Past Pages

Demonstrating for the Building Fund

John Fisher, Ken Ward, George Sweetland and Ken Blackwood had stints as Editor in the sixties; the two 'Editorial Assistants', Stephen Ward and Lily Southgate both went on to become Editor (Lily for the next 37 years). It seemed customary for all of them to write a substantial editorial (I must try harder!).

More articles and letters were written about demonstrations and shows in the sixties than anything else. The Albert Hall Shows continued and were intended to raise money for the 'Building Fund' which was the other subject regularly in the News (it stood at £800 in 1964). Margery Latham became 'Demonstration Secretary' and wrote urging members to make money through demonstrations and other means to make 1965 'Building Fund Year'.

Margaret Colato with her Los Ibericos group performed Spanish dances throughout the sixties as did other specialist groups - Swedish, Polish, Balkan and Russian. These groups were viewed with apprehension by some who advocated 'general' for all and feared splits in the Society. But these specialists did join the established SIFD classes for the Albert Hall Shows. Shows were put on in the Commonwealth Institute, Town Halls, Festivals, competitions, colleges, venues around London and as far afield as Birmingham. It was (and still is) a very effective method of bringing International Folk Dancing to the attention of the public.

As demonstrations were happening continuously, not surprisingly some dancers tended to concentrate their efforts on one nationality. The costumes of other countries were collected and copied. The Society's collection started to grow, there was concern that costumes borrowed for shows were not being returned, but housing them was also a problem. There were descriptions of different national costumes and cover pictures for the News (many of which have been used again in this decade) illustrating costumes and embroidery designs. Members sent in helpful hints about embroidery, and tales of trips abroad to acquire costumes and fabric and other accessories.

Most classes and groups were still around London and its environs, there was an International Folk Dancing Festival in Folkestone and mention of the Barlow group and another in Birmingham in 1967 (and Guildford, quite near London). Social Dances at Cecil Sharp House (proceeds to the SIFD Building Fund) continued but falling numbers were a worry and Specialisation was seen as one of the causes. Here is a letter from Elaine Chubb that dealt with it:

"Dear Editor,

Society Ritual

The argument about General Dancing v. Specialization seems to be settling down to a ritual, the equivalent of bemoaning the weather in ordinary conversation, and no doubt we should all feel lost without it.

Surely the best thing for the Society is for all members to look on the argument as background noise and just keep on doing the sort of dancing they want to do, whether it is general or specialized. I don't see why it should not be accepted by <u>all</u> members of the Society, as it is by many, that people may have other interests or family commitments which prevent them coming dancing more than once or twice a week, and that it is reasonable to expect them to come to the type that they most enjoy. It is pointless for the keen general dancers to hope that if they keep on long enough the erring specialists will creep penitently back to the fold; all that will happen is that the specialists will get pushed into more extreme attitudes in self defence, and will feel the victims of an Inquisition (anti-Spanish).

I suspect that in fact the Society will flourish best when all members can feel at home in it and can concentrate on enjoying the dancing, rather than being forced to take up sides in an argument which is becoming rather a bore to people who know what dancing they like best and what classes thay intend to come to, despite vilification!

Finally, may I suggest that, to reduce this discussion to its proper place as a ritual which is rapidly losing its meaning, we should devise a Society dance, in which all members can join, and which could be used as a chorus dance at the Albert Hall or to set the mood at Surrey Creststyle weekends. Doubtless other members can think of appropriate figures for inclusion in this suggested sequences:

Idea for SIFD International Dance

Longways for as many as will; specialists and non-specialists form two separate lines facing each other - no partners, but dance with opposites in some figures.

Music: two separate bands playing independently behind each line.

Costumes: Various

Figure 1 Set to R, set to L, honour your opposites.

4 bars (This figure generally omitted).

Figure 2 As in Chapelotte - specialists advance, while general dancers

32 bars retreat; bourree step. (Repeat). Repeat vice versa.

Chorus Balance R, balance L, shout "Boo!", stamping R and L and

4 bars snapping fingers or castanets.

Figure 3 "Face in lines and advance to meet opposite line with 4

8 bars Dalstegs, passing hand horizontally across forehead with each Dalsteg (as if searching)". Acknowledge existence of other line, then "push one another away and run backwards to original position".

Figure 4 Each line turns its back to other; non-specialists do any steps 16 bars on spot they choose; specialists do any Balkan or Spanish steps on spot, again according to choice.

Figure 5 Advance to meet other line, steps according to fancy. On first beat of 5th bar, tread on each other's toes; retreat with Hopak limping step or Paduška "threes" step.

Figure 6 Balance on spot, making grimaces and yelling "Hoy!" and 4 bars other suitable cries.

Figure 7 Advance with chorus step of Estonian Sadala Polka, shaking fore-fingers (4 bars); quarrel figure (face-slapping); retreat with chorus step (4 bars).

