Report on the 2017 AGM

Twenty-five members attended the Meeting in Storrow at Cecil Sharp House on 9th September. The full Minutes of the AGM will be published in due course.

The Chairman Jeanette Hull presented her Report, which had been published with the Agenda. The ensuing discussion referred to the ways in which the SIFD can give financial help to its groups and members in projects and ventures in the interests of international folk dance. The problems presented by the decreasing size of the Committee and the unwillingness of people to come forward in response to requests for help were mentioned. It was advised that the Digital Archive Memory Stick update should be available later in the year.

The Treasurer Judith Payling presented her Report which had been published with the Agenda. Discussion on the Sunday Dances followed. The Independent Examiner's Report, previously published, was accepted and Denis McCarthy was re-appointed as Independent Examiner.

Following presentation of the Membership Secretary Dalila Heath's previously published Report there was discussion about falling individual membership. The Meeting was told that the subgroup set up at the previous AGM, to consider whether the membership structure should change to somehow take account of dancers currently members of groups but not of the SIFD itself, would be reporting in due course.

The new Committee was announced. The new Committee are Judith Payling, Holly Payling, Richard Mellish, Dalila Heath, John Stewart and Caspar Cronk. It was announced that the new Committee would appoint its officers at its first meeting. Mary O'Mahony and Jeanette Hull were both standing down from the Committee, with effect from this AGM. No nominations had been received for new Committee members.

Within the item Any Other Business there was discussion on a number of topics as follows:

- · SIFD News.....people were encouraged to write articles and send them to the Editor.
- · General Information about Committee Meetings, and when and where they are held.

- · The Quorum required for the AGM, and whether the size specified in the Constitution presented a problem.
- · Llangollen International Eisteddfod and SIFD's donation towards prize money in memory of Lucile Armstrong, made from funds donated when she died.
- · The Summer School and similar events
- · Support for Dance Around the World and the group Friday Feet
- · An Equipment review, which it was proposed should be followed by appropriate action to ensure that SIFD has modern equipment that can cope with old and new technology, and which could be loaned to groups.
- · Information about MCs at Sunday Dances and Balkanplus a query was raised, and in response it was confirmed that the practice was that details are shown in the SIFD News.

SIFD Dances

The Sunday dances have been consistently making a loss. Despite some attempts to increase their appeal, they are in practice attended almost exclusively by Society members, and we as a national Society cannot continue indefinitely to subsidise a local event that is mainly for our members in the London area.

The dances will therefore have to cease before long unless they can be made to break even, or at least to come very close. We have enquired about the possibility of using Storrow at Cecil Sharp House but that it is not available on Sundays. The dances will therefore continue at Primrose Hill for the time being but the price will increase to £12 per head for January and February.

We will review the situation in the light of the numbers attending in January and February. Possibilities to be considered will include changing to the lower hall at Primrose Hill, reducing the duration of the dances, or increasing the price further.

Committee Meeting Report

This is a report on the Meeting held in October 2017.

Officers

Firstly, the Committee agreed that Richard Mellish would be acting Chairman for the year, and he chaired the meeting. Judith Payling has agreed to continue as Treasurer and Dalila Heath as Secretary.

Finance

The Finance Report followed. The Treasurer confirmed that the Charity Commission Return for 2016 had been submitted, and the Society's Insurance renewed. Regarding the current year's financial position a small deficit is anticipated. It was confirmed for the record that small grants of financial assistance had been given to Sheffield EuroSessions, and to Elsa Perez for work on a Riel dance project. A request previously received from Eastbourne International Folk Festival for funding was discussed. It was agreed to hold further discussions with the Festival organisers before deciding whether to provide any funding.

Membership

On Membership, the Membership Secretary reported that about 20 members had not yet renewed their subscription, and would be reminded on this. There is a new Affiliated Group – Kitka. There are no outstanding Group renewals. Stella Wentworth has been accepted as a Life Member.

Publicity

The next step in the SIFD Website Development was discussed and actioned. Revision of the Groups Leaflets had been completed by Alison Scrimshaw, and the leaflets printed. The Committee noted the Report and Recommendations of the informal Publicity sub committee that met in the summer.

