Silviu Ciuciumis 5 August 1949 - 9 May 2014

I first met Silviu in 1994 at the Balkan Festival at Zetten in The Netherlands. Subsequently, I invited him to teach a weekend workshop in Ipswich in 1998. It had been some time since Silviu had taught in England and thereafter he received a number of invitations and became a very popular teacher here.

I remember a truly professional teacher with a huge repertoire of Romanian dances. Two things stand out from his Ipswich visit: his picking sprigs of forsythia in my garden in order to give a yellow flower (no mimosa being available) to every woman present for International Women's Day; and his obsession with punctuality. This desire never to be late led him to be waiting for me in hat and coat 10 minutes before we were scheduled to leave for anything. Nothing laid back or Balkan there.

From 1994 a group from Ipswich travelled most years to the Balkan festival organised by Silviu and Ersin (a Turkish teacher) and it was always a great success. Silviu also organised 2 trips a year to Romania as well as bespoke tours for individual groups. One year he came to collect me from Bucharest airport as I was travelling alone and I was horrified to find him looking pale and with his arm in plaster. He had been involved in a road accident, but this didn't stop him looking after us. He would stay up most of the night rearranging the next day's programme if things had gone awry, as inevitably they did in Romania.

Maureen has reminded me of the time Silviu danced a solo late at night in a darkened hall with just his shoes lit by ultra violet light, and his steps getting ever faster. He could be a showman as well as a teacher. We were due to dance again with him this June in The Netherlands.

Silviu will be sadly missed by so many people, but, above all, our thoughts are with Andrea and Silviu's sons Julian 11 and Ruben 6, and also his family in Romania.

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I first met Silviu in July 1988, at Bucharest airport. I had never met a Romanian before, and felt that he did not fit the image -- he was far too dapper!

I went to another of his tours, this time with Roger, in 1990. The change in Silviu was remarkable -- he was so relaxed, instead of having to be constantly rushing about. In 1988 he could never stay in one place for more than five minutes, as he had to keep tabs on our Securitate 'minders', and check that no-one was doing anything they shouldn't.

Since those two wonderful tours I have attended seven dance courses, weekends and a memorable summer school, with Silviu, and always thoroughly enjoyed his teaching, especially the humour that always came through, his choice of dances and his personality. Many of our favourite dances were taught by him and we do them very often. We were happy to be counted among his friends, and we miss him so much, but we will be constantly reminded of him by his dances.

#### Stara Zagora

Although it is the current and last in line of about 8 former names, Stara Zagora has always sounded a rather exotic place and after spending 4 days there at the end of April I was pleased to see that the city lived up to its name, a university centre with a rich historical past. It was hard to top the tour that Sally and I had just experienced with Iliana and Todor. We did enjoy it all and met some great people. Frances Horrocks has written an article on Iliana's tour so I will just outline what we - that is Sally Humphrey, my husband Alistair and I - got up to when everyone left us at Sofia Airport!

Alistair's plane arrived on time and we were able to drive off in our hire car just after 2pm. Amazingly the sun was shining and the drive along through Trakia to Plovdiv and on to Stara Zagora was beautiful. We were on our way to meet up with Nevena Vlaykova whom we had got to know at our Oxford group in 2011/2012 while she was reading for her Masters Degree in Russian & East European Studies at Oxford University. We met her and her mother Svetlana at a hotel complex a few miles outside Stara Zagora, in a village called Yagoda. This is where the folk dance group they dance with was holding their annual party, which consisted of a dancing session in the afternoon, followed by dinner and more dancing in the evening.

