Treats in Bromlev

Having carelessly suffered a heart attack in December. I had to postpone my return to teaching my classes. I decided to call in a SIFD teacher to support me and teach at the first classes and arranged for Frank Dowling to come and remind us of dances we do that have originated with him and maybe introduce some new dances.

He taught Dragaicuta, which I learned from him at Swansea in 1981 and gave us a wealth of background information about the origin of the dance. We also revised Skopski sa sa which Frank and I learned from Paul Mulders in Whitby, and learned the Pogonisios/Giatros that Dimmitris taught at Swansea. Several other dances were revised or taught and the class members of Bromley International and Bromley U3A voted the visit a great success.

One member of Bromley International brought in a flier about a Bulgarian dance class on Saturday afternoons in [can you believe it?] Bromley Library. It is a group of Bulgarians led by a gualified teacher Daniela. They do basic dances from the Internet using a laptop and a projection screen so that there is a performance to watch if you are not dancing. I recognised a lot of the music and dances - Gankino, Elena Mome etc. but sometimes the names on screen were different from those we have learned. There were mostly young Bulgarians, very little English spoken or understood. I can supply more details to anyone interested.

I can recommend both Frank's teaching and the Bulgarian Group "From the Spring", as they have been much enjoyed in Bromley.

Professor Nenad Bićanić

It was with great sadness that I learned of the death of our Croatian teacher Nenad Bićanić. Nenad taught 2 Summer schools for the SIFD, one in Swansea, and one in Edinburgh, and several Day courses. His classes were always lively and enjoyable, and he had a huge sense of fun. I remember the translation of one of our action songs, "in a cottage in a wood" into SerboCroat, as it was at the time, to be sung at our evening sing-alongs.

He extended our knowledge of the dances of other regions of the former Jugoslavia too, as at that time the country had not split. He was a great stylist, in everything.

In 2012, Nenad came to Manchester/Calver to give one of the weekend courses which Julie Korth and I started some years ago, and which Mary O' Mahony was also organising. He was delighted to see myself and Janice (Wrench, of Živko Firfov) there, and wearing costume. He saw that there was tremendous enthusiasm in this area for the dancing. 3 years ago, Nenad called me and asked to meet me in Bakewell to discuss a project with which he was involved. Knowing that I had a group here, an"ad contact with other folk dancers, he wanted us to dance, in costume if possible, at an important Croatian event near my home here in the Peak Disitrct.

On entering the EU, Croatia decided to give a gift to the UK, and Nenad was influential in the choice of an Istrian Kažun for this gift. The Kažun is a shepherd's hut, built with the skill of drystone walling. This is the link between this area and Istria, shepherding, and drystone walling. Skilled workmen came over from Istria to construct the hut, out of our local stone, on one of the Peak District Trails near here. Nenad was in charge of the project.

The day of the presentation was fine and warm. In the morning, Nenad held a rehearsal of our dance at the centre where Janet King has her weekly U3A dance group. He taught us all Letovanić, and in the afternoon we performed it in the presence of the Croatian Ambassador. The Peak District was at its most beautiful that day, and we performed to live music provided by the orchestra of lady Manners School. Nenad was revered in his own field of Civil Engineering, and held several professorships, but on the Anniversary of the presentation he contacted me to say he was as proud of this project as of anything else he had done in his life. Nenad Bićanić

Recently I heard the very sad news that my old teacher and friend Nenad Bicanic had passed away. Older SIFD members will remember him from the 1977 Edinburgh Summer School where he and his delightful wife Jasna first taught Croatian folk dances. Some years later they also taught day courses in London. Whilst lecturing at Swansea University both he and Jasna would visit the social evenings of the summer schools joining in enthusiastically with all the dances.

