Report from the Last Committee Meeting

At the last committee meeting much was discussed. The following are items worth noting. To start with the best news...

Legacy from Frank Flanagan. Frank has left the Society an extremely generous amount of money. This was a big surprise, and we are very grateful and appreciative of his kindness and thoughtfulness. A fund is to be set up in Frank's memory, and suggestions of bringing in more foreign teachers, and having more live music at events like Summer School, have been liked, but no firm decisions have yet been taken as to how it should be used.

On Show. We recorded our appreciation of the SIFD performance at the Royal Albert Hall, and our thanks to all the performers and costume providers noted, with especial thanks to Janet Douglas. **Finances**. Judith submitted financial documents to the Charity Commissioners, and a Gift Aid claim, both ahead of schedule.

Digitising Wilf Horrocks's music. Turning Wilf's many pages of music into digital format is proceeding steadily.

Foreign teachers. Trying to satisfy sponsor requirements to "employ temporary migrants" i.e. bring over non-EU dance teachers, is proving frustratingly difficult. The requirements were not formulated with charities in mind.

Renewal forms. Work has started on simplifying the SIFD renewal forms, and payment methods. **CRB checks**. TMG were chosen to act as the organisation through whom we must make applications for CRB checks. Our aim is to be able to provide checks for all SIFD members who regularly teach and help at children's classes.

Day Courses. Janet Woolbar and Pam Radford have stepped down from the Badge and Day Course Committee, having spent many years organising excellent day courses, which so many people have enjoyed and which are such a vital part of the Society's purpose. We very much appreciate, and thank them very much for all the time and effort they have put in over the years to make these day courses so varied and successful.

Volunteers. It would be wonderful if you felt you could help out, perhaps by offering to help with the day courses? The Badge and Day Course Committee (though perhaps this should just be the Day Course Committee from now on?) currently consists of just Helen Ezra, and she would dearly like some help. She needs someone/several someones to have ideas for courses, and help book teachers, and preferably be there at the courses to take money etc. Booking the hall is already done, so there isn't that much to do, and ideas and bookings could be done by phone from a distance.

Please do think about helping – it would be much appreciated. And while I'm begging, a secretary for the Society would be so very helpful – all committee members are multi-tasking like mad, and taking turns, but a secretary would provide much-needed consistency. And as a(n almost) last plea for help, would anyone consider taking the SIFD shop on....?

The very last plea is for a host for next year's **AGM**. Only half an offer has been received so far. Wouldn't you like the AGM nearer you for a change? We will make sure you're not out of pocket, and can provide suggestions for courses, dance MCs etc if needed. Admittedly the meeting itself is not the most exciting part of the day, but recently the AGM days have been great fun – the dancing is enjoyable and getting members together from many different areas is always a pleasure.

George Sweetland

Members will be sorry to learn of the death of George Sweetland on 3rd November, following a period of illness and hospitalisation.

George, an early days member contributed much to International Folk Dancing. Whilst his special interests were Polish and Spanish, the wide spectrum of general dancing with its social side and weekends of dancing, firstly at Youth Hostels and subsequently at Surrey Crest; along with others at more comfortable venues were strongly supported. Many groups are grateful for his visits and teaching. In its latter years he was a leader and teacher at Harrow Green, and subsequently at Havering Group whilst being a staunch supporter of Central London Group with both Margery Latham and Janet Woolbar.

His annual week at the International Musical Eisteddfod was a highlight, not only because of the Folk Dance Competition (one year Harrow Green took part under George, demonstrating English dancing), but the whole scene with socialising and late evening discussion in a traditional pub!, but many will know of his reports in the SIFD News.

SIFD administration was also of interest and concern. He served in many ways; publicity, representing the society at the CCPR, arranging MCs for the Sunday dances, the dates and coordination for the Embankment Gardens demonstrations.

In private life George was a mechanical engineering draughtsman, working for several well known companies before spending years with the BBC. Naturally his ability to spend time dancing was restricted when his children were young. He leaves a son and daughter. They have our sympathy.

George Sweetland, 1924-2010

My friendship with George goes back to the days when he and I worked fairly near each other in the City of London and we used to meet up sometimes at lunch-time to have a drink and a gossip in one of the City bars - some fifty years ago! For all of that time he has been with the SIFD and his love of dancing and socialising led him to join several of the SIFD international classes and groups as well as some of the specialist groups, notably Jacy Tacy Polish group and Los Ibericos Spanish group. He was also a member of Harrow Green group, which he ran for a while, and a loyal supporter of Woodvale.



