Ibrahim Rizevski

Ibrahim was born in Belgrade and has a strong background in Yugoslavian folk culture. He started dancing in the Lola Ribar folk dance ensemble in 1972. From 1977 until 1987, he was assistant artistic director and dance teacher of Lola Ribar. The ensemble held over 1200 performances all over the world. From 1978 - 1980 he was artistic director of a Yugoslavian military state folk dance ensemble. As dancer, dance teacher, choreographer, and musician, he worked with the National Theatre in Belgrade, Ensemble Renaissance, Radio Belgrade, rock group of Goran Bregovic, and others.

In 1983 Ibrahim graduated in ethnology at the Philosophy University in Belgrade. He then worked as Curator in the Ethnography Museum in Belgrade in 1985.

Ibrahim came to Switzerland in 1987 and taught dances in the Yugoslav folk dance ensemble Sloga in Zurich for ten years. He has contributed to many folk dance seminars on Serbian and Macedonian folk dances, in France, Holland, Sweden, Switzerland and the UK.

Some of our SIFD members have met Ibrahim at the Eastbourne International Dance Festival and enjoyed his expert teaching of Macedonian dancing in 2003 and Yugoslavian dancing in 2006. At Swansea Ibrahim will be sharing his knowledge of Macedonian dancing with us.

<u>Competitions</u> <u>Competitions</u>

The folk dance group competitions, adult and children, are recorded by our official press representative at the Eisteddfod, George Sweetland, but it fell to me – with my notorious lack of expertise – to put on record the folk instrumental, solo folk dance and duo and trio folk dance competitions. The comments below are based on the adjudications rather than my judgement. In the past these competitions have each sent three or four finalists to competition on the pavilion stage, recently as part of the evening performances. The nature of these evening concerts has changed towards a greater involvement of professional groups so this year the three competitions were held entirely away from the pavilion stage with only the winner of each appearing in an evening concert. Sadly the folk song groups competition was cancelled for lack of competitors.

Instrumental Folk Solo or Group

This was held in the hall of Dinas Bran secondary school. The arrangements are now much better than formerly and the attendance of spectators is no longer on sufferance. As usual a number of groups failed to appear and there were only five competitors. Adjudicators: Elinor Bennett and Michel Camatte.

Ranjit Singh (India) played the Saranji, a stringed instrument from the Punjab, with bells on the bow handle (photo). The adjudicators commented on the interesting instrument and the authenticity of the performance. It was a good choice of programme and the player created a poetic atmosphere.

<u>Lot Tin Kun</u> (Hong Kong, China) played a reed pipe somewhat similar to a Zurna. The adjudicators appreciated the assured enthusiastic performance which demanded listening and sounded extempore.

91 marks, 2nd place.



Artsphere, (Singapore), divided into two groups. The first group gave a polished performance on a range of string (plucked) instruments, with percussion and a small pipe. The adjudicators commented on the polished and rehearsed performance and the use of music, giving it a classic rather than folk quality.

The second Artsphere group, the <u>Chamber Ensemble</u>, had a different selection of instruments, with a large drum, a flute, gong, cymbals, and an ancient handheld organ-like instrument (banbura? see photo). The adjudicators appreciated the dramatic opening and the virtuosity.

92 marks, 1st place.

<u>Kurdish Folk Dance Group</u> (London) performed with four baglamas (lute-like string instruments - photo), a nei, a zurna and a davul (open drum). Adjudication: good interaction and contrast, but some lack of tuning.

four baglamas (lutelavul (open drum). e lack of tuning. 88 marks, 3rd place.

Individual Folk Dance

This competition also took place at Dinas Bran School. The adjudicators, Dick van der Vooren and Cliff Jones were impressed by the quality of performance, considering it the best ever solo competition. They expressed their difficulty in interpreting the Indonesian hand movements as an example of the complexity of adjudicating a wide range of cultural traditions. The competitors, with the adjudicators' comments were:

Gurpreet Singh Dhindsa (Gurman Folk Dance Academy, Barnala, India)

Beautiful and impressive from the start but attempted too much and exaggerated too much. 89.

Berdan Arslan (Kurdish Folk Dance Group, London)

Exciting presentation using the whole body. Good interaction with musician and audience. 94, 1st

Declan McGarry (Loughgiel Folk Dancers, Ballymena, NI)

Stepping delightful and rhythm spot on.

93, 2nd

Rupinder Singh (Surtal Sabhiachar, Mansa, India)

Started with back to audience and finished weakly, but in between a wonderful display with very good relation to audience.

Sitras Anjilin (Java, Indonesia)

The masked silent dance used the body to tell a story.

Wangi Indriya (Java, Indonesia)

Beautiful hand movements enhanced by singing.

Fajar Astriada (Java, Indonesia)

Expressive, very masculine character, earthy and basic.

Folk Dance Duo/Trio

This competition took place in the Town Hall which is a better setting than the school hall. It is more intimate and the gallery provides a better vantage point than the floor of the school hall. The adjudicators were Ed Austin and Dick van der Vooren. Ed commented on the very high standard, notably the good use of the stage, including overcoming the difficulty of dancing on a raked stage. There was good characterisation and story telling and a high standard of music.

Leisa Gillan and Lynsey Graham (Loughgiel, Ballymena, NI)

Movement light and authentic, good use of steps and interesting partner work well done.

93, 2nd

Sitras Anjilin, Wangi Indriya and Fajar Astriada (Java, Indonesia)

Picturesque and very complex. Good vocalisation and movement of masks.

Gursenwak Singh Sidhu, Gurpreet Singh Dhindsa and Jabir Singh Byllar (Gurman Folk Dance Academy, Barnal, India)

Less interaction, three dancers side by side, but made to look easy, which it was not..