It was commented that we need to remind group leaders publicising events to send information both to the News and to Dalila Heath so she can arrange for it to be put on the SIFD website.

SIFD Courses and Dances

The loss arising on the Sunday Dances, and action to be taken, was discussed. See separate announcement in this issue of the News. Regarding the Teaching Group/Course the Committee notes that this has

not proceeded as initially hoped because it has proved very difficult to co-ordinate. The Daycourse programme continues on hold, pending ideas for renewing active interest and encouraging people to attend. Proposal for an inexpensive residential SIFD-sponsored event to attract young people, over the Easter 2018 holiday.

It was agreed to await an update from John Stewart on behalf of the organisers before discussing this further. Meanwhile the Committee once again gave their approval of the proposals and confirmed that the Society will support the event financially.

Llangollen International Eisteddfod

The SIFD's contribution to prize money at the Folk Dance Competition, in memory of Lucile Armstrong a former judge at the competition, in whose memory donations were received from members when she died, was discussed. It was agreed to continue the present arrangements.

Members' Handbook

The Committee discussed the position on the amendment of this, which had been "on hold" for some time. It was noted that for the future a decision would be needed on whether a printed format should continue to be offered, or alternatively electronic information. Meanwhile the outstanding points holding up the revision will be looked at and hopefully resolved.

Matters arising from the AGM

- · See the Any Other Business section of the Report on the AGM. All these points were discussed. Some are covered elsewhere in this Report.
- · Reports will be made to the membership via the SIFD News on proceedings at Committee Meetings.
- The ways in which the Society can financially assist its groups and members will be recapped in the News.
- \cdot It was agreed that a goodwill payment would be made to Dance Around The World 2017, in recognition and support of their work in promoting international folk dance and music. We will discuss with Friday Feet how we can best assist them.
- · The Equipment review will be completed and the appropriate action necessary to ensure that SIFD has modern equipment that can cope with old and new technology, and which can be loaned to groups, will then be considered.

How can the SIFD help you?

The Society is always keen to support its groups and members in ventures and projects furthering the cause of International Folk Dance and Music.

Over the years announcements have been made about the ways that groups and members can obtain support. Details of these are summarised:

Helping New Groups get started

It is recognised that the initial costs of setting up a new group and the running costs during the period in which a group becomes established can be prohibitive. A scheme has been set up under which, as appropriate, the SIFD offers assistance to a member setting up a group. The assistance can include a hall hire subsidy, contribution to publicity costs, 10 hours free teaching, insurance benefits, and advice.

Events and Activities Underwriting Policy

This Policy allows the Society to underwrite an event or activity, or provide a subsidy, if the event or activity is in furtherance of the Society's objectives as set out in the Constitution, and if in the absence of financial support the event or activity might not take place, would not take place, or would be substantially less effective.

The Frank Flanagan Bursary Scheme

Part of the bequest left to SIFD by Frank Flanagan has been used to establish a bursary fund to make awards to members. The object of the awards is to provide financial support for the attendance of SIFD Teachers and potential teachers and leaders at appropriate training events and courses, with resultant benefit to the Society.

SIFD Weekends

Money in the Frank Flanagan Fund can be used to financially underwrite Weekends, which it is intended should include teaching sessions, as well as social dancing.

Please contact the SIFD Committee for more details. All applications are considered on their merits, and taking account of the foreseen benefit to the Society's objectives in relation to the amount of money sought and the state of the Society's finances at the time.

In addition, SIFD Equipment and Costumes may be borrowed by groups and members.

List of SIFD Groups and Classes

I am pleased to report that the collating of all the details of SIFD Groups and Classes is now complete for 2017, and the finished list with updated details should be accompanying this copy of the SIFD News (or one very soon for those who receive the News by post.) This is a detailed list, only circulated within the Society.

