## Acting Chairman's report

For the information of members before the SIFD 2018 AGM

Since the last revision of the Society's Constitution some years ago, the officers (Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer) have been appointed by the Committee after each AGM. When we came to that task last year, there was no problem with re-appointing Dalila as Secretary and Judith as Treasurer, but no one was willing to be Chairman. I had let it be known previously that I was willing to chair meetings but wished to avoid the "figurehead" role; and that has remained my position. Eventually it was agreed that I would be "acting Chairman" and such I have been. Consequently this is my personal view, as a member of the Committee but without donning a Chairman's hat, of what we have or haven't achieved since the 2017 AGM.

In all conscience, we have mostly marked time. We had been below full strength already before two Committee members stood down at the 2017 AGM and no-one came forward to replace them. The others are a good team that I am happy to work with, but we are too few. (The Constitution would allow a Committee of as few as three but it wouldn't be able to do much.)

We have kept on top of routine business (with one exception, noted below) but progress on any of our projects depends on someone having the time and the will to do the work, and sometimes also on luck. We had high hopes of running a new kind of event to bring in new dancers, keeping the cost down but with the attraction of live music. A lot of work was put into this but eventually the project did not come together. We have not abandoned it entirely but it is perforce shelved at present.

With a gradual increase in the number of affiliated groups and a gradual decrease in the number of individual members, it was realised some time ago that a new membership structure might be appropriate, but the sub-committee that was appointed to look at possibilities has not yet offered us ideas.

We have long wished for a thorough refreshing of the SIFD website, but work proceeded in fits and starts, with different individuals getting involved and dropping out again. Most recently Richard Scrimshaw has done a lot of development work and we are hopeful that it will reach fruition before much longer.

Of course many individual members and groups continue to do good things, notably Ron Wilks enhancing the electronic Archive, with the first update being issued in April.

One routine task that was left undone for a while was monitoring the *mail@sifd.org* mailbox, so a large backlog built up. Fortunately nearly all the messages that arrive there are automatic notifications from Twitter and suchlike, which can be ignored, and utter spam. There were very few messages from real people that needed to be dealt with, with apologies for the delay, and we are now dealing with those that continue to trickle in.

In common with thousands of organisations of all sizes we had to decide what to do about the General Data Protection Regulation. In the absence of any helpful official guidance and with the personal experience of a roughly 50/50 split among other organisations either requesting explicit permission to hold data about us or merely informing us of their data protection policies, we chose to err on the side of caution and request explicit permission to hold membership data and other personal data where appropriate such as bank account details for the people to whom we need to pay money.

## July in Bulgaria

This was the title of a two week tour which many of us have just returned from, run by Iliana Bozhanova and Todor Yankov.

The holiday was focused on the Rozhen Folk Festival - which in the end was cancelled! A decision by the local Mayor, and influence from the Shepherds Union, I believe. While this was a disappointment, there was plenty else on this tour, and a visit to Rhodope, an area new to me, was substituted for Rozhen.

My last time in Bulgaria was in a group of 7, so I was apprehensive by there being 46 this time, but no need to worry, the large group worked well, and gave the opportunity of meeting many new dancers. The group comprised 26 British, 8 German and 12 American; this was successful with much "international" integration socially.

While all the other British flew from the UK on the first day, I did a more ambitious option of travelling to Bulgaria by train through six countries over two weeks, but that's another story. Travel on the tour was by coach; I could write a whole article on coach breakdowns, by the end we were on our third vehicle, causing much additional work and stress for Iliana. As necessitated by a large group, we stayed in large hotels; these were all comfortable with good facilities. All meals were included, definitely no shortage of eating - each day buffet breakfast, three course lunch and three course evening meal.

We stayed in 5 locations, generally 3 nights each: Ribaritsa (Teteven) in the North, Arbanasi (Veliko Tarnovo), Plovdiv, Smolyan in the Rhodope Mountains, and Sofia.

