Svatovska Polka

This dance was taught by Nenad Bicanic at a day course some years ago. Much later I asked Nenad for the instructions, herewith his reply.

Here is the description of Svatovska Polka as I remember it being taught by Miro Ramovz from Ljubljana, on one of his seminars in Lado practice hall in Zagreb, sometime in 1983.

Svatovska Polka from Slovenia

Line of Dance - Anticlockwise Ballroom Hold (8 bars of music)

- (1-2) 2 Polka Steps in line of dance, starting L for Men, R for Ladies (Men L-RL, R-LR, Ladies R-LR, L-RL)
- (3) 1 Polka Step, in place, turning to face the centre, upper body leaning backwards and raising leading arms (Men L-RL, Ladies R-LR)
- 1 Polka Step, in place, still facing the centre, upper body leaning forward and lowering leading arms (Men R-LR, Ladies L-RL)
 End the movement by turning back to the line of dance, swaying somewhat backwards in order to get more momentum in the next step
- (5) 1 "sliding" Polka Step along the line of dance as a preparation for the turns (Men L-RL; Ladies R-LR)
- (6-7) 4 turns while letting go of partners, (Men anticlockwise R-L, R-L, Ladies clockwise L-R, L-R)
- (8) Regain ballroom hold, while doing three stamps, (Men R-LR, Ladies L-RL)

Jack (John Francis) Richardson - Founder Member

Jack's contribution to the SIFD was substantial. Many members will have their special memories of him, through personal contact, either at the first series of Swansea Summer Schools, or weekends away, at Bisham Abbey, Uplands, Dunford or Halsway Manor; or perhaps as M.C. at the monthly Sunday dances. A tall erect authoritative figure wearing lederhosen, standing centre stage.

Also Jack was strong with the production and publication of the Society's recordings and books. The negotiation of a most favourable contract with Robert Maxwell for Pergamon to publish the books gave him much pleasure, and benefit to the SIFD. The Swansea Summer Schools which Jack started in 1962 and organised until 1987 (with exceptions at Hertford and Edinburgh)), set a pattern of widening the repertoire, wherever possible, through teachers from the respective countries; which gave him many friends abroad. If Jack had a principle for these events it was to ensure that there was opportunity to fill the unforgiving minute! So there were costume exhibitions, film shows, outings, walks and demonstrations; all generally leading to those present going home exhausted for a rest, but wanting to come back next time.

We have many memories because Jack was both a great character and worker for the SIFD. Dancing gave him much pleasure and interest in Folk culture.

His wife Joan deserves our thanks for all the unknown and unseen support she has given Jack over so many years, to enable him to achieve what he did. Our sympathy goes to Joan in her loss.

Jack Richardson

It is with feelings of great sorrow and shock to learn of the death of Jack Richardson. He was a person, always there; a wise head and a depth of sympathy not often to be found.

Jack was one of the founder members of the Society in the golden age of youth and optimism. We were either students or people at the beginning of life, after the war and the world was our oyster.

Jack first arranged for us to dance on the Rector's lawn during the summer break - unthinkable to go the whole holiday without dancing! The Rector's lawn at the Imperial College gave us somewhere to dance (and later a new member, Dr. Heath). After dancing Jack took some of us back to his lab. Where he handed us beakers full of a smoking, bubbling substance which we drank with relish. (We learnt afterwards that it was probably Liquid oxygen.)

I have a fund of 'Jackisms'. I recall that when asked why he wore shorts when country walking, he replied that if he tore his trousers on a bramble he would have to mend them, but if he tore his skin on a bramble, nature would mend it for him. Memories abound, I recall one Easter Jack rented a house at Goran Haven, in Cornwall. A group of us spent the time walking the gorgeous country. We put all our meat rations together (about 1s.2d, old money, 6p. new) to have a slap-up roast beef dinner. Into the oven it went, and round the fire we sat, laughing and talking, and it took a long time for the smell of burning to penetrate from the kitchen. Alas, our entire meat ration was beyond recovery.

