Dear Janet,

The picture by Lucile Armstrong on the front cover of April News gives a stunning representation of everything Andalusian folkdance represents, and the choice of 'Jaleo' is deliberate.

It vividly portrays the turning movement characteristic of the Jaleo, and shows to best advantage the dress, known as 'traje de faralaes' (pleated dress). 'Farala' (accent on the final 'a') means pleat, and is the description Spanish people use for this dress.

Actually, the Jaleo as taught in dancing class is an almost genteel dance, and a far cry from the sound and fury of popular post-midnight dances, yet it has been adopted as a proxy for all that. 'Es un jaleo' is an everyday Spanish expression for any situation in which people have created confusion out of order – unfair, perhaps, but used in fact. Lucile will have had all this well in mind when she did the picture.

A thing to realise about Lucile's work is that her knowledge was all gathered first-hand. She and her husband were joint Principals of one of the English Schools in Barcelona from 1926 to 1936, and folkdance was her hobby. Her upbringing was also influenced by Hispanic culture. Her parents (English father and French mother) were diplomats in South America. To her knowledge was added a power of understanding and intuition. In this she was helped by Violet Alford, a special friend of hers.

I had the good fortune to join her circle of friends in 1972 when we spent two weeks' holiday in Northern Spain visiting various sites and festivals. She appealed for companions in SIFD News and I turned up together with Joan Evans, a former pupil, and her husband Fred and teenage daughter. I believe our trip was based on a much longer visit by Violet Alford, presumably in the 1920s.

Lucile's view was that everything has a meaning, and it was her hobby to tease out an understanding of that meaning. I could go on to give an interpretation of the Jaleo according to Lucile's understanding, but I do not want to overload this contribution, so conclude with my word of admiration for Lucile's work.

Dancing and cultural tour, Cappadocia, Turkey.

Having recently returned from this uplifting and invigorating trip, expertly conceived and led by Chrisandra, I want to share some of the highlights with you.

Two years ago, on the wonderful 'Dancing on the Bosphorus' tour, the idea to return to Turkey to explore the Cappadocia area was suggested. So, many of us have looked forward to this trip for some time and we were certainly given a wonderful experience.

The dances, taught by Turgay Onatli, Ilknur Demirbag, local dance teachers Selahattin and Levant and Gulcay (accompanied by their delightful baby son), were interpreted by the inspirational Ahmet Turan Demirbag, who sadly, could not dance or teach because of recent ankle surgery. The dances represented many of the regions in Turkey and I look forward to attempting to teach some of them to the Heart of England group. We had live music at every dance session, whilst the recorded music from the DVD was also played so that the participants could become familiar with it.

The wonderful trips organised for us are too numerous to describe, but include a balloon trip, a visit to a traditional hamam, walks in Rose Valley, Pigeon Valley, Derwent Valley and Ilhara valley, visits to Derinkuyu underground city and Hacibektas monastery. A highlight for me was a barbeque in the countryside with live music, dancing and singing, generously hosted by a colleague of Ahmet. Our last trip was to Mustafapaşa, where our guide, Ali, spoke movingly about the 'population exchange' of 1923 and the distress caused to the incoming villagers. Our final stop was the atmospheric Keslik Monastery. This is a peaceful and very special place. There are two small churches, cells and a dining room for the monks inside the monastery. These are the Black Church and the Church of St. Stephen. The frescoes in the Black Church have been turned black with smoke over the centuries. To one side lies the dining hall, a massive room in which 100 people could stay and it is divided in two by arcades. The Church of St. Stephen was carved in the 9C and is located 50m from the monastery. The stunning frescoes, painted in shades of brilliant yellow and orange, can be seen in this church.



The landscape of Cappadocia is breathtaking. The geological formation started with the eruption of Erciyes, Hasan, Melendiz and many other smaller volcanoes. Erosion led to conic shapes with a harder and wider layer of rock on top 'breaking away' from the main plateau. These structures, often referred to as 'fairy chimneys' fill the valleys. The quality of light varies from one moment to the next and gazing at the landscape is spellbinding.

Throughout the tour we encountered generosity, humour and spontaneity. The welcome given to us by many Turkish people we met was fantastic. Grateful thanks go to Chrisandra, our talented dance teachers and everyone else who made this trip the great success it was.

We also welcome Esther Willems for her first visit to Eastbourne, and she will complement Eddy by teaching a variety of dances from other countries. The 2016 Festival runs from Friday 29th April to Monday 2nd May and "Early Bird" tickets will be on sale from 1st November.

The Folk Dance and Costume Atlas of Poland by Henryk Matyka (who on occasion wrote to the News, in the past) gives some detail. The dance is of the Hucule from a region of the Tatra Mountains. An area which has suffered much from Invaders and their actions. I enclose 'extracts' about the dance and music.

Dances of the Hucule

The Arkan linked the dignity of an adult with the wildness of a shepherd boy. Although the dance featured striding steps of moderate tempo there were also sudden fast spins. The men formed a long column, each highlander holding his partner by the belt with one hand, and on the shoulder with the other. Axes with long narrow wooden handles were also in the dance. From time to time these were thrown into the air, the highlanders catching them by jumping up. Crouching movements as in Cossack dances were performed as well as jumps.
