The Derbyshire Dancers dance for Croatia.

A few weeks ago I had a phone call from Professor Nenad Bićanić, well known to SIFD members as our Croatian teacher. He came last year to teach one of the Balkan Dance weekends organised by Barlow IFDG and the Derbyshire Dancers.

To mark the accession of Croatia to the EU on July lst, the gift of an Istrian Kažun was being made to the UK, and Nenad was organizing the Croatian side of the celebration. The Peak District of Derbyshire was chosen for the location, because of the similarity of the limestone landscape to that of Croatia, and our shared traditions of dry-stone building, and, of course, shepherding. Kažuni were built as shelters for animals, and people working in the fields, and this one was built by stonemasons from Istria, using our local limestone.

The Winster Morris Men were going to dance for England, and the Derbyshire Dancers were to dance for Croatia! Nenad chose Letovanić for our contribution, and on the morning of the celebration, Janet King kindly lent us time and space at her U3A class in Matlock to rehearse. This also gave her group a chance to learn from Nenad, and several of them came to support us in the afternoon.

The Ambassador H.E. Dr. Ivan Grdešić, and the Chair of the Peak District National Park Cllr. Tony Favell MBE were at the launch, and music was provided by pupils of Lady Manners school, who played a selection of Croatian folk songs and the National Anthems.

Nenad's aim in choosing Letovanić was to make the dance simple enough for people to be able to join in, and after a demonstration of it by my group, many others joined the circle and we all danced together.

The day was warm and sunny, and the Peak District was showing at its glorious best on the afternoon of July 5th. The hut is on the Tissington Trail, one of the most popular walking, cycling and riding trails in tbc National Park, and will be used as an informal shelter for visitors, and especially for school children visiting the area.

The hut is at Parsley Hay Cycle Centre, Biggin, (SK17 ODG, for your sat-nav,) so that you can visit Croatia's gift to the UK when you are in the area.

Dance Bulgaria

This was the title of a recent tour run by Balkania Travel in conjunction with the British Bulgarian Society. After 18 months of planning, we set off in early June, a group of 6 participants plus Cathy Meunier as our tour leader. Although technically this was a tour run by a travel company, in practice we all knew each other, so was more like a group of friends on holiday together.

For the whole week we stayed at a hotel in Dobursko, a small village about three hours drive South of Sofia, near Bansko and between Rila and Pirin, but ethnographically very much part of Pirin, and scenically located at 3,400 feet. The hotel was better than most I have stayed at in this part of Europe, with good food, and friendly and helpful staff. My spacious room had a large balcony (but no time to use it!), with a South facing panorama of the Pirin range.

One of the most notable aspects of this trip was the efforts and efficiency of the many Bulgarians looking after us, several of whom I already knew - the names Dani, Julia and Mitko will be familiar to many who have travelled here. BBS had clearly taken account of Cathy's requests for what should be included in the holiday.

In addition to the dancing, a significant amount of sightseeing and some walking were included. Dobursko has a small church. insignificant on the outside, but on entering the interior is covered with frescoes considered to be among the finest in the world, including a famous mural of Jesus ascending to Heaven on what looks like a space rocket; we walked to a waterfall and through (steep!) woods to a 4th century kiln. We did a full day trip to the South side of Pirin, to Rozhen, where we walked to its monastery, (together with Rila one of the main monasteries in Bulgaria), this one still in a very natural state due to its remoteness. We then walked on to Melnik, almost on the border with Greece, (a scenic and at times quite strenuous hill walk past sandstone 'pyramids', and with much wildlife explained to us), and travelled back across the dramatic Pirin mountains. On other days we were taken round Bankso, a nearby resort mainly used during the ski season, and also a full day to Rila Monastery, and walked to where the founder of the monastery had lived as a hermit.

For part of the holiday we were joined by Mitko Petrov. He ran three morning teaching sessions for us in the hotel, 11 dances in all, several from Pirin and others from various parts of Bulgaria. This included Melniško, which he taught here in 2011 but we wanted to revise, and also having by now been to the town, otherwise the dances were all new to us. Many of you will remember Mitko's UK tour in 2011, so will already know of his extensive knowledge of dances and high standard of teaching.

Probably the best part of the holiday, and which can be achieved only by going to Bulgaria, was the local dance and singing groups we encountered, five such visits were arranged for us, and mostly 'local village' groups rather than choreographed performances. On our first evening the Doburskite Babi (grannies) from the village came to our hotel and performed singing and also some dancing, both of which we joined in with. This local group is renowned in Bulgaria and regularly performs at Koprivshtitsa. This included a wedding ceremony, for which Cathy and Chris Yemm were nominated, and dressed up in costume for; we never quite followed what was happening, so are still vague as to whether they are now married!

The next day we went to another Babi group, singing, dancing and live music in their small house and along the street; but our attempts at performing an English dance for them less successful than their efforts. We visited two further groups to watch their weekly rehearsals, one included a session for small children. We spent one afternoon at a cookery session in a village house, helping to make pumpkin 'pie', and also pompoms, enjoyable although this had more of a feel of a commercial venture. The final group we saw was mostly young, formed just a year ago, but dancing to a high standard and with impressive energy and enthusiasm; performing for us and then we joining in, on a large stage in a theatre - we should note this group and venue for next time! Much was included in this holiday, and beyond our expectations. But some events cannot be planned for. There was a wedding in our hotel (a real one this time). There was much dancing through the afternoon and evening in the hotel grounds, and, as is common in this part of the world, they were very keen for us visitors to join in, making this yet another highlight.

With plenty organised for us, we were occupied for most of the holiday, but at a leisurely pace, and we still found plenty of time for sitting around idly in cafés, etc.

We think we have persuaded Mitko to make another visit to Britain next year. So many more of you may then have the opportunity to learn some of these dances, and there is the potential of a range of interesting material for him to teach us in the future.

And finally, many thanks to Cathy, and the other tour members, for making this such a memorable holiday; also to Andrew Hardwick for filming and producing a DVD of the dances we learnt. Hopefully BBS and Cathy will run more such tours, either back to this area or elsewhere in Bulgaria; do consider coming - we achieved so much in one week.

Mary Fergar's Dancing History

My folk dance roots go back to 1955 when I was working at the BBC in the Rumanian section at Bush House. A series of third programme presentations of music from the Balkans had me glued to the radio, enchanted by this music and longing to dance properly to it.

By great good fortune someone in the Rumanian section knew Philip Thornton, who had taught a few Rumanian girls some dances for their National Day. I was allowed to learn and take part. This led to SIFD classes at a school in Chelsea where Philip and Ken Ward ran the Balkan dance group. We performed more than once in the Royal Albert Hall in the annual "See how they dance".

Eventually Philip gave up teaching and Ken took over. I kept going over a number of years through four pregnancies until I could see that it made sense to join Fiona's class as it was local to my home in Bromley. At that time we were meeting in Hayes Secondary School before moving on to Nightingale Lane and eventually out of the Adult Education sector altogether.

Nowadays Fiona and I need only walk a few steps down our road for the International class, and round the corner to a church hall for the U3A.

Of course I have very much enjoyed the opportunity to keep dancing over so many years, even though only truly inspired by Balkan and Israeli dances.

The other great pleasure after all these years is the company and friendship of so many other people with similar interests and shared history. Thank you Fiona.
