Eastbourne International Folkdance Festival 2018

The weather was kind and festivalgoers enjoyed basking throughout the weekend in the sunshine between workshops and dances. It's rumoured that some even went to the beach and paddled! The venue change for Wider - World dance worked well, giving a more intimate and cosy atmosphere to the dancing, along with on-the-spot refreshments.

Your favourite UK teachers: Maggie O'Regan, Dalila Heath, and Jill Bransby with music from Cloudburst, provided a varied programme to satisfy both experienced dancers and newcomers. Maggie's gentle Bulgarian dances were beautiful and gave everyone a chance to try another aspect of this popular style. Jill certainly broadened our horizons - with steps, rhythms, styles and patterns found in a variety of dances from many places round the world. Dalila taught dances she collected when travelling in Turkey, Holland, Armenia and Italy. The afternoon Final fling in the Main Hall was much enjoyed, and this year the International dances were fully integrated so contra and ECD dancers also enjoyed gems like Jill's "Valenki" from Russia with concentric circles which she said looked like a "Berkely Busby" number from the stage. Dalila's "Ov Yossel Yosel" (Israel) and Turkish "Damat" were good fun and Maggie taught "Vesiolaya Kadril" from Russia. This large room of dancers waving their arms in the Russian dance would have cheered the hearts of SIFD committee! Sadly Ron and Jean Wilks had to leave before we could thank them publicly for the time they have spent as International Organisers, working with the EIFF Directors to better integrate all types of dance of festival. The new "International Organiser" is Mecki Testroet, who just loves to dance and stewarded in the Sports Hall along with Heather.

Maureen Knight thanked the dancers for their kindness and enthusiasm during the six years she and Graham have been EIFF Directors, and asked everyone to only remember the things that had worked well and to offer similar support to the new team! Robin James (responsible for tickets, caravans and liaising with the International programme this year) also stood down from the committee. Dear Janet,

It was good to hear from Ruth Coton in last month's SIFD NEWS and to see that she would still love to dance even though her dancing days, like mine, have long gone. In a recent conversation I had with Frank Dowling he said "but you can still dance in your head", and with the help of the many hours of recorded dance music I have I can try to do that.

As Ruth said, the Hambo was THE dance and although it may look easy, even some of our accomplished dancers found it difficult to do "properly" (i.e. as done in Sweden at the Hambo festivals). The rhythm is subtle and a good partner is essential. Those men who could dance a good Hambo were much in demand.

Hambo

A lot could be said about hambo, but I'll try to be concise. In Sweden, it is counted with waltz, polka, etc as belonging to the gammaldans (i.e. "old dance") repertoire, which paradoxically means only moderately old, dating from the 19th century or the very beginning of the 20th, as distinct from the various forms of polska, which are older. It resembles polska in having a complete turn in one bar of 3/4 music but differs in having a fixed sequence, with a short introductory part followed by a few turns, either repeating for every 8-bar phrase or alternating with something else. Hambo tunes have a simpler rhythm than many polska tunes, but still quite distinct from waltz and mazurka.

There are different versions of hambo (sometimes "hambopolska") from different places in Sweden. In one, taught at the York summer school in 1992 and included in the Society's Fifty Dancing Years package (and now of course in the Digital Archive) the usual turn alternates with a reverse waltz.

Over the years hambo has also been taught in different ways outside Sweden. In the early days of the SIFD, for example, the man would stamp as he went into the turn. Even within Sweden the tempo of the music has varied up and down over the decades. However one particular version, sometimes called "nighambo" (i.e. "curtsy hambo") because of the downward movement ("svikt"), is done most commonly and is the standard for the big competition in Hälsingland, where hundreds of couples compete.

There's a lovely video at https://youtu.be/NhefghRXfWk . If you just want to see how the dance "should" be done (at least for the competition) jump to 4 minutes 56 seconds. If you're interested in costumes, watch from the beginning. The rules require competitors to wear costume, but not necessarily Swedish: when Liz and I watched the 1991 competition, one woman from somewhere in South America (I think it was Valparaiso) was wearing a costume from there. The tune that the musicians (mostly fiddlers, this being Sweden) play as the couples process in this video is strictly a bride march rather than a general-purpose walking tune, from Delsbo in Hälsingland.
