Expand or Retrench?

My overall impression of the Society in the seventies as told by the SIFD News is growth - members and groups are spreading around Britain - Bert Price and Will Green in particular successfully start initiatives (teacher and proficiency badges, children's classes, safaris). The members (spreading around the country) seem to be enjoying dancing, and researching dances and costume abroad.

There was much soul searching about the character of the Society, its role, image and potential size and power, here is one example:

"1976 is Crisis Year

Some years ago I wrote in SIFD News that "success is just round the corner" and that we active members were not ready to meet it. Some readers smiled at me indulgently, some ignored me, some were not even indulgent. Now we are standing at the corner and can see round it. "Success" - even oversuccess - is threatening us, and we still aren't ready for it.

Frances Horrocks is nearing the maximum amount of work we can hope that she (and her family!) will deal with in handling orders for records and books. Lily Southgate is nearing the maximum amount of work she and her helpers can turn out, and has almost exceeded the number of copies she can get stapled, folded, packed, addressed, and despatched in time.

Nearly all weekends away are fully booked well ahead, with waiting lists. No London class is short of pupils, and more classes open from time to time. Only the third Sunday Dances at Trevelyan Hall are weak - especially in respect of ladies - but this is for understandable reasons. Cash reserve is accruing substantially. Membership is a record, with figures rocketing.

All this time, our publicity has been cut well back. In fact, only one annual and one quarterly advertisement now appear, and few leaflets are given out nowadays. The results of more effort could be overwhelming. In 1976 we must decide whether to expand or to retrench.

Two attitudes prevail:

- (a) We should drive forward to make SIFD as big and influential as we can, uniting all possible groups and classes.
- (b) We are better off organized as local groups, loosely related, not aspiring to any national function.

The first could head us into complications. With prestige would come responsibility. Larger membership would require professionally printed SIFD News (which might be irregularly produced). Wider influence would bring in a wider range of people with a wider range of views and aspirations. More work would demand paid workers. That dream of a headquarters might <u>have</u> to come true. Personal relationships within our organization would alter.

The second would leave us more satisfied as dancers, though contributing nothing to the folkdance world. It would be less time-consuming for individuals, and fewer individuals would be asked to help. Life would be simpler. We would remain a voluntarily run organization, with less responsibility for pressing the idea in non-SIFD circles.

Which do you want? I repeat what I said before. What is called "success" is just round the corner. With a little extra effort we could sweep the board - <u>if</u> we want to. I add this: To do this would be frighteningly burdensome, and would soon demand FAR more work from FAR more people.

In our thirtieth year of existence we must decide.

Will Green"

It seems that everyone was in earnest then, and overall I think we have achieved a compromise between Will's two 'attitudes' now in 2016.

The seventies also saw the sudden loss of two founder members who had worked tirelessly from the beginning: Bert Price and Margery Latham. The bronze (membership), silver (proficiency in one country), gold badges (5 silver) and (teacher) were renamed "Bert Price badges". Margery Latham had continued as Demonstration Secretary and teacher (always steering clear of politics), her wardrobe duties handed over to Janet Woolbar.

By the end of the decade the emphasis within the Society seemed to have shifted from demonstrations to the outside world to social dancing.

Sixties 'Specialists' are now teachers, authenticity becomes important hence the badges. There was much more foreign input; more members go abroad to research dance, music, costume and customs; regional rather than national styles and differences are recognised. Some of the country members envy London members with all their classes and social events, while others are pioneers: Jack Richardson, Sue Clarke, Hilda Sturge and Jill Bransby start new groups out in the sticks. Children's dance classes start and blossom under the guidance of Joan Guest and Frances Horrocks.

The actual Newsletter itself - with Lily as Editor (at that time still Southgate but she reports on jaunts shared with Les Avery) - takes on a regular format - but the production of it was very labour intensive. Not a job I would have taken on then!

# Llangollen 2016

Like SIFD, LIME is celebrating its 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year. The first Llangollen International Musical Eisteddfod was held in 1947 as a means of bringing people together after the turmoil and separation of WW2. It has continued with that emphasis on building peace through the connection between people. This theme was evident in a striking dramatic presentation of the history of the founding of the Eisteddfod in the aftermath of WW2, given by a company of young people, Theatr yr Ifanc/Rhos, from a former mining community near Wrexham. It was continued with the presentation of the first Rotary Peace Prize to the Eisteddfod for its "contribution to the furtherance of peace and understanding throughout peoples of the world". On the Thursday, the day president was Martin Bell OBE; in his speech he gave a stirring critique of war-making in the modern age. Terry Waite, as always, emphasised the message of peace and international goodwill in his addresses as President of the Eisteddfod.

