Eastbourne International Folkdance Festival

In my opinion, the last Eastbourne Festival went off very well. Judith De Witt bravely volunteered to become Festival Director in May 2018, but I took over in January with a committee dedicated to get the festival up and running for 2019. At the event, dancers looked very happy and contented and lots came up to the committee and thanked them during the weekend.

I participated in the International workshops and dances as much as I was able. Unfortunately, as Director, other commitments did get in the way and, by Sunday afternoon, I was so tired that my mind could not cope with the enjoyable but intricate Balkan, Armenian and Israeli movements Karin Bellaart was teaching. I confess I took the easy(?) option and did American contra for a while!

As you may have heard, this was the last Eastbourne International Folkdance Festival. The good news is that the whole event will continue next year - and hopefully for many years to come - in Evesham under the title May Heydays - at Evesham, The Folkdance Festival in the Vale.

Why move at all? There were many reasons but one motivation was the fact that 75% of dancers attending Eastbourne came from north and west of London. Moving to Worcestershire should therefore reduce mileage and travelling times for the majority of attendees and thus cut down our carbon footprint significantly. Whilst a few dancers may complain about the move, in my opinion, this reason alone is reason enough. The concept will be identical to what we used to do at Eastbourne. This includes a full International dance programme from the Balkans and beyond. As Karin Bellaart's classes were very popular this year, I have booked her again for next year. There will also be French workshops, and I'm looking for one additional teacher, maybe to concentrate on Israeli dances.

May Heydays at Evesham does now have a director whose first love is International, so, rest assured, the last thing I want is to lose that side of the festival. However, the International will only continue as long as there are enough dancers to make it financially viable. It would be unfair to the rest of the festival goers to have to subsidize one particular style. So it is up to you, the dancers, to keep it going.

I am fully aware that a lot of International dancers would prefer "proper" native teachers from the country a dance originates in. Unfortunately, at the current level of participation, the festival can simply not afford these teachers, so it is the archetypal Catch 22. If we can grow the support, it will increase our options. Here are the details about the migrated festival: May Heydays will be held in The De Montfort School in Evesham (Four Pools Rd, WR11 1DQ). The school has 6 halls and full camping facilities on site. The festival will be within walking distance of the town centre (1 mile approx.). There will be catering on site. Evesham and the surrounding area offer plenty of hotel, B&B and self-catering accommodation, for more details check the website www.mayheydays.org.uk. The nearest hotel is the Evesham Hotel, about half a mile from the school. It is quickly getting booked up. The cheapest nearby option is the Premier Inn, about 1 mile away. There is a train station in Evesham (and a new one being built a few miles away, Worcester Parkway) with a direct line from London Paddington. Kitka Bulgarian Folklore Group



This is a very popular festival with 57 Morris sides from all over the country, ceilidh bands, folk rock, and traditional and harmony groups taking part. For three days over the spring bank holiday the streets of Rochester (and the pubs) are filled with colour, music, singing and dancing, not forgetting the thousands of people who turn up to enjoy the atmosphere and spectacle.

Kitka Bulgarian Folklore Group is a regular feature now, being local, and this year we were joined by some of our junior members, Little Kitka, for the first time. Our red costumes are from Thrace, but this year we were able to use some of the costumes we have inherited from the Vasil Levsky London Bulgarian Group. If you look at the photo (front cover) you will see Andrew on the extreme right wearing a blue outfit and Krisi on the extreme left wearing a Pleven skirt and chemise. By the way we are still looking for the adult sets of Pleven and blue Sofia costumes, so if you know where they are we would love to hear from you.

The weather was much cooler than last year when the temperature reached 25C, and the little rain we had did not stop us dancing (check out the looming black cloud in the photo). We performed a choreographed Arap and Malachevsko as a suite, Gankino horo, from Northern Bulgaria, and Trité Putti from Thrace. We finished with Prava Horo, which everyone can join in.
