Dance Alphabet

Hajnaltuz Tanc (Hungary)

"Dawnfire Dance". One of the many ceremonial dances proper to a traditional Hungarian wedding, known as the "singing of the bride" *. On the second day of the wedding, the bride and her companions would dance around the fire in the courtyard, the bride herself jumping through or over the fire, for ritual purification. Similar jumps were made by maidens through the Midsummer Fire at the June Solstice. * singeing? Ed.

Hassapikos Butchers' Dance (Crete).

A chain dance for men only, or for men and women alternately. Each dancer with hands on the shoulders of his neighbours, the line or curve facing inwards, moves slowly round counterclockwise, in 2/4 time. With small steps and regular footbeats, the chain moves in perfect rhythm, frequent knee-bends (from a slight flexing to a deep squatting position) causing it to dip and rise as it progresses. The leader sometimes crouches and revolves in solo exhibition. Originally from Constantinople, the Hassapikos was danced by butchers on their Feast-day, and is found also in Armenia. It was known in Byzantine times as the Makellaricos.

Henxmen (England)

Henxmen at the Court of Edward IV, were pages, sons of noble families entering system of knighthood. The regular number was twenty-four, under charge of a Master of Henxmen who sat with them at the royal table, to observe their manners. They had to study languages (English, Latin, French) and the use of weapons. On this basis they had lessons in music (piping and drum) dance and singing to instruments. They were required to read books on courtesy and manners, rules of procedure and address. They danced as required with the Maids of Honour, and foreign visitors. Besides these "henchmen" the Master ruled the Choir of the Kings Chapel; they also learned deportment.



Gosport & Fareham Interfolk

David Bloodworth of the Gosport group passed away recently. David and his wife Tessa organised the weekly classes. This is a huge loss to the Gosport dancers and also means that the club which did not restart last year will now close.

Gosport & Fareham Interfolk originated about fifty years ago as an international folk dance class led by the late Maggie Head. When she retired David and Tessa took on the task of running the group and kept it going for the best part of twenty years.

The photo from 2012 was taken on the occasion Iliana taught at Gosport; David and Tessa are pictured on the right.

David was one of Nature's gentlemen, very much liked and appreciated by all at the Gosport group. He was a good dancer and it was a privilege to know him. My heartfelt condolences to Tessa and gratitude for all she and David have done to promote international folk dance around Gosport.

News from the Rainmakers Dance Group

I have enjoyed reading what other groups have been doing to continue dancing, so thought I would write an account of what we have been up to during these difficult times.

We started Zooming from early May 2020 and continued until late July 2021. During those 14 months we learned a lot about technology with all its frustrations. We started with an aim to keep our own members connected and to share and refresh our dance memories. I led most of the dances but was very grateful to share some of the teaching with Alan Trangmar. We also had Martin Butler on Zoom to play some of the music. With all the different timing of music and feet we just about managed to dance for about 1 ½ hours each session. As we hadn't advertised this in the News we were surprised when folks from other areas asked to join in. Peter and I were pleased to reciprocate by joining some of their sessions. We could exchange ideas about technology and the shared dances with other SIFD members. A worthwhile sense of camaraderie was achieved.

On July 18, 2020 we trialled a dance session on our local village green. The format is simple and informal, we have a mobile phone and small speaker in the middle of a circle of socially distanced dancers. We start at 11.00 am and dance for about 1 ³/₄ hours and have continued to do this every Sunday morning for 18 months, when Covid regulations have allowed us to meet.

We are now 'official' because we pay the Parish Council £25 to dance on Gosmore Green for a year! We have been incredibly lucky with the weather and haven't had to cancel a single session because of bad weather, only once this year starting about an hour late. As you will see from the photos we have danced in fog, rain, cold and sunshine!

We now also dance indoors at a new venue in Letchworth because The Parish Hall that we have hired for many years became unavailable. Mark Balaam (our Secretary) found us a convenient alternative venue, Wilbury Hall, on the Bedford Road, also in Letchworth. We started dancing there in early September and have continued to meet every Friday night (8-10pm). We wear masks and have plenty of fresh air with the doors and windows open, so now wear thermal layers, hats, coats, scarves and gloves! Balkan Festival Programme 1965

Jill Bransby's unearthing of the programme for the 1965 Balkan Festival at St. Pancras Town Hall must have stirred memories for those of a certain age. Henry Morris was still running the Hendon Folk Club while devoting much of his time bringing together musician friends like John Baldwin and Narendra Kotiyan to form the nucleus of Dunav Balkan Group.

At that time, the general public knew little about



Balkan folklore although the SIFD was well established and performing dance groups did exist. Philip Thornton and Ken Ward had formed the Zivko Firfov group; the Society for Friendship with Bulgaria had the dance group led by Danny Lumley with a repertoire acquired during visits to Bulgaria in the 1950s and the Oxford Balkansko Oro group led by Dimitri Feary had connections with the Yugoslav community in nearby Bicester. For those of us who had only recently been introduced to Balkan dance, the festival was an eye opener which inspired us to join these groups. A particular surprise for me was to see my work colleague Geoff Sole playing clarinet with Dunav. We both attended the Hendon club but, although Geoff and I shared a lift to work, he had kept quiet about joining the band.

The programme notes by A L Lloyd tell us how relatively small

the Balkan scene was in those days. As a renowned folklorist, broadcaster, author and singer, Bert Lloyd was always ready to share his knowledge. During the relatively short period that a Dunav Club existed, he came to a small gathering in a private house to give an illustrated talk about the music of Maramures (Romania) based on a broadcast of his on Radio 3. I mention in passing that Dave Arthur wrote an interesting biography in 2012, "Bert – the Life and Times of A L Lloyd", which disclosed how his politics allowed him to gain full access to the folk recordings which were later released on the Topic label. These recordings were advertised at the back of the programme.

The Balkan Festival programme is altogether a fine memento of a special period in the development of the Balkan folklore scene in Britain. I can't finish without mentioning the advert towards the back of the programme which encourages the concert goers to join the SIFD. "For further information please contact the Secretary: Miss L. SOUTHGATE". Of course, Lily served as the editor of the News for most of its existence and I daresay she will have her personal memories of the festival and the Balkan dance scene in the 1960s.