The group is lucky enough to have the choreographer Vasil Germilov (who came to the UK in 2012) to guide them and teach them fun, vibrant dances. What I hadn't completely taken on board though was that the whole thing came about as a result of Nevena inviting her mother over to Oxford to see what our Oxford group got up to every Thursday. Svetlana was a professional dancer in her youth and she was so impressed by what she saw in Oxford that it inspired her to go back to Bulgaria and start up a group in Stara Zagora - for people with some, little or no experience to get together, to dance and enjoy the wonderful Bulgarian rhythms. Sally and I found this very humbling and a great compliment! They are a group of about fifteen regular members and we joined in with the dances we could and some that we already knew, like Ventzi's "Zapil se Stojan", which seemed to be a firm favourite. Vasil's younger daughter also dances with the group so she is always on hand to put Dad right if he forgets what he's previously taught!

On the Sunday morning we went in convoy to Kazanluk, which is not far from Stara Zagora, and went first to the wonderful cultural museum containing the riches excavated from the tombs of the Thracian kings from around the 4th century B.C., before going to visit a couple of the actual tombs. One of them is in Kazanluk itself but is closed to the public although you can visit an exact replica. The other one, a little way out of town in the Valley of the Thracian Kings, was King Seuthes III's tomb and this was the real deal. Following that we had a delicious lunch in a restaurant specialising in trout, cooked in many different ways, before heading into Stara Zagora for a little rest!

Nevena and her family have recently moved into a new apartment
which is 5 minutes walk around the corner from their old flat, and this
is where the 3 of us were accommodated during our stay. Imagine - a
whole apartment to ourselves! We walked round to their new
apartment for a delicious dinner on Sunday evening and met Nevena's
father Stoyan, her younger sister Katia and their dog Leo! "Zagore"
and they rehearsed the programme they were due to dance at a charity
event the following day. As with our visits to Trakia Ensemble and
Dunav Ensemble whilst with Iliana, the dancers (about twenty in all)
were electric to watch and very nice to chat to at the end.

They told us they had danced with a few different choreographers in their careers but that they really enjoyed Vasil's choreographies because he often puts the accents/stresses on the syncopated beat rather than where one might expect it!

In the afternoon Nevena showed us around the Roman ruins in the middle of Stara Zagora. These include the Antique Forum and a small amphitheatre dating from when the city was called Augusta Trayana, as well as the beautiful Ayazmoto Park. We were sadly about 3 weeks too early for the abundant lime trees in the city to be in bloom because apparently the smell is intoxicating! That evening the family and the 3 of us drove about 4 km out of the city to the little village where Nevena's Baba and Diado live - the parents of Nevena's father Stoyan. Baba first showed us round her wonderful garden, full of flowers and veggies, before serving us a delicious Bulgarian meal with mostly home grown/homemade produce (including the wine and rakia!) which we really enjoyed, as we had the previous night.

On Tuesday we decided to drive to Plovdiv (which Alistair hadn't visited) and see the amphitheatre and the Old Town, and we then visited a shop where they hand make folk dance costumes! We had seen Nevena's very pretty costume from Trakia from the shop and needless to say I weakened and have ordered a Pirin costume!

Alistair also ordered a waistcoat and later, when we found the shop Iliana had taken us to, he bought a cummerbund to complete the outfit. Amazingly the lady in the shop recognised us from our visit about 2 weeks earlier! So, all in all, we will be well kitted out for our next party in Oxford!

That evening we went to the Army Club where the weekly meetings of the group that Svetlana started are held and we spent an energetic hour there before going back to Vasil's house; in another little village a few kilometres outside Stara Zagora. Yet again the table was groaning under the weight of more delicious Bulgarian goodies and homemade wine. One of the wines Vasil makes is infused with wild herbs and tastes rather like a Cinzano-type drink and he has won many national prizes for it. "Nazdrave!"

It was very sad to leave Nevena and Svetlana on the Wednesday morning to drive back to Sofia and eventually arrive in London. Bulgaria is a beautiful country and we were so touched by the enormous generosity and kindness of the Bulgarians we'd met. We couldn't have been better looked after by Nevena, Sveta and family and hope we'll soon be able to repay their kindness back in Blighty!


