## Victorian Glamour with Italian Tinge

Every month when I receive my copy of the SIFD News, I read through the DATES FOR YOUR DIARY and WHAT'S ON in that particular month pages; each time I am amazed by the number of opportunities for dancing and wish I had enough time and stamina to attend more of them. And that represents only a small part of the overall list of dance opportunities on offer in the London area. If I add to it Scottish country dancing, Scandia, Quadrille Club, and all the other clubs, I get exhausted by only thinking about all this dancing. Now, the London dancing scene has recently become even richer. At the beginning of July, Dance Society London was born, and started its life with two hugely successful dancing events – a Summer Scottish dance and a Grand Victorian Ball.

Both of these dances were of a very high standard and presented a good opportunity for the local dancers to mix with a sizable group of Italian dancers that came over to London especially for the occasion. Both had live music; the Scottish Craigievar band considered the Friday dance "one of the best gigs we've ever played", and at the Saturday Ball the dancers were delighted with Green Ginger who could make dance even the most tired feet to the lively tunes of G & S operas and other popular melodies of 150 years ago.



On Friday all the Italian men wore kilts, which added to the festive atmosphere. And the Grand Victorian Ball on Saturday was a real feast for the eye: most men wore black tie, cut in many cases in the 19<sup>th</sup> century fashion, and the crinolined ladies enhanced their beauty with some admirable old-time feminine finery. On the programme were some staple period dances, like The Lancers, several country dances, and some less well known couple dances, mostly in waltz and mazurka time. They were danced on a big circle round the room, with progression. After a number of set movements each couple separated and all ladies progressed one place forward to repeat the movements with a new partner. This gave a great opportunity to flirt with impunity with several partners during the same dance.

Weren't the Victorians pleasure-loving and inventive dancers?

Now you may ask, what is Dance Society London and how did it manage to come to life with such an exquisite panache?

Dance Society London is the latest offshoot of the Italian Società di Danza, an organisation, which is devoted to propagation of the 19<sup>th</sup> century dancing culture all over Italy, and in recent years started groups in several other European countries. Its repertoire comprises a wide variety of dances that were popular in the dancing salons and at the balls in Paris, Vienna, London, St. Petersburg, Venice and other European, and also American, cities in the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

I first came into contact with the Società di Danza three years ago, in Prague. They organised their summer school in the Czech capital on the occasion of establishing a

new group there. Last year I attended another of their summer schools, which took place in the Bavarian Alpine resort of Füssen. Apart from a great number of Italians, there was also a dozen of Russian dancers, and several other nationalities – Germans, French, Americans.

It is one of the great attractions of the Società di Danza that it has been spreading its tentacles from Italy to many parts of Europe. At the moment it has its offshoots in the Czech Republic, Russia, the Ukraine, Byelorussia, Finland, and Britain. I expect further places will soon be added to this list. The members of Dance Society London will be able to enjoy dancing not only on the home ground, but travel all over Europe, and maybe beyond, join in with the local groups, make new friends, and dance the dances they have become familiar with.

I am convinced that Dance Society London has a great future on the London dancing scene. I expect its activities will take off after summer holidays – in spite of the fact that the leading lady of the whole enterprise, Libby Curzon, recently got a year's contract to work in Africa, and it is going to be quite a job to organise the things in London from Accra. 
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

Thrace in the Greek/Bulgarian border region; Anne Leach introduced us to lovely Swedish dances, some simple, some like Schottis more challenging (music provided by Clyde Olliver and Mike Machin).

There seemed no end to the talents of out teachers as they all multi-tasked. Anne Leach also enthusiastically led the Saturday evening of general international dances. Bob Robinson led the Balkan Party evening besides filling in the Ukrainian spot with Julie. Both evening dances were enlivened by the playing of Dutch DIP, Balkan music specialists fast becoming a fixture at Eastbourne, augmented by a specialist on Scandinavian music and the ubiquitous Mike Machin playing and singing in yet more languages.

As a treat, the two charming young Thai men from the Buddhapadipa Temple in Wimbledon who came last year taught us a village dance from N.E. Thailand - though our efforts to co-ordinate fingers and feet gave them considerable enjoyment! We saw how to do it properly at the Saturday dance.


Thanks to Julie and the Barlow Group, there in force, we had a splendid weekend of dance. But where were the people? Numbers were noticeable down on previous years - a pity.

Football Fever hit Leeds on the 1st July when Loidis IFDG held a theme night featuring dances from the countries that had qualified for the World Cup.

Suggested costume for the evening was shorts and T-shirts (no muddy boots allowed, however!). Around 20 of our members rose to the occasion, and the hall was decorated with national flags, (including our own), with the occasional shorts in evidence.

People were asked to bring food relating to their chosen country, and with 32 to choose from, we had a wonderful spread at half-time. (While buying our food contribution, Jean and I spotted a "Celebration Cake" embellished with edible photos of the England team on the top. Lorna provided an interesting and varied programme of dances, and we covered at least 18 of the countries during the evening. As the final whistle blew, it was agreed that we had successfully managed to combine football with international dance in a very enjoyable evening.

During the last two years, Loidis has gained at least 12 new members, (now nearly 40 on the list), which seems to indicate a growing interest in our kind of dance. Long may it continue!