#### And now, the dance!

This year the programme has been restructured. Old hands expecting the parade to start events on Tuesday afternoon were disappointed. The children's day is now on Wednesday. The Children's Folk Dance Group Competition in the afternoon was won by a Bhangra group, Gabhru Punjab De. Second was Danswyr Penrhyd, demonstrating Welsh village culture with games and clog dancing. Northern Lights came third including polished performance of the Maypole dance. Mother Touch, a lively group of young children from Zimbabwe gave a rousing performance though stronger on enthusiasm than good timing.

The parade is now on Friday, which has become the main dance day of the week. And quite a day it was. The Open Floor Dance competition was not as spectacular as Loughiel's Celtic Battlefield, last year; for once the remarkably skilled dancers of Loughiel had not come to Llangollen – giving other groups a chance. The winner was one of two groups from Nidus Theatre Arts, a professional part-time stage school for children and teenagers based in Cwmbran. They offered an amusing ballet based on photography "Say Cheese". Second was Gema Sutra Nusantara, an impressive group from Indonesia, much of their dancing being in a long line kneeling, accompanied by traditional gamelan instruments.

Third was an Irish group, Spraoi, who gave a thoughtful presentation of dance reflecting on WW1.

The Traditional Folk Dance Competition had only six competitors. Two groups, Heritage Dancers from India and one from Ghana and had not arrived, apparently with visa problems. Gema Sutra Nusantara from Indonesia came first with high marks (90.7) for a remarkable performance. Second and third places were taken by two Indian groups, Gabhru Punjab De and Sheererpunjab (from the Nottingham Punjabi community) An Albanian group, Ubelat e Roshnikut was included at the last minute to make up the numbers and their colourful village dancing delighted the traditionalists in the audience, though they were not well-geared up to performance and lost out on marks. Another treat was Aichurok from Kyrghistan (wrongly attributed to Kurdistan in the programme and on Llangollen/tv) who gave a colourful, if classical rather than folk, programme. The other group was a Berber group from Morocco with a somewhat monotonous presentation.

The entry for the Choreographed/Stylised Folk Dance was even more sparse. There were only three groups listed, of whom one was Heritage (India) who hadn't arrived. But the two were joined by Gabhru Punjab De (also from India), Perree Bane from the Isle of Man and the children from Zimbabwe. The Indian group narrowly beat the Indonesians; Perree Bane came third.

All but two of the evening concerts are given over entirely to professional performances. Last year the dance winners competed for dance champion of the world alongside the Choir of the World, but this year the winners of the three main dance competitions performed in the Friday concert, competing for the Lucile Armstrong Prize. Hilda and I were the only SIFD members there so I had the honour of presenting the award on your behalf to Gema Sutra Nusantara (Indonesia), well-deserved winners. I think SIFD is very fortunate to be recognised by this award, given the rather small proportion of the prize money we contribute — £100 out of the £500 the winning group gets in addition to the £750 first prize for the original competition, and the cost of the elegant glass trophy. The total prize money for the Traditional Dance, which our £100 contribution in memory of Lucille used to go to is £1500.

It is sad that the Eisteddfod is attracting such small numbers of dance groups. This year the only group from the continent of Europe was the Albanians and they were not originally entered for the competitions. I was somewhat encouraged by a conversation with a member of the of the Standing Board who told me that a bid for funding has gone to the Welsh government to employ a development officer for dance. Watch this space. Maybe we can look forward to a resurgence of folk dance performance in the Eisteddfod and more members of SIFD will be encouraged to attend.

In the meantime, do have a look at http://llangollen.tv/dawns/ where you can enjoy all the stage performances at your leisure.

Finally a word about the adjudicators. Ahmed Luleci, whom some of us remember from his teaching Turkish dance at the Summer School in York in the 90s, was here again, and Ed Austin from Brigham Young University, Utah, was very welcome back after a year's break. We don't always agree with the adjudicators' decisions but their feedback on the performers is always impressive — acute in judgment but always kind and encouraging.