He was a regular attender at the Cecil Sharp House dances, day courses, summer schools, and danced in the SIFD shows at the Royal Albert Hall as well as the smaller shows we used to put on. Weekends away, both with Harrow Green and the Society and dance trips abroad were also very much part of his life.

He took on the job of Publicity Officer, which he did for many years, and also took on the job of organizing the performances at Victoria Embankment Gardens, and of course wrote each year for the SIFD NEWS his account of the International Eisteddfod which he loved to go to.

So, all round, George was a very well known figure to quite a few people. In his latter years he was not seen quite so often and as I myself dropped out of

the dance scene I did not see him so often but things won't be the same for me without those long telephone conversations we continued to have, putting the SIFD affairs to rights.

Dance Around the World

Dance Around the World held at Cecil Sharp House was a fusion of colour, rhythm, culture and style. Both Saturday and Sunday had full programmes of demonstrations and dance allowing one to pick and mix through the day. Every continent was represented and it was really interesting to see so many dancers performing such a variety of dances. I was very impressed with the three young girls dancing to African music with such rhythm and contagious smiles; they were aged nine, six and just five years old! The energy and enthusiasm shown by many groups was absolutely infectious. For example after watching a demonstration by a Hungarian group I just had to try out their workshop. Their enthusiasm for their dance and music was evident, which they shared with us.

Saturday evening provided a choice between a Eurobal, dancing to a mixture of mainly French and Scandinavian music performed by a live band or an evening of Latin American dance displays with audience participation. The songs sung by the band during Eurobal were compelling and magical whereas the pulse of Latin American and African music just flowed through the body.

Sunday evening, I think it's fair to say, was an evening of fun and frolics dancing to a variety of international dance - and thanks to the talented band Cloudburst and the MCs, a most enjoyable evening was shared by all those present.

If you haven't made it to Dance Around the World yet, I would strongly recommend it, you won't be disappointed. Watch out for details in the SIFD newsletter next year. Many thanks to the organisers, dancers and musicians. I had a great time; I certainly hope to go again as there was such a full programme, it was just impossible to do everything.

Call for Volunteers

Form and Being: A Study of the Experience of Dancing

Traditional Balkan round and chain dances are based on some of the most ancient European dance forms known. There is something so compelling in the steps, patterns, rhythms and melodies that even recreational dancers in non-traditional contexts seek out Balkan dance experiences. As a folk dancer and PhD student at the University of Surrey, my research explores how the formal elements of different dances (the movement vocabulary, rhythm, music and use of space and time) contribute to the experience of the dancing person.

The fact that dances from the Balkan region have travelled throughout the UK, Canada, Australia, Europe and the Americas - removed entirely from their traditional socio-cultural contexts and danced by people with no ethnic ties to the dances - is remarkable. My research will explore how people describe their experience of dancing these dances and how these descriptions reflect the movement and musical qualities of the dances. This research employs a methodology drawn from the disciplines of Psychology, Dance Analysis and Systems Theory.

Volunteers needed

As part of my research, I would like to talk with recreational folk dancers about their experience of Balkan music and dancing. Initially, I plan to conduct one-hour interviews, during which we will discuss various aspects of your experience of dancing, such as why you enjoy particular dances, how these dances make you feel, what you value about your dancing and your sense of self and time and space while dancing. All participants will remain anonymous in my final thesis and in any resulting publications.



SOMOGYI KARIKAZO - Hungary (pronounced Shómodj)



Somogyi Karikázó

The proper name is Somogyi Karikázó: the letters á and ó are not the same letters as a and o, they even have separate sections in the Hungarian dictionary that I have (no I don't speak it but I can pronounce it). One of the transliterations is Shohmohj Korikazaw. It all depends on which convention you like: Shomoj Korikazaw (or even Korikazor) is also "correct" but has lost a little bit of information about how to pronounce it. The Hungarian alphabet is very prescriptive and precise about pronunciation, but English isn't, which is why there are umpteen possible transliterations.

For the non-dancers I was talking to and singing with, it is in fact two quite different traditional songs, with no connection except that they were yoked together when someone created the dance.
