Calling - Some Considerations

Which dances are suitable to call?

When is it appropriate to call?

What is the difference between calling and leading?

Can we call from the floor?

How do we go about it?

(This document is concerned with calling one dance rather than planning a whole evening's dancing)

- 1. Planning make sure you know the dance and are familiar with the music. Listen to the introduction so you know when it starts. If you have a band ask them whether it has an introduction, whether it's just a chord or how many bars etc. Work out what your dance commands will be. Remember they will have to be fairly brief when you are actually calling.
- 2. Practise calling with the music at home even it you haven't got a microphone. You could even tape yourself and play it back. Could <u>you</u> follow your instructions? Did you call sufficiently ahead of the move?
- 3. When calling you must be audible. This isn't just a matter of volume. Try to speak clearly. Don't gabble because you are nervous, try to stay calm and look and sound confident. Sometimes there is too much bass on the controls, so the voice comes out a bit muddy. Turn the bass down and the treble up. You need to be heard over the band or recording. The dynamics of the latter often varies, so you will need to be able to turn the volume of the tape up or down.
- 4. Getting the dancers on the floor. Explain the formation, and / or play the music Bands often play the dancers onto the floor not so easy with a tape recorder. If you do this don't forget to set the zero counter.
- 5. Look at the spacing. Is there room for everybody? Can you rearrange the sets, couples, circles to make better use of the available space. Are all the sets made up? Is everyone dancing who wishes to?
- 6. Walking the dance through. It may be necessary to walk it all through, or part of it through, or you might get away with brief reminder, obviously it depends on the dance and the dancers.
- 7. After a walk-through ask the dancers to go back to their original positions, if appropriate.
- 8. You may need some sort of command "O.K. music coming up", "Are you ready", You start after a short introduction etc.
- 9. Start music ("and they're off!"). Issue clear, concise commands just ahead of the moves if possible. Keep calling until you think that the dancers are confident then give them a chance to dance without the call. This is where knowing your recording helps. How many times does it go through? If the dance starts falling to bits start calling again. If you get nervous and think that you will forget a dance, you could use a crib-card. Put it somewhere you can see it a music stand can be useful.
- 10. Using the microphone. Stay behind it and don't move your mouth too much away from it, but you musn't eat it either. I prefer to use a microphone stand because it gives me free hands to alter controls, gesticulate to the band or to the dancers, look up the dance etc. It also means that you won't be tempted to walk in front of the speakers with the microphone, which causes feedback.
- 11. When the music ends, suggest that they honour their partners, if it's a partner dance. Congratulate the dancers if it was well done. You might want to repeat the dance, if so check spacing and positioning of dancers, wind back music. Did you remember to zero the clock counter? If you don't want to repeat the dance ask them to take a rest or ask them to reform themselves to the next formation that you want to call. Two dances together seems to work well.

12. Tone. Try to appear relaxed. Not easy I know, but this will give the dancers confidence and they will enjoy the dance more. If you are outwardly worrying they will worry too. If it all goes wrong, don't get cross with the dancers. They can't help having two left legs and leaving their brains at home! You will make them feel better if you don't glare or shout at them. It sometimes helps if you say something like "Sorry I obviously didn't explain that very well", "No, the other left" - You will develop your own phrases. I think you should make the dancers think that they have done well rather than that you have done well. M.C.ing is a service not an ego-trip. A good caller makes the dances appear easy and the dancers good, a bad caller makes the dances seem hard and the dancers bad. If you get some of it right some of the time, the experience is fantastic so it's worth trying.

Phonographic Performing Licence (PPL)

Some of our groups here in the South have been approached with regard to the above and payment requested!

If you receive a demand - don't panic!

If they approach you - **do nothing** - as the PPL licencing laws are due to be changed again in April. The Sussex Folk Association (SusFA), of which John and myself are committee members, has recent experience of dealing with the PPL. Many English folk dance clubs have been paying this "tax" (through the instigation of EFDSS!) for years even though they never were liable for it. SusFA has successfully guided Sussex folk clubs through the process of discontinuing PPL payment, and, importantly, the even more annoying weekly form filling.

