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

Past Pages

The News in the Nineties

Mostly it seems members were too busy enjoying themselves dancing to concern themselves about the day to day running of the Society; still 'in London', the shortage of volunteers worsened to the extent of no chairman until Jeanette Hull stepped in (for the first time) and took on the job. SIFD Badges gradually fell out of use, partly because of the lack of volunteers to organise the courses, and, partly because many (out of town) members had a different repertoire, others just danced for fun and saw no point.

Wilf Horrocks was a regular contributor of sheet music throughout the decade; also Mike Gilbert furnished a lot of information about playing folk music. There was still a very long calendar of forthcoming events around Britain and abroad to pore over. Members wrote copiously about their holidays, sometimes with only a very tenuous connection to folk-lore. The monthly list of SIFD groups and classes disappeared (probably because of the cost), and so did much of the 'educational' content (which had been so much a feature of the eighties). However, one article that bucked the trend is reproduced below:

"Style Concepts

Ever since I began International Folk Dancing I have been fascinated by the differences in dances from different countries and by what constitutes the style of a particular region. How could I copy this style myself? More importantly, as a non-native teacher, how could I teach a dance style to other people?

When I was training students to go out into schools to teach Folk Dancing, both they and I had been trained in Modern Educational Dance following the principles of Rudolf Laban, so to convey differences in style, as well as trying to demonstrate them in my own dancing, I could draw on previous experiences of effort actions, differences in tension, of space, time and flow. Nowadays my work is with quite different groups of people. Many have had no previous dance experience at all, and this is the sort of clientele with which new aspiring teachers will probably have to deal.

At the Teaching Forum held earlier this year I hear that there were some

people wishing to come forward for training to become S.I.F.D. teachers. I want to pass on to them, and to anyone else who is interested in the learning process, some work which was done during our teacher training course with Jan Knoppers, the chief teacher trainer for the Dutch Folk Dance organisation. We were asked to take some region with which we were familiar and to "brain-storm" ourselves to bring into our minds the essential points of the style we wished to convey, plus and "helping words" ("Hulp-text") we could use during the teaching to help the class members to understand the effect they were trying to achieve. We also noted any other things which might influence the style, such as the type of shoe worn and the influence of costume.

I recently taught a few Serbian dances during a Day Course at Eastbourne, and there were also Serbian workshops at Eastbourne by the "Opanka" group from Manchester, so I am starting with some style concepts from that region. Remember that these are just my own mindjottings to illustrate the process of accumulating style concepts for yourself. I have been very impressed by the work Michael Gilbert has done on finding the right style for playing folk music from different areas, and I think we should apply the same thought and care to our interpretation of the steps. Feel free to disagree with, or add to my ideas. This is not a thesis on Serbian style, but a model to show you what you might do as a teacher when you prepare your lesson. Without style, a dance is nothing.

Serbia

General Style Concepts (Note form)

Poised, upright, proud, ankle-knitting, dance from knee, upper body straight, still except when bouncing, up-down, bounce-bounce, shaking, vibrating, symmetry what done to R often rep. to L, very small steps, close to ground (flat shoe), control, kolo-line, leader led, basic + development, improvisation.

Regions

Central Serbia Śumadija + Pomorovje Above concepts apply. Dances like: Śetnja, Moravsko, Śumadinka, Tasino, Ruzmarin, Cent. Serbian Suite, Devojačko Kolo, Zikino.

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East Serbia Niš, Pirot, Leskovac

Close to Bulgaria. Bulgarian rhythms. X-hand hold ("Lesa"), fast small steps, sways, quick changes direction, often asymmetric. Shouts. Dances like: Što mi Omilelo Nane, PošIa Rumena, Lile, Lile (Šop rhythm 9/8 SSSS. Dajčavo, Čačak.

South Serbia Vranje

Turkish influence-music, dance, costume. Women baggy trousers, scarf, arm + hip movements. Tambourines (men + women). Dances like: Vranjanka, Duj-Duj (gypsy), soft feet.

North-East Serbia. Banat + Vojvodina

<u>Banat</u>. Close to Romania. Very small steps, virtuoso, acrobatic male contests, implements, bottles, daggers, sticks, much shaking, Ukrainian-type steps. Couples, turning, trios. Twisting, plaiting legs, tension.