The leaflets this year have a new look. As space was getting so tight, it was decided to divide the information into three leaflets, instead of two. Fortunately a line drawn roughly from Bristol to the Wash proved a good division, with almost the same number of groups either side. So there is now a leaflet to cover the area North of this line, a second to cover the area South of this line, and a third for the London area. The advantages are that there is more room – the Name of the group or class is now mentioned, an email address included where given, and if you sent me one, your logo appears next to your entry.

Another change is that each Group and Class is being sent some of these leaflets, hoping that they will be handed out at festivals and dance-outs. Cost has dictated that only a small number will be sent initially, but if more are required, please let me know.

I would like to thank all group leaders who have rejoined (especially those who replied promptly) and for supplying me with any changes to their details. We have sadly lost three groups this year Cambridge International, Withernsea and Pembroke International Folk Dance Group. But on the plus side, we have gained three – welcome to Kitka Bulgarian Folk Dance Group in Rochester, and Zdravets Bulgarian Folk Dance Group in Portsmouth. And welcome back to Lewes Israeli Folk Dance Group. If you're nearby, do support them.

Please could you check your entries, where applicable, and let me know if you notice any errors. Apologies in advance...Too late I'm afraid to correct the leaflets, but the detailed list can be updated straight away, and of course the website.

Report on 2017 Dance Around the World

How do they do it? This year's was the best ever, with a great atmosphere. The House was buzzing and absolutely packed.

My warm-ups were well attended, and everyone was game for some of the more challenging moments such as "Helicopters" and Duna Ide.

Guildford Hungarian Group: This was one of several groups that presented a whole community of dancers including very young children. It is a pleasure to see the traditions being handed on.

Hungarian dance – Hunique: This group of young enthusiasts gave an exhilarating and lively performance. I enjoyed their workshop, but the recordings used went on so long that I couldn't keep going to the end! On Sunday we had two Greek groups.

Figoura was new to us. A group of young energetic dancers. The workshop was enjoyable but again the recordings were very long.

Philhellenes: George and his gang gave a well paced workshop. I found I could cope with the dances and the group members were very supportive and friendly. They performed Cretan dances in a true traditional style.

Ngati Ranana: The Maories gave a thrilling performance and were as exciting as ever. They bravely gave a workshop on the Haka which was a triumph!

Slovak Dance – Morena: This performance opened with a magical moment. Three musicians in Detva costumes played haunting music on instruments I have never seen before. My friend Frank Dowling tells me they are called fujaras. They are very long wooden tubes held vertically, in three sizes; the vibrations of the air in them rang round the hall to a spellbound silence.

Thrales Rappers: They gave a thrilling performance of rapper swords at a very brisk pace, accompanied by a brilliant "piper" who was playing an adapted recorder. I was so impressed when watching their workshop; they managed to coax novices through the complicated routines without anyone becoming decapitated! Each one was so patient and helpful, brilliant teaching! The learners must have felt exultant when they did their final accompanied performance.

Tower Ravens: This group of ladies also did rapper swords and showed great agility and pace. The "Betty" did her part nipping through the knots without dislodging the raven on her shoulder. Great fun.

Indonesian Dance: the members of my class who attended on Saturday rated this performance as the most amazing and breathtaking. The line of young girls worked in perfect co-ordination and changed position, action and gesture in a seamless display of agility and unity. They were performing in front of their Ambassador and I am sure he was delighted with them.

Anglo –International Barn Dance: This was a fitting end to the weekend, and was attended by dancers from many of the groups. I have not seen Kennedy Hall as full as that for many a year. Cloudburst was on brilliant form and started off the evening by playing a tune [Playford or of that ilk?] that showed the strengths of all the instrumentalists.

Anne and Dave were worthy hosts and gave us a programme of well chosen dances, managing to coax even the most bewildered through the steps.

There were few "sitters-out" and it was a delight to see, as one progressed around, smiling faces, and friendly greetings. It really was Dancing Around the World. Thank you Anne, Caspar and team. Here's to next year, October 27th and 28th. Don't miss it.

