

We are fortunate this year to be able to offer two excellent SIFD teachers, and a new contributor, Janet Woolbar, with her exceptionally wide repertoire, will offer dances from many countries. Dalila Heath will bring some of her lovely Armenian, and also some Israeli dances. For the first time at Great Alne we look forward to some dances from Orsolya Vegh. Originally from Hungary, Orsi will show us some Moldavian / Hungarian Dances.

Paul Lindley brings his handbells – a delight – especially if you have not yet tried playing tunes on handbells.

We hope that those appreciating the availability of International Dance in the Midlands - particularly from our many Midland International dancers who may have more leisure time – will especially like to join us on the Monday (26^{th} April) of the Weekend. Longer, not over-intensive, International teaching sessions (as requested) will be available.

The caterers throughout the weekend are brilliant. They provide helpfully for every kind of dietary limitation; which allows everyone – including spontaneous visitors - to indulge much gastronomic pleasure, yet stay within any special dietary requirement. On the Monday - their climax of excellence - a superb, most reasonably priced, choice of lunch is waitress-served to us in the village Memorial Hall; that alone should make an outing to Great Alne worthwhile.

The surrounding Warwickshire villages are lovely. The Long Weekend is when nearby woodland bluebell walks and cowslips in the lanes are at their best.

We wish to encourage the introduction of dances learnt at Great Alne to our local repertoire. The repeat of just one dance afterwards will give the visiting teachers' material, and the long weekend itself, a relevance which video archiving alone cannot achieve.

Recently, and again this year, to provide the finance to support visits by International teachers, the programme for Saturday and Sunday is offering much more variety. This allows more "dance exchange" and encourages 'drop-in' dancers from a range of dancing backgrounds.

It is good that Paul, and also Nicola Scott, have shared its responsibility with me from this year. This has allowed the Long Weekend to continue to be available, now in its 28th year, for the participatory enjoyment of many.

I especially wish to thank Linda and David Bradley who have for many years hosted Dutch visiting teachers. Linda, back in 1982, first encouraged me to instigate a camping weekend with dance, music and walks, making use of the hall at Great Alne. David I must also thank for the benefit of his greatly supportive administrative help, and also, from the earliest years, for the considerable sustenance which the event has obtained from his outstanding musicianship.

I also wish, with appreciation and affection, to remember Dennis Hunt who in the 1970s laid the foundations for the West Midlands Branch, supported the Long Weekend at Great Alne, and envisaged it as a source of International dances and music.

The new committee will, I am sure, do much to continue to fulfil these aims.

Update on Dance Event

On Saturday 13th February, Bungay International Folkdance Group hosted a Valentine's Dance-athon in the ballroom at the King's Head Hotel in Bungay, Suffolk.

Teachers and leaders from groups across East Anglia were invited to lead 45 minute dance slots and their selection of music and dance provided a varied programme that enabled the 70 participants to dip in and out of the 7.5 hours of dancing that was continuous throughout the day. The day ended with live music from Zaramo and Bear's great singing.

A fantastic £1205 was raised through generous donations, sponsored dancing and a minimal entrance fee. This was split between two charities: the MacMillan nurses and a local project co-ordinated by Suffolk Wildlife Trust: Bungay's Community Barn Owl Project. A great day that brought groups from across the region together to delight in each other's dance repertoires and opened the door to some new dance enthusiasts. Margaret Webb


I was sorry to read about Margaret's passing in the NEWS. I have many memories of Margaret who I knew quite well at one time. I first met her in the early 1950s and it was largely due to her and Ruth Coton (then Sharp) that I became interested in Balkan dances, which later developed into an interest in the costumes and village culture generally, and meeting so many lovely people.

I met Margaret and Ruth at the SIFD Sunday dances that were held in the basement gym at the old Inns of Court Mission in Drury Lane. During the interval they would organise an impromptu Balkan session and they dragged me, rather reluctantly, to join in. They encouraged me to go along to Philip Thornton's Balkan class at Hortensia Road, Chelsea where the SIFD held its folk dance classes and I became hooked, eventually becoming his assistant and deputising for him when he was indisposed.

Margaret was an energetic and enthusiastic person and her dancing ability and her vivacious make-up made her ideally suited to Spanish dancing, and she eventually established her own dance group, Los Ibericos. It's strange that I eventually settled here in Spain and became fond of its music and dances. She was a purist and usually used two excellent guitarists for the dancing.

I owe her a debt of gratitude for introducing me to the dances of the Balkans, but especially the former Jugoslavia, which became the main focus of my life.

I don't know how many remember dancing for National Folk day in Trafalgar Square and in the fountains in the mid 1970's. I seem to remember dancing for about three years running.

How many of you have ever seen this! (front cover)

One of our members found this at a jumble sale a few years ago. It is a Jigsaw made from a photo of the SIFD collected group for one of these years. There is no mention or credits on the box. It just says "Folk Dancing". I can name some of the dancers Steve and Joy, Alan Cant (back) maybe Ernie at the back and myself and Alison Thompson.

It's me again. I read with some interest the correspondence about Opšaj diri.

