

Handy Tips on Etiquette for Folk Dancers

* Always arrive late for class; as being early smacks of impatience.

* Make sure people are aware of your entry to the class by letting the door slam. (Don't forget to use the door labelled "USE OTHER DOOR".)

* As you go to the class try to visit as many other classes as possible on the way and bid them a polite "Good day".

* During class, the teacher's instructions should be supported by your friendly discussions: also you could take the opportunity to demonstrate to your neighbours how well you know the dance.

* In a circle, if you are opposite the teacher, just mirror their steps.

* In an open circle, wait until the line is formed, then join the right hand end. Once the music has started however, it is considered friendly to insinuate your person into the middle of the line wherever dancers are closest. The welcoming looks you will receive will be ample reward.

* Shoulder hold gives you an opportunity to take the weight off your feet gaining support from your neighbours: it is customary to pull their T-shirts off their shoulders.

* In couple dances it is not good form to look at your partner or react to them in any way. Just imagine you are dancing alone and you will feel much more comfortable.

* In the evenings make sure you join in all the group teacher's sessions especially those whose classes you have not attended.

* It is considered 'pushy' actually to learn the steps. Just wait for the video recording session and stand between two good dancers who will be happy to call out the steps for you.

Narendra Kotiyan (1931 – 2019)

It is with deep sadness that I announce the death of Narendra Kotiyan, Naren to all his friends. He had been suffering from dementia for some time.

Naren had already been fascinated by Scottish dancing before he left India to study in London in 1957 and it was not long before he was kilted and enjoying the dance scene in England. Not just Scottish. He soon discovered the world of international folk dancing and threw himself into it with possibly more passion than anyone before or since. Whether it was a Russian, French or Balkan dance group, Naren's presence added sparkle to any performance. It was said that, on a notable occasion at the Albert Hall, he had to perfect his quick change routine to perform with several groups in the same show.

His talents extended beyond dance. Many of us associate Naren with his tapan (large drum) accompaniment of the Bulgarian dance Kamišice. Over the years, Naren taught himself to play an assortment of instruments including gajda, kaval, tamburitsa, frula and double bass. However, it was principally for his drumming that Henry Morris and John Baldwin invited him to join their newly formed music group Dunav in 1963. So began Naren's unique contribution to the Balkan scene in England. Henry had already inspired students like me to take up Balkan dance at the Hendon Folk Club (later to become the Barnet International Dance Club after Henry left to devote more time to Dunav) and Naren then became a friend and mentor – encouraging us to take it to another

level by joining groups like Danny Lumley's Bulgarian group and Živko Firfov. In fact, this was another of Naren's talents: to bond with people and encourage them to participate. Many a new recruit to Dunav has come through Naren's gentle persuasion. It was Naren's ability to network that made the Balkan Festivals such a success.



These were shows put on at venues like St. Pancras Town Hall organised by Dunav but featuring the London groups plus Balkansko Oro from Oxford – a group he had a special attachment to. My memory is of a professionally staged and entertaining evening of music, song and dance. Naren always spoke with pride about these festivals. Later on, Naren ran a Balkan dance class near Kennington Oval – initially with John Fisher (ex Živko Firfov coleader) – with special guests like his friends Ian Price and Hamdi Ataoglu, a talented Turkish dancer and musician, who lodged at Lucile Armstrong's house. Lucile herself encouraged Naren to take over her role as President of the board of judges at the Llangollen International Festival. This brought Naren in contact with many dance groups and, on Dunav overseas tours, we were often aware of the special respect he garnered. Later still, his encouragement and help was appreciated in the early days of Balkanplus.

When Naren's dementia worsened, he was fortunate to be living as a tenant in Caroline Thomas' next door house. He could still enjoy the Dunav rehearsals but, more importantly, Caroline selflessly attended to his every need and organised his eventual transfer to an excellent care home.

We will prefer to remember the Naren of old. Some readers who have known him longer than me will doubtless reminisce about special moments in his long career. I haven't mentioned his relatively recent and happy involvement with the London Bulgarian Choir. Nor have I touched upon his mildly anarchic humour. He told me that in an early visit to Bulgaria, there was a Russian delegation at the hotel he was staying in. One night, he noticed several pairs of shoes put outside the rooms for polishing. I hope no employee was shot for putting them back outside the wrong doors. \rightarrow Talking to Yves Moreau recently - on his final teaching tour of the UK – we agreed that we had lived through a golden age of Balkan folk dance to which Naren had made a major contribution. The news of his death came on the day of the Balkansko Oro party in Oxford. It was a poignant moment when we danced to his memory. We intend to organise an event in celebration of Naren's life later this year.