Berdan Arslan, Guney Kurtaran and Guzde Sarhan (Kurdish Folk Dance Group, London)

Good footwork and changes of step, but occasional uncertainties.

Adela Dancovicova, Artem Cherkas and Stanislav Stasek (Jskra, Pilsen, Czech Republic)

Telling a story. Well acted, natural and genuine. The trio worked well together and there was a lot of dance.

94, 1st

<u>Uergen Onyschenko</u>, <u>Artem Cherkas and Oleksandra Sakharna</u> (Ukraine)

Two shepherds and a girl: athletic performance, but some weakness in their partnership.

Iurii Ushakov and Maxim Kuznetsov (Ukraine)

Fighting scene, confident and expressive. Very good use of the stage.

Choreographed Folk Dance

This was on the Pavilion stage but four groups took part in a preliminary round at Dinas Bran School, on the floor of the hall rather than the stage, giving the necessary space for the larger groups, but depriving the audience of a good view. Two groups went forward to the finals.

This fairly recent addition to the Llangollen programme has had some success in giving an alternative opportunity for more stagey presentations leaving the Adult Folk Dance Group competition to those with an authentic traditional style, though some groups still end up in the wrong competition. The adjudicators commented on Surtal Sabhiachar from Mansa, India, in the preliminary round, that their performance lacked choreography and would have been more suited to the Folk Dance Group competition. Ironically, the preliminary round resulted in the best bit of real folk dance in the whole week. While the competitors were waiting for the adjudication Dancing Anatolia (Kurdish, London) started to dance on the floor of the hall. Gradually the other groups joined in until there was a wonderful spontaneous village atmosphere.

The comments of the adjudicators, Dick van der Vooren, Ed Austin and Anca Giurchescu. on the finalists follow with the marks:

Kalynonka (Kyiv, Ukraine)

In their first piece, Na Ivana Kupala, they did not make good use of the stage, but their Gopak showed a high standard of technique. They lost a mark for over-running time.

Kurdish Folk Dance Group (London)

High standard with new elements in their presentation and they clearly shared pleasure.

Loughgiel Folk Dancers (Ballymena, NI)

Instruments of Ireland. Wonderful dancing with new approaches and a variety of movements. 89

Veselka (Ukraine, Ashton-under-Lyne) from the preliminary round.

Kosaks and Metelyry. A good example of a staged Ukrainian presentation. The music was limited and more attention was needed to technique and training.

Orlyk Ukrainian Folk Dance Group (Manchester)

Za la Ytsianna and Na Levadev. Impressive, well-rehearsed and polished. Not so spectacular but balanced and well-performed. Variation of costume.

Gurman Folk Dance Academy (Barnala, India)

Exuberant and outgoing. Well executed, showing individuality within the ensemble. Simple and effective.

Hornsey Ataturk School (Turkish Republic of N Cyprus, London)

Well thought-out production and good use of stage. Appropriate choreography well-executed. 84

Pro Musica (Michalovske, Slovakia) from the preliminary round

Brilliant choreography, beautifully executed. Fitting high quality for this competition. 93, 1st

I think most people - in most of our SIFD groups will be familiar with his name, his kindness and his dance expertise.

Sadly, Stan died on Sunday, August 30th in Hospital. He had been suffering greatly - and patiently - hoping to come back home, but it was not to be. His family had all come home - Denise, his elder daughter in Birmingham, Rachael from the U.S.A., and Michael from France and we must all be thankful, whilst grieving, for the support they gave their father and are giving their mother, Jean.

For those who did not know Stan, I must explain that although Selpar grew into part of a Branch, no branch can flourish without a firm Root. Stan actually was, with Jean at the very root of our 36 years of activity in the West Midlands. Late in the 1960's - about 1969, I was asked to teach some dances at our Church Harvest Festival celebration. "Oh, I wish we could do more" was the call from Jean and Stan. Through the help of Margery Latham (S.I.F.D.) and Celia Hodges (Sports Council) we were able to start a class in 1973 at Selly Park School in Birmingham - hence the name of what was to become the first 3 groups which together were called the West Midlands Branch in 1978.

Despite serious surgery many years ago, Stan continued to dance and was invaluable in all our demonstrations in the Central Hall and other grand occasions. His good humour, awareness of other people, the help he offered to all and his warmth, along with his unstinting support of the group will be remembered for a long, long time, as will the loyalty to me, personally.

He, and Jean, should have been with us at our coming weekend in Derbyshire. They will be so very missed.

At the August Bank Holiday, 35 dancers, mostly from the South of England, met at Plumpton College at the foot of the South Downs for our 12th weekend of dancing and singing. The sessions covered many types of dance including Russian, Romanian, Armenian, Bulgarian, Greek, Turkish and Israeli as well as English Folk, modern line dance and Circle Dance – in fact anything that anyone wanted to bring. Kris Lee led the singers who performed Ajde red se redat, Oro se Vie and Lo Yisa Goy for dancing in the final session.

On the free afternoon a group visited the College's Small Animal Centre which is home to a baby skunk among other more or less appealing creatures. There was also time to explore the South Downs and other local walks.

The new accommodation block was spacious and comfortable, with most rooms enjoying lovely views. The College's catering staff fed us very well indeed with three meals a day including cooked breakfast, plus refreshments available 24/7.

Involving as many people as possible in leading the dances results in a relaxed and friendly atmosphere where no-one feels left out, and we are grateful that so many give freely of their knowledge, expertise, and effort.

At the end we came away tired but happy, having renewed or made new friendships through living and dancing together over the three days of the Festival, and we go back to our regular dance groups refreshed, and sometimes even inspired to try something new.

P.S. Thank you to those who responded to the questionnaire. The result indicates that there would not be enough support for two Mini Festivals a year, so we shall continue as before, with the August one.