Figure 8 Selected solo dancers from each line meet to perform any or (while all of: Basque stick dance, Shiptar sword dance, Schuhplattler, music etc., while chorus dancers join hands to form two separate

lasts) rings round the soloists. Specialists do Kolos and Sardanas, non-specialists do anything but; circle endlessly, in opposite directions and never getting anywhere. Continue endlessly."

By the end of the sixties Shows and Social Dances only covered expenses and mention of the Building Fund eased off. The weekends away continued from the fifties, and the Swansea Summer School became very popular and much praised by members around the country; it satisfied the needs of those who wished to specialise in one country's dances and also the needs of those who just wished to dance international dances socially.

Before I leave the sixties I must share an excerpt from my favourite letter of the decade:

"I have always been taught that it is impossible to dance well unless one is dressed correctly, and our tutors always insisted that tights and ballet pumps be worn by their pupils. I would like to see it made a rule whereby at all classes, ballet tights and shoes must be worn. Complete freedom of movement would then be achieved and if some of the more simple bar work were introduced, this should improve your dancers' technique.

The Manor is an interesting building with old stables converted to accommodate dancers. Hay was available at little extra cost.

The annual croquet match took place with a record number of players, none of whom knew any rules. With a great deal of cheating; moving of hoops, poking balls through the wrong way and shouting to put players off. There was worse but won't be written about here but did add to the hilarity. All this was going on despite Robin being a referee as he was deeply interested in his newspaper rather than fair play!

In her inimitable style Janet W led the dancing and interspersed long lists of requests with new dances. These were drawn from the rich repertoire of international folk dance with seductive music which demands that you dance!

Stella provided most of the live music backed up by two fiddlers, Maggie Kaye and partner. David was the techy who made sure, like magic, recorded music went smoothly. Following their wedding a few weeks earlier, a collection was made by those at Halsway and presented to David and Stella as a wedding present and much appreciated by both. Those attending the weekend held a useful discussion about how to rearrange the weekend and include other items of interest. The objective is to attract other dancers to this highly enjoyable SIFD event and beautiful area. Suggestions made included inviting local EFDSS groups and schools to dance around the May Pole, a couple of talks on the history behind some dances, and dispense with the expensive National Trust coach visit. Walks will remain an integral part of the weekend.

Next year it is planned to bring the prices down so book the weekend in the diary – Friday 28 April through to either Monday 1 May which is May Day or extend your stay to Tuesday 2 May.

(see Diary Dates) Dear Janet.

Firstly, I'd like to thank Roy Clark for his series of articles about the early years of the SIFD, it's been interesting. There was much that I did not know, having been a member for only 30 years. The energy level and dedication in the early years must have been very exciting.

Much has changed since the days of a society with large groups and classes, mostly based in London and with people attending classes, and performing in a wide variety of styles. I have seen a report written in the 1980s when the committee were worried because the numbers at London general international Sunday Dances had gone below 60.

Now less than a quarter of members and groups are within the London and Greater London postcode areas, and the number of groups has expanded: over 80 nationally, with less than 30 meeting in the London area. Even as late as the 1990s there were only about 30 groups, but twice as many individual members.

Fewer classes claim to be "General International", and of those, most show preferences towards just a few countries or styles, suited to the demographics of their members. Day and Weekend courses happen all over the country, organised by many volunteers and attracting people from everywhere.

Once there was a small repertoire, known by most members, now there are vast collections of music and dance notes and recordings and a common repertoire barely exists. Many members travel to courses and festivals to learn even more.


With a shrinking membership, there are fewer people available to do work, and we have a committee whose interests and locations do not truly reflect those of the membership. 7 of the 9 current committee members live in or near London, 4 love doing Scandinavian couple dance, one rarely dances at all, 3 are regular teachers or social dance leaders, 6 go to "general" events and 2 dance almost exclusively Balkan, 5 have not yet retired from paid work. Most of the committee work hard on all sorts of projects and routine admin and 3 are also involved in running other international folk dance events. The only way we can have a committee that reflects the membership, and has the time and energy to make changes, is for you to volunteer.

The society, and all the classes, depend on you to spread the word, to put a copy of the News where class members will see it and find out about other events, to leave cards and class lists wherever you go. It helps, too if you can pass information about teachers you meet to the committee, so we have a pool of good people to invite to teach.

Come to the 70th AGM. We need to have almost 10% of the membership there, and we chose Nottingham because it's a shorter distance for most people than London. We are very grateful to Nutbrook for volunteering to host it, and for organising the workshops and party. Next month there'll be information about the agenda.

Over the next few months I'd love to be reading about summer courses and festivals - Musik vid Siljan, Norrlandia, Gennetines, Llangollen, Greece, where else?