As students in Zagreb both Nenad and Jasna danced with one of the best student groups there and Nenad kept up his association with the group long after, helping to organise a reunion group for ex members. I met him in Zagreb more than 40 years ago shortly after they had returned from living in the Netherlands. What immediately struck me was their friendliness and hospitality. Even though they had never met me before nothing was too much trouble for them despite being both very busy. They just seemed delighted that someone was interested in their heritage. On subsequent visits I also met the group that Nenad directed for several years and brought to England to compete in the (now sadly defunct) Teesside International Eisteddfod where they won first prize in the Adult Folk Dance section. Later we met again in Switzerland when we invited him to teach there.

He was and remained a very active man despite suffering poor health in later years. Even after retiring from his very prestigious position of Emeritus Professor at Glasgow University where he held the Regius Chair of civil engineering he kept on going, dividing his time between Oxford and Croatia where he still lectured part time at Rijeka University. I shall certainly miss being able to dance with him again. Nenad was a truly fine man, a brilliant civil engineer who was loved and respected by his colleagues and students and I am sure that the same can be said for all folk dancers who had the pleasure of dancing with him.


We had a lot of fun with Belco in April.



MUSIC 'A' (Twice)

- 1 Starting on the right foot, the girls enter in single file, with hands on hips, walking with steps which sweep slightly across the line of direction, keeping the body over the line.24 steps, turning to face to their left, in line, on the last 4 steps.
- All link right arms on the first beat, sway to the right & left for 6 counts.
 6 steps forward, sweeping the feet as in 1.
 With csardas steps..2 R, 1 L; x 4,moving forward and keeping the line straight.

MUSIC 'B' (Twice)

3. Remain linked and take 9 running steps backwards to make the line a semi-circle.

All the dancers make quick little swivel steps on the spot, while the end dancers run to meet each other, take a shoulder hold, turn each other with running steps, run to their own place, and turn on the spot.

4. All running, increase the depth of the semi-circle and the end dancers lead their own half of the line (all still linked), through an arch made by the central pair, then through each arch in turn in their own half of the line, turning themselves under and joining the semi-circle into a circle at the end, everyone's hands held high.

MUSIC 'C' (Once)

5. The circle moves anti-clockwise with this sequence of steps....; step right, cross left foot over right foot and lower arms, step right then behind with left foot making a small dip. 8 times, then on bar 9, keeping the hands low after the initial lowering on bar 1,and now slightly quickening, make this pattern...

2 csardas to the right, slightly out of the circle,

2 csardas to the left, slightly out of the circle,

2 csardas to the right, facing into the circle,

2 csardas to the left, facing into the circle,

4-step run into the circle... R,L,R, point left foot, Repeat backwards, Repeat forwards into the circle then lift right arm high, over the girl at the right, to hold hands behind each other, right over left. This reduces the size of the circle.

MUSIC 'D' (Twice)

6. Two-step csardas to right and left, 3 times. The movements to the right being bigger than those to the left.

continued..>

One csardas - to the right, step right then sway to right and left, then holding right arm high, run round in a small circle to own right, and relink into the circle.

7. The circle runs to the left gathering momentum. On the 7th bar take shoulder-hold in pairs, running round in a small circle, then on bar 10-12, relink into the circle and continue to run to the left. stop.

MUSIC 'E' (Twice, then last 6 bars slowly).

8. Lippentoś...

Quick steps, step to the right, close left to right, then with feet a little apart, bend the knees \mathcal{N} \mathcal{I} This dip is lippentoś. Make this step in this sequence...

One-step csardas right, lippentoś, repeat to the left. 3 patterns. Then make the csardas with a double lippentoś, right and left x 2.

- 9. 12 rida steps to the left, then run to the left, opening the circle into a straight line on bars 9-12, then make a sharp stop.
- 10 Slowly and lyrically.

6 steps forward as in figure 1, starting on right foot and gently waving the right arm.

4 steps to turn on own, to the right with both arms high and wide, then as the dancers reform the line, they take hands, holding high, slightly quickening, and step backwards on right then left foot, then make 3 steps forward on right, left, right, then close feet together, lower arms, and bow on the last beat.

5

These notes were either from Sybil Chapman or Margery Latham. It is not a dance you can learn from notes unless you have a fair idea of what it's like.