The (European) Government have, however, moved the goal posts; now it will 'probably' be the duty of the landlords to license their premises as the PPL and PRS are 'probably' merging. The probability issue should be cleared up shortly, then we will know what we have to deal with.

In addition to the above - most of us use ancient recordings of obscure traditional musicians - or have explicit permission to use more modern recordings. Therefore even though they will no longer exempt educational and non-profit making clubs (in line with Europe) they still have to prove that one of their listed artists is being denied royalties.

I can tell you that the only folk artists registered with the PPL are 'Belthazar's Feast'. However, record labels are a different problem - but only under the PRS umbrella - more news after April.



All the children were in costume, a lot of them made by Julie, and a lot of the adults were in costume too. There were a lot of old photographs to look at and old programmes etc.. You can imagine the chatter that went on.



It was in 1965 that Alan Williams and Mavis Archer started a class for international folk dancing at Barlow Hall Evening Centre in Chorlton, Manchester. 
The Society's Shop

Riepe Riepe Garste (Netherlands)

Formation

This Dutch dance is about harvesting barley. Double Circle round the room, men on the inside, facing partner.

Instructions

- 1. Clap both hands of your partner (right on left, left on right) Clap your own hands Clap partner's right hand Clap your own hands Clap partner's left hand Clap your own hands Clap both hands of your partner (right on left, left on right) Clap your own hands
 - 2. Swing right arm over your front like a swimming crawl Swing left arm over your front
 - 3. Repeat part 2
 - 4. Repeat 1 to 3
- 5. Visit to your right (step right, close with your left foot, step right, close with your left foot, stamp with the right foot, stamp with the right foot)
- 6. Return (step left, close with your right foot, step left, close with your right foot, stamp with the left foot, stamp with the right foot, stamp with the left foot)
 - 7. Link right arms with your partner and run round each other round twice.
- 8. Visit to your right (step left, close with your right foot, step left, close with your right foot, stamp with the left foot, stamp with the left foot)
- 9. Return (step right, close with your left foot, step right, close with your left foot, stamp with the right foot, stamp with the left foot, stamp with the right foot)
 - 10. Link left arms with your partner and run round each other round twice.

Calling

- * Both own right own left own both own
- * right crawl, left crawl, right crawl, left crawl,
- * Both own right own left own both own
- * right crawl, left crawl, right crawl, left crawl,
- * Visit right and back.
- * Right arms to partner
- * Visit left and back.
- * Left arms to partner

Dear Janet

Here are a few words about Opšaj diri plus the lyrics and translation.

Opšaj Diri was one of the first dances taught by Henry Morris at the Hendon Folk Club, out of which the present Barnet group evolved. It was the time of the British folk revival and the membership consisted mainly of students and au pair girls. The club took to the dance because it had a song we could belt out, a song of Tito's communist partisans that was known throughout Yugoslavia from the time of the Second World War.

As with so many Balkan songs, the lyrics vary enormously. For example, the version on Dick Oakes' resource website www.phantomranch.net has a completely different version possibly purged of any communist connection. A recording by the Croation State Ensemble "Lado" does, however, include two verses from the Hendon Folk Club's songbook. The lyrics as originally taught are printed below and the dance is played by Dunav on the Society's recording "Twelve Circle Dances". More knowledgeable scholars will know whether the dance predates the song. I guess it does.

Oj narode narode evo tebi slobode

The dance starts on the left foot to the left, so typical in Croatia. Front basket hold.

While singing the verse:

Slowly step left and right and left and turn. To the right: right and left and right and turn. Repeat.

While singing the chorus (first time only) moving to the left:

Rocking step: right over, back on the left (eight times)

During the chorus repeat and for the first section of the instrumental, moving to the left at increasing speed:

Step right hop step left

During the remainder of the instrumental, stop travelling and face centre.

Step right hop step left. This is the same as the travelling step except the left knee lifts a little as you hop.

You can finish with a brisk right left right - ready to start again with the next verse.

R in L to R and Turn (Pivotting on RF) 8 times L out R to L and Turn (Pivotting on LF) 8 times RF in and push around with L (Clockwise) LF in and push around with R (Anticlockwise)

Partners face out, Ladies face out and Men R hop L around Partner 8 times.

I can remember the first part of the dance but am not to sure about the notation for the second!!