The holiday was both dancing and singing. Iliana ran five morning dance classes with music from Todor on his accordion. At least part, if not all, of each day was suitable for whatever level of experience. Classes for singing were held some evenings. There were many competent singers on the holiday, especially some of the Americans.

Plovdiv is where Iliana and Todor are based, and where she runs her dance ensemble, so there was more emphasis on dancing here. We had two dance classes in the cultural centre in Voivodinovo, and in the evening her group provided an extensive meal for us followed by a dance party.



Five dance performances were arranged for us to watch. The first from a local group performing in our hotel in Ribaritsa. Near Arbanasi we saw a group with such impressive singing, dancing and costumes that we were amazed afterwards to be told that they were amateurs. We did then see a professional group in Plovdiv. The last performance, mainly singing, was by a children's group in Bobov Dol, a smallish town near Sofia with, we were told, 150 children in the group.

From Smolyan we spent a day travelling to Madan and on to a remote mountain area. An idyllic location for a house used as the base for the local dance group who performed for us, plus picnic lunch and dancing round the swimming pool with backdrop of the Rhodope Mountains - a "garden party" in the Summer sun, perhaps the most memorable day of the holiday.

As well as the formal sessions, Iliana arranged singers and musicians to play for us during some of our evening meals. And, as is common in Bulgaria, in restaurants we would often just get up and start dancing between courses - together with the locals.

This wasn't just a dancing and singing holiday. Much of the first day was spent in caves near Teteven, some of the most impressive I have ever seen. Veliko Tarnovo was once Bulgaria's capital, this was one of two wet days, we had a guided tour of Tsarevets (fortress) and the Old City. Plovdiv is Bulgaria's second largest city with extensive Roman ruins (currently closed) and will be European Capital of Culture next year, and some of us saw much of the city dramatically illuminated at night. Other sights included a church in Arbanasi, plain on the outside but then with impressive frescoes covering the whole of the interior, as is common in Bulgaria; the Memorial Church at Shipka; Bachkovo Monastery, one of the largest in the country, again with extensive frescoes; the city centre of Sofia, the current capital; and several ethnographic museums. Add to all this, sitting idly in cafés, and around, or in, hotel pools.

Many of you will know Iliana as a dance teacher, for which she has a well established reputation. But after two weeks, which seemed more like two months, this was equalled or even surpassed by her ability as a tour organiser. Travel, hotels, meals, sightseeing, local dance displays and the vagaries of Bulgaria (a country which is modernising but in some respects not quite there yet), this was an operation of huge logistics and achieved with remarkable efficiency. Highly recommended! Also special thanks to Brian for coordinating UK operations, and to Ron and Jean for producing what will no doubt be another excellent DVD.

These trips are usually biennial, although we may have to wait until 2021 for the next one to avoid clashing with Koprivshtitsa in two years - but it will be worth the wait.

Our group will be sadly depleted as she has been teaching us for 25 years, specialising in Israeli, Russian, Armenian and Balkan dances and has been a tremendous support to our small but very social group.

Over the years, Rowena has been very active in dance, attending courses abroad and in London. She will be known to former Organisers and participants in the Eastbourne International Folkdance Festival as she hosted overseas tutors as well as organising the stewards and helping decorate the school gym.

Willingdon IFDG was her 'baby' for some years before handing over to Silvia McIntyre. Rowena also helped found the Lewes Israeli FDG following a series of Israeli dance workshops by Anat held between 1990 and 2003. In addition she ran occasional dance workshops locally to share knowledge of her special interests.

The August Bank Holiday weekends of dance she organised at various locations, including Hassocks, Roedean and latterly, Plumpton, proved popular. Workshops in International, English and Circle dancing were offered by volunteer tutors during the day with general dances in the evening.

Her Twixmas days of dance, held between Christmas and the New Year to help throw off the excesses of the festive season followed a similar pattern and were always well supported.

Rowena will be very much missed, especially by our group. However, her dancing days are not over as Adelaide has both international and English groups. Maybe we'll hear what's 'in' Down Under and perhaps some Pom favourites can be introduced.