I first came across the dance when I was in Croatia in 1958. I attended a performance of a suite of Croatian dances by a Croatian group and I noted it down. It was performed without music and they told me it was from the Podravina region. It was the first Croatian dance that I taught at the Balkan class and by luck I had managed to buy a Jugoton LP that had been recorded in Zagreb and manufactured in Germany. It is copies of this recording that circulated among dancers for many years. It became adopted by the Partizans when I think it had lyrics added to it.

While I was in Croatia in 1982 I found two books called "Narodne igre Jugoslavije". The second smaller volume "Partiznske igre" contained the music, lyrics and dance instructions for Opšaj diri. I've sorted out the Serbo-Croat instructions and drawn illustrations and I enclose a copy for the readers together with my notes for the version that I noted down. (see overleaf) They differ quite substantially, so I assume that there were different versions in use by the Partizans.

The author of the book, Professor Branka Kolarovic, acknowledges the help given by many people from all over the former Jugoslavia, including Dr. Lljevacovic the founder and artistic director of the Croatian State group "Lado", and Ivan Ivancan, a dance fieldworker working at the Folklore Institute in Zagreb who published several books of Croatian folk dances with notes, music, and instructions of the dances in words and also Labin ballet notation which gives a very detailed account of not only the footwork but also of the way in which the body is used. It is from him that I learnt "Licko kolo, the silent dance" at a seminar for group leaders in 1966. I accept therefore that his version is an authorised one and is the one he taught to "Lado".

I haven't seen Beverly for many years, (Hallo!), but I knew her parents very well and remember Len Pascoe and his wife coming to classes and dancing in an early Zivko Firfov demonstration at the Maidstone festival, so many years ago. Croatian dances are usually in a closed circle or sun formation and invariably move to the L, that is sunwise, as dances from the Ottoman areas are usually performed in an open circle or crescent moon formation and move to the R, that is moon wise. The version vaguely resembles the dance that I originally taught but is incorrect and hardly Croatian in character. The last figure where a man hops around his partner is very suspicious. I can think of only a few instances where people separate in Croatian dances. In the Adriatic coastal islands, Susak for instance, where the man spins his partner like a top to test her powers of endurance, and in the pillow dance in the Croatian region of Prigorje north of Zagreb when during a dance a girl leaves the circle and chooses a young man of her choice and puts a rolled handkerchief around his neck and drags him into the centre of the circle where they both kneel on a pillow and kiss; but this dance is of Austrian influence. I don't doubt that Len's notation was what he saw or was taught, just the source of the material.

Croatia.

Opšaj diri.

Podravina region.

A mixed dance in a closed circle formation. The hands are held in what is known as "lisa" in front of the body. The L hand passes under the R arm of the person on the L and takes the R hand of the next person but one on the R and so on. If using the Lado recording there is a long introduction of 16 bars of music. Commence dancing with the singing. For a performance this could be used for walking on.

Bar.	Beat o	PART ONE. Walking to the Left flat footed.
1.	1 and	Step LF to L, dipping slightly on "and"
2.	2 and	Step RF to L, dipping slightly on "and"
3.	3 and	Step LF to L, dipping slightly on "and".
4.	4 and	Step LF to L, leaving RF in place and swivel on both feet to face to the R.and pause on
"and". 5/8.	Repeat bar	1/4 to the R starting RF, and finishing facing to the L.

9/16. Repeat to the L and R.

PART TWO Rocking step.

B music.

1/4.

1 and Keeping the legs apart, Step LF backwards to the L bouncing twice on it and taking the weight off the RF which begins to move to the L.

2 and Step forward on RF to L without crossing it over the LF bouncing twice on it.

3 and Repeat 1 and.

4 and Repeat 2 and.

5/16. Repeat bar 1/4 seven times.

B music gradually increasing in tempo.

1/15. Repeat B bars 1 /15 on the spot, bouncing the body twice on each step, pausing in the 16th bar with both feet on the ground, facing inward. If it is possible when using the RF you can step on it and twist the R heel to the R.

16. pause with both feet in position, no bounce.

Recommence dance from Part One. Note that on the Lado recording towards the end bar 1/16 is repeated with the musicians playing the music in the old village style, usually using a fiddle, cello and double base. You can continue with the fast step. Lado used this section as part of their choreography.

In 1957 while in Croatia I saw a dance group perform a group of Croatian dances and they told me that Opšaj diri came from the Podravine region. The words were probably added when the Partizans adopted the dance. There are different versions of the text.

Meillionen o Feirionnydd is a dance for five couples, although apparently it can be danced with a different number of couples with a less satisfying outcome. We dance it at the Gosport & Fareham group when numbers are right - so, not very often. It's a great dance for beginners who need to practice 'siding' for English dances!

Meillionen o Feirionnyd Wales

Up and back a double x 2

4 slipsteps out to side, 4 slipsteps in to place

All back and forward a Double

Face partner: clap sequence

top couple: Side and cross. Face down and Side and cross with second couple.

Repeat Siding and Crossing back to place bringing in whole set.

The music for **Rankankalia** will appear in the May issue - if you know anything about the dance - please write in and enlighten us. The only information about Rankankalia that I can offer is that it comes from Finland.
