Residential Albanian Folk Dance Course



In Bournemouth 20th – 22nd September 2013 This is an exciting opportunity to discover traditional Albanian folk dance first hand from Albanian nationals. Until recently little was known about Albanian folklore traditions outside of Albania. Now that Albania is open to the world we are able to discover the richness and diversity of Albanian folklore, not just from the Republic of Albania itself, but also of Albanians living in the Balkan Peninsula and minorities like the Aruman within the Republic of Albania. Genc is a choreographer for the National Ensemble, but he is very interested in the traditional dances of Albania and will bring authentic material which he has researched. Helga is also a solo dancer in the Ensemble and she assists Genc with his courses and teaches the women's dances. They are both charming and warm-hearted people and will steal your hearts away!

In addition to this Mike and Clyde will provide live music for the weekend. This adds a whole new dimension to our residential weekends as they are able to offer live music for the social dances, and singing and music-making workshops for anyone who would like to have a go.

Stories About Albania

I could go on and on about the area of the triple frontier (Albania Greece Macedonia), where Zoé and I for some strange reason felt very drawn and very at home, but will limit myself to three stories:

1. Did you know that Ali Pasha, for all his tyranny and cruelty, was very taken with Lord Byron? He was very pleased to be visited by a British Lord, and completely spoiled Byron whom he treated as a son. If I recollect rightly, Lord Byron then got involved in Greek independence, and in fact died there. (Ali Pasha was at the time fighting WITH the Greeks against his Turkish overlord, the Sultan, having massacred the Greeks previously, including the Greek hero Katsandonis. The latter's dance, Katsandonis, is an Epiran Tsamikos; I wonder if anyone in the UK knows it?). The Sultan eventually got fed up with Ali Pasha's attempts to become an independent king and sent an army to kill him at Ali's castle on the Lake of Ioannina, in modern day Greek Epirus. If you visit Epirus, don't forget the capital, Ioannina, a very Greek town, few tourist frills, but full of history; it even has some of the last minarets in Greece (others in remote Thracian valleys, far to the east. I imagine everyone knows the dance Ali Pasha? And the story of the Souli heroines in about 1803 who, surrounded by Ali's army, danced Kalamatianos over the Zalongo cliff with their children. A Greek woman did Not fall into the hands of the Turks... (Has anyone seen the huge monument? Just north of Preveza, three women and three children dancing).

2. The second story is of the famous Gjirokaster festival, a big dance and song festival that took place every 5 years in the Southern Albanian town of Gjirokaster - in the ruins of another of Ali Pasha's castles there. We were there in 1988 and 1990, and you can see the town from the hills of Greece.

Villages from all over Albania train for two years for Gjirokaster, and started off in '88 with a huge procession through the museum city (which is also the birthplace of the dictator Enver Hoxha, pronounced Hodger) all in foustanellas - the Albanians wear them too, only longer than in Greece. Tourists were so few that our group was ushered right to the front, and we found ourselves seated right next to the Politburo! Several of us actually shook hands with Ramiz Alia, Enver Hoxha's successor! An estimated 50,000 people were there.

The Tosk dances (the Tosks are the tribe of S. Albania) were superb, but the most amusing were from the Greek minority and the Italian Albanians (who emigrated to Italy in the Middle Ages and spoke - to Albanian ears a weird dialect, like Chaucer's English to us...) The Greek minority were cut off at the end of the Greek civil war (ended 1949) from their families and friends in Greek Epirus - another cruelty of war - and couldn't visit Greece again until 1990. The Greeks WERE allowed to visit their family in Albania, though.) Hospitality is a feature of Albanian society. Outside we were class enemies, to be treated with great suspicion. In fact only a very few nationalities were allowed in, in 1988. Certainly no Americans, and NO Russians (plus NO bibles, no long hair, and no miniskirts! But once in, having taken six months to organise the tour and group entry (no individual visas were issued until the 90s, nothing was too good for us. We had passed, were friends, above all because we were interested in their dances and culture - you cannot pay a higher complement to a Balkan people than that! Hence the favoured treatment...

3. My last story is a rather humorous one. One of my best friends, Philippe Hein, from Oxford university days, and then an official in the United Nations, needed to see his opposite number in a ministry, in Tirana. He had been trying unsuccessfully to get a visa for some time, when he heard we were going dancing there. So he had the brainwave of asking if he could come on our group visa. Of course I said yes, and he had his two days off in Tirana on business, while for the rest of the tour he danced with our group - and damn well too!

But the highlight of our trip was when Philippe, who is from Mauritius, scared us by announcing that he'd forgotten to get the necessary (for him) re-entry visa to Greece. We'd never thought of that, of course, because all the rest of us were Europeans. A certain unease overtook us, we did not wish to see poor Philippe blocked in Tirana. So our dance teacher, Bekim, had to leave us to our own devices and take him into the very sealed embassy quarter, where he left Philippe at the guard post to go in alone (Albanians were not permitted there, as there was a very tense crisis on - some Albanians had just taken refuge in the Italian embassy, immediately becoming traitors, and the Tirana government was threatening to storm the embassy).

We can picture my friend walking down the empty street, like something out of "High Noon", and knocking on the door of the Greek embassy! The door was opened by the (very bored) Greek consul (remember NO individual visas for Albanians nor tourists into or out of Albania at that time), who asked what on earth Philippe was doing there! It was, to say the least, a highly unusual circumstance, and Philippe told his story over drinks, making the consul's day! I am sending a copy of this to Philippe in case after 20 years I have exaggerated. I think not!

I am sending this to SIFD, because our FIRST journey to Albania, in 1986, was with some of their members, and was only one year away from the famous puddle of disinfectant on the border whereby we corrupt capitalist counter-revolutionaries could purify ourselves before entering the peoples' paradise...

I hope some of this is of interest to some of you. It's fairly unique, as of course, Ramiz Alia, having observed the fate or the Ceausescus opened Albania (after 45 years of complete isolation) in 1990.

You mentioned at the end of your article about Rheinlander that the music for **Gammel Reinlander** is different from the two tunes published. Gammal Reinlander is a fixed sequence of Reinlander figures associated with a specific tune, (as is "Swedish Schottische") while there many Reinlander / Schottis tunes (however the dance name is spelt). When dancing in Norway or Sweden I have found that the number of figures done by most people is very limited, and in a crowded room only the basic figure might be done. With more space and a confident partner the dance can become far more exciting and following an unpredictable lead becomes a real challenge, and a lot of fun. If anyone would like to try the improvised versions, come to Scandia on a Monday evening.