Many, many memories come back. We all paired off, usually short-lasting, but Jack and Joan never separated, and my sympathies are with her. I understand that she, too, is ill, and we pray that all the kind thoughts of the Society members reach her and give her comfort. Rest in peace, Jack, our loving memories go with you.

<u>A Few Memories of Jack – One of Our Most Charismatic, Valuable. Inestimable, Enhancers/Benefactors .</u>

I first really registered Jack and Joan when I charged up for the very first Swansea University course. What an inspiration and how fortunate to have had those subsequent fantastic years there, where Jack was Prof. and in a position to wave so many magic wands. From the very first he set such a high standard and filled each day with dancing and much more – singing, outings, various gatherings and mini events always with everything copied and available to all. He never flagged. How many wonderful teachers from other countries did he introduce us to with such long lasting benefits. Whatever the problem, suggestion or plea Jack was unfailingly, helpful, cheerful, positive and energetic. Nothing was too much trouble. When things were difficult for me, he made it possible for Sula and I to attend regularly, by allowing us to park (live) in our old camper van in the car park – strictly illegal of course, but SUCH A BOON.

Later when we came up and parked at the bottom of Jasna and Nenad's garden for a little holiday (after he came to lecture at the University) Jack and Joan were also most hospitable and often joined us for a ramble (one of their favourite pastimes, particularly on their beloved Gower coast.) Those 'extra' Swansea days were so joyful and precious in memory. Even when he first lost his foot he still came to the course at Ball's Park Training College and made light of it - still laughing and joking. Just as welcoming too at their home in Winchmore Hill, where we often had the added pleasure of seeing and doing things with Heinz and Ilse (such special friends, who organised that memorable dancing/walking holiday in their native Austria, (with Mourrie Pfeffer and squeezebox to keep us dancing). Jack was always joking and 'leg pulling' with Sula as she grew up, particularly later in the lifts from Cecil Sharp et al ,once Sula could drive and took over that chore from me.

Whatever happened, Jack coped - reliably charismatic, thoughtful, kind and generous. I think he was the first one to organise a 'free' trip to the summer week for Lucille (Armstrong) among other life enhancing things he was instrumental in arranging. I am sure almost everyone in the Society can think of events, incidents, highlights, which relied on Jack in some way. He and his beloved wife Joan remained enthusiastic beacons, warming us all. Along with everyone else, Sula and I pay wholehearted tribute to a very special person.

Memories of John Francis (Jack) Richardson OBE who died in January 2011.

My fond memories of Jack go back to 1956 or 7. My very first memory was "helping Jack with washing up" at a weekend away at Thamesfield, Henley on Thames, where SIFD members had many happy weekends before it went 'upmarket' becoming a major sports centre, and we all took turns, in pairs, with various 'chores'. I made many friends there. He told stories of dancing "on the Rector's Lawn" at Imperial College London, but I don't remember that far back.

The SIFD owes a very great deal to him. The books and records were largely his inspiration, and initially the books were published by Pergamon Press who were doing well from sales of the Textbook he wrote for Chemical Engineering students. The original 78 records (remember them?) were made from masters Jack cut himself on a special bit of equipment which made them from taped music recorded on his large professional Ferrograph tapedeck, all kept in a little room off one of the rooms in his maisionette in London. Later they were professionally made by a tiny company – but I am not remembering their name or where they were located, behind Oxford Street I think.

The bi-annual Swansea courses were also his inspiration, and arranging them took a great deal of negotiation for the best rates and permission to use the rooms and accommodation for such an event.

As well, of course, he kept the Halsway Manor weekends going for many years including arranging the coach for trips out each year.

At the same time of course he was one of the youngest Professors when first appointed and continued to lecture until he must have been one of the oldest and that text book, updated of course, is still the only textbook on Chemical Engineering written for UK students (rather than US students) and those International students who studied in the UK.

In his spare time he enjoyed walking including around the beautiful coast on the Gower peninsular – the muddier the better! And swimming in the sea even after his above the knee amputation in about 1979.

A truly amazing man.
