slavonsko kolo with blocks of men and women in a closed circle, and Repa with couples in a closed circle. In the north and some coastal areas independent couples. In the coastal areas quadrilles in the towns (Dubrovnic, Trogir, Split for example). In the remote inland mountainous regions and in Bosnia are the ancient silent circle dances, Vrličo kolo, Ličko kolo, and Glamoć.

In Serbia there is U šest, Žikino, Šetnja. Čačac, and in the north the couple dance Bunjevačko momacko kolo, in the south Vranjanka, and dances with a muslim influence. In the border with Bulgaria the men's line dance Sopsko kolo.

In the Kosovo metohija region (Kosovo), with a majority Shiptar (indiginous Albanian population) there are combat dances for two men, and the wedding dance, Šota.

Macedonia is noted for the social dance Makedonsko, and numerous social dances, Potrčano, Struga, Kucano, Skudrinka. There are the special dances, Nevestinsko oro and Dračevsko, (weddine dances) Kalajdžiskoto (tinsmiths' dance), Stara tikveško (rush mat makers' dance), Teškoto (the heavy dance), Aramiskoto (the brigands' dance), Pajduška, Rusalj, (ritual men's sword dance).