Following the EGM

* Officers

* Charitable Incorporated Organisation

Brenda Steventon has commenced work on the project to obtain this status for the SIFD.

* Teachers List and discussions at the EGM

The Committee noted the opinions and ideas from the EGM, which will be appropriately implemented.

Membership

Two new Affiliation applications have been received and approved, for London Balfolk and Peak Dance. The Committee noted that it looks forward to the next progress report from the subgroup considering Membership Structure.

Publicity

The Committee understands that the redesign of the website is almost complete. A new batch of publicity cards has been produced, as have the annual leaflets. It is hoped that work on the production of a new SIFD banner will be completed shortly.

SIFD material

It was noted that it is several years since P10 was produced. An enquiry will be made in the SIFD News as to what recordings, if any, the membership would like the Society to produce in the future.

Sunday Dances

It was reported that for 2018 the Dances ran at a small deficit (excluding Band expenses which are covered from other SIFD funds). Bookings at PHCC have been made for 2019.

Daycourses

It was noted with disappointment that there had been no response to the items in the News by Brenda Steventon (suggesting and inviting group participation/ leadership of Daycourses, leading to sharing of varied material), and by Judith Payling (asking what sort of courses /repertoire/ etc dancers would like the SIFD to organise).

Eastbourne International Folk Festival

The Committee has had contact with the 2019 organiser of the "international" side. A donation is being made in support of efforts to encourage people to "try international".



I'm hoping to find a good home for a book of mine entitled 'An Introduction to Meter and Rhythm in Balkan Folk Music' by Walter W. Kolar printed in 1974 by Duquesne University Tamburitzans Institute of Folk Arts, Pittsburgh.

The first 30 pages are devoted to explaining Balkan meter and rhythm, the rest (another 60 pages) contains musical examples of songs and dances from Romania, Bulgaria, Macedonia, Greece, and Serbia. Several of the titles of the musical examples are in Cyrillic but there are indexes for each of three sections with the titles in Latin/Roman script. The words to the songs are in Cyrillic.

It was with some sadness that I learned of the death of Nigel Glendinning a few days ago. He was in his mid nineties.

'Glen' and his wife Mary ran an International Folk dance group at the Croydon YMCA in the 1980's. I attended there regularly each week on a Monday evening, as well as attending Steve and Joy Steventon's Merton Folk Dance group on a Wednesday evening. Thus was my introduction to regular and intensive International Folk Dancing. Mary was the extrovert dance teacher, regularly telling us that the next dance was 'our favourite', especially when we tried to sneak out at home time. Glen stayed in the background operating the reel to reel tape machine to provide the music. He also made the tea during the break.

I left the group in the mid 1980's to pursue other dancing interests, but saw Mary and Glen regularly at the Eastbourne festival. Mary herself died a few years ago. I knew their son Adrian from when we both worked at Smiths Industries in New Addington.

I don't know if Mary and Glen were ever members of the SIFD, but some of their group may have joined the SIFD in later years as members of other groups.

The group has since become the Croydon International Folk Dance group which meets every second and fourth Monday each month at the Shirley Methodist Church Hall. I last saw Glen there at the Christmas party. He appeared in reasonable health, but did not remember me.

Bonny Breast Knot

Bonny Breast Knot is a three couple set dance, my notes for it are below. For the April issue I will offer **Ahavat Hadassa** from Israel in the forlorn hope that some one knows or remembers it. **Ed**.



Bonny Breast Knot

- 1 1s lead down and out between 2nd & 3rd ladies, separate (man down/lady up), meet again in the middle facing 2nd & 3rd men. Go between the men, separate (man down/lady up) to the top and bottom of set.
- 2 In 2 lines facing up & down the set, step kick L, R, L, R.1s big step to the L. to finish proper, continue R, L, R
- 3 1s half a right-hand turn, left-hand turn first corner.1s three quarter right-hand turn, and left-hand turn second corner.
- 4 1s meet and lead down and back to third place; all swing your partner.