Memories of English country dancing in Buckinghamshire

Chloe Middleton-Metcalfe is writing her PhD at Roehampton university about English social folk dance and would like to hear from individuals who have memories of English country dancing and barn dances in Buckinghamshire.

She is particularly keen to hear from people who have reminisces from the 1940s-1970s. Perhaps you danced at school, did you love it or loathe it? Perhaps you went to a barn dance run by your church or youth group, what was this like? Did you ever go to a charity barn dance? Did you teach English country or international folk dance? Did you ever go to your local folk dance club? Were you involved in the Schools dance festival in Aylesbury?

Dear Janet,

Is a schottis (schottishe) the same as a polka?

What an interesting question. My gut feeling said "No". So I looked it up in my dictionaries.

Concise Oxford (16th Edition)

POLKA - a lively dance of Bohemian origin in duplex time (origin C19 via Frs Ger from Czech - půlka - halfstep)

SCHOTTISCHE - a dance resembling a slow polka (origin C19 from Ger - de schottische tanz "The Scottish dance")

The Modern University Dictionary (no date of publication, but the map of India shows Ceylon - not Sri Lanka)

POLKA - a lively dance of Bohemian origin (Fr Polish)

SCOTTISCHE - a form of round dance resembling a polka. Highland Schottishe - lively dance to Strathspey tunes, a Highland Fling (Ger - Scot)

The Macquarie Concise Dictionary 1982 (Australian)

POLKA - a lively round dance of Bohemian origin (Fra - It from Czech pulka - half step)

SCHOTTISHE - a round dance resembling the polka (Ger Scottish dance)

After all that - they are different. In my mind the polka is danced sidestepping, whereas the schottis is forward stepping. The polka is more bouncy and 'peasant like' danced in couples, the schottis slower and open hold danced forwards.

However, they both come from the same Bohemian (Czech) root. Which came first we will never know (or will some bright SIFD member come up with the answer?). Thank you for such a good item for discussion. I hope it is lively. Every good wish to you and all 'older' members.

Dargason

I am puzzled why you refer in the last NEWS to Dargason as "ye olde". Most of Cecil Sharp's revival of English Country Dances were worked out from the Playford's "The English Dancing Master" descriptions published from 1650 onwards. They were all old. The social dances that have been collected from those dancing them and known as Traditional dances don't have a history with them and I am not aware of the period of their origins. The dance was published in Sharp's "The Country Dance Book - Part II" dated 1911 and is called Dargason or Sedany (one S) from Playford 1652>

The tune may sound familiar to some as it occurs in Holst's St. Paul's Suite and is played simultaneously with the better known Greensleeves. Holst was a teacher at St. Paul's Girls School and composed The St.Paul's Suite for the school orchestra.

The dance has little to commend it apart from the novelty and the tune. It remains known to the 'Playford' dancers, but I suspect it is not very often danced.


The dance is 'For as many as will' and requires the length of music to correspond to the number of couples dancing. The dancers form a single straight line with the first couple facing in the middle and successive numbered couples in sequence behind the first couple; the last couple being at the ends of the line. (Men in one half and ladies in the other half)

- 1 4 bars First couple siding (Cecil Sharp siding).
 - 2 bars First couple set to each other.
 - 2 bars First couple pass each other by going-to the right (left shoulders passing) whilst turning single to the right to face the second couple. This 8 bar sequence repeats until the first couple get to the end of the line when everyone turns about and continue until everyone is home with first couple facing.
- 2 Like part 1 except siding is replaced with arming right until everyone turns about and then arms left to return to places.
- 3 Progressive straight hey with hands started by the first couple. Everyone goes to both ends and stop when they get back to their original place.
 - Some of the dances in Sharp's part II book evolved after the first publication and printing; differences in Dargason printed in 1911 were:
 - Part 1 The women passed their partners turning single "counter-clockwise" (turning to the left).
 - Part 2 "Same as the First Part, except that dancers arm as they side." I take this to mean arm left half way round to change places and then arm right back to place.
 - Part 3 With the first couple facing, those behind them face in pairs and all start the hey together (with hands).

- The single Hey all handing as you passe till you come to your places."