<u>Vojvodina</u>. Close to Hungary + Romania. Mixed population, Serbs, Slovaks, Ruthenes from Ukraine), Hungarians, Romanians. Women's costumes silk, Hungarian-style. Men, boots, spurs, bells. Intricate twists in figures for trios. Men compete, women support. Dances like: Bunjevačko Momačko, Logovac. Tension, shaking.

I hope that some of the other teachers who did the course of training will offer to share with members some of the work that they did on "style concepts for other regions."

Aulona Folk Festival, Vlorë, Albania

This May I headed to the sunny south-western port town of Vlora to attend the CIOFF Aulona Festival. Having lived in Gjirokastër for eight years, I was trying to find out when the next Gjirokastër National Folk Festival was going to take place and came across the Vlora festival via the CIOFF website. I noted that it attracts European folk dance groups, especially from Balkan countries, so thought it would be good to check the festival out with a view to taking other Balkan dancing enthusiasts to attend this three day event.

Vlora is a popular beach destination for many Albanians and is also important in Albanian modern history as the town where Ismail Qemali raised the Albanian flag in 1912, declaring independence of Albania from the Ottoman Turks. The festival usually takes place around the middle of May to coincide with the opening ceremony for the tourist season in this coastal city. Evening performances take place over three days and on the last day, a Saturday, the dance groups taking part in the festival process up the main boulevard, dancing as they do so, until they reach a square in front of the port.



It was wonderful to walk alongside the participating dance troupes. Groups from Bulgaria, Italy, Poland, Kosovo and Albania snaked their way around the square dancing Albanian dances as the town leaders declared that the tourist season had begun.

On the second day of the festival we all headed to a beach around the Bay of Vlora where groups enjoyed dancing their own dances. There was also time for swimming and sunbathing before eating at the beach restaurant Bojo.

Group leaders were treated to a fish lunch in the restaurant and though I was not a group leader, I was also included. I shared my room with a lady from a village in the Gjirokaster region who sings with other Albanians living in Greece in a polyphonic singing choir. In the evenings groups congregated for dinner and dance in one or other of the hotels hosting groups. On the final after the closing performances there was a festive evening at a local hotel. It was good to have the opportunity to connect with dancers from different countries and to dance with them.

Next year the festival runs from 11th-13th May and I would like to take a group to attend the festival and also to get to know more about Albanian history and culture. We could visit some of the local tourist attractions, such as the Independence Museum, the ethnographic museum, the 12th century Byzantine church of St. Mary in nearby Zvernec or the ancient city of Apollonia. I'm also hoping to take a morris dance group to perform, too. I propose flying to Corfu, crossing to Saranda by ferry and after an overnight stay in Saranda, we can journey along the stunning southern coast towards Vlorë, passing attractive villages clinging to the olive clad mountain slopes dropping down to the sea. After the festival we can return to Saranda via the attractive hill town of Gjirokaster with its stone houses and cobbled streets and in close to Saranda is the UNESCO World Heritage Site, the ancient city of Butrint. I would like to hear from anyone interested in joining me to experience this festival and get to know something of the hospitable land of Albania. AGM 2016, in Nottingham

Gill Morral and all of the Nutbrook group were excellent hosts for the AGM. They organised a very enjoyable weekend of workshops, a 70th anniversary cake, an excellent evening buffet, a costume display and a social dance with choices of dances that everyone could join in.

The full minutes of the 2016 Annual General Meeting, will be published later in 2017, this is a summary of the main points.

The motion that the membership structure be amended to remove the differential between London and Country membership was passed, along with the motion setting out the proposed new (simplified) rates. So from September 2017 individual membership will be £20 (or £13 if the SIFD News etc is received electronically). Family membership will be £24 (or £17 if the SIFD News etc is received electronically).


The meeting passed the motion that the SIFD should join the organisation One Dance UK. It is felt that as this organisation acts specifically for Dance in the UK membership will be useful and beneficial for the Society.

Jeanette Hull announced that the people working on the project to make archive material available to members had made a lot of progress during the year. A USB memory stick with over 4000 items on it will soon be available. Those attending the AGM were offered a chance to order in advance. When the last stage of work is done and sufficient copies have been made, we will advertise it in the News for all members.

At the 2015 AGM it was observed that the Society has a lot of Associated and Affiliated Groups, and that many of them have members who are not SIFD members. A small team has been formed to investigate the possibilities and implications of a change to our membership structure to create a form of membership that would reach all class/group members. There will be more information on this when the team have met and completed their first phase of work.
