### Here are further extracts from

# 'The Dictionary of the Dance' by W.G.Raffe

### Kachinas (N. America)

Ancestral spirits of Pueblo Indians (especially Hopi and Zuni), thought to dwell in the "good" or western direction, and to visit the earth for six months of the year, when they are impersonated by male masked dancers. Primarily concerned with bringing rain and increasing crops they are beneficent spirits, anxious for the well-being of man. Different varieties of Kachinas include Long Horn Kachinas; Manas, or Maiden Kachinas; Shalako etc., and in some pueblos they are divided into summer and winter groups. All men and boys belong to Kachina Societies, the initiated, sl'cti, being "those who know" that the Kachinas are men disguised. Even so, dancers as well as spectators believe in the identification of the ancestral spirit with the mask while it is worn, although dancers do not go into trance. For four preliminary days initiates are secretly prepared, masks painted and dances practised. On the fifth day the medicine man leads them into the plaza. They divide into two groups - dancers in line behind each other, all wearing identical masks; and attendant dancers at the sides in varied masks. Maiden Kachinos take their places behind the men. Following the movements of their leader, the Kachinas shake their rattles and dance in a sunwise circuit of the plaza, facing in turn each direction. Singing as they dance, they monotonously repeat the basic steps "of stamp and raised knee. At a signal from the leader they turn and dance towards the next wall of the Square, for the dance must be repeated towards all four directions. This fourfold dance ritual is performed four times in the morning and four times in the afternoon. Accompanying the Kachinas are dancing clowns, Koshare, Kurena, and Koyemshi, who provide burlesque interludes in the other-wise serious ceremonies. Kachina masks are carefully stored away between rituals, and consecrated before use. Elaborate ceremonies mark the arrival and departure of the Kachinas at Winter and Summer solstices. Small dolls, also called Kachinas, are made in their likeness, and given to children. Visitors are not permitted to see the masked dances, but unmasked dances having the same form may be witnessed at various times of the year.

### Koyemshi (N. America)

Dancing clowns of the Pueblo Indians of the South-West, who perform between the serious Kachina dances. Generally known as "mudheads", they are masked with cloth stained pink with sacred clay, and each has a special name. Molanhako, Father-Koyemshi, is their leader. They are feared because it is believed they have power over people, given to them by virtue of a small quantity of earth (soil from the village on which people have walked) which they carry in a pouch. Particularly associated with the Zuni, these clowns accompany the Shalako, and dance at night with the Kachinas at the summer solstice. Their performance consists of leaping about and over each other, juggling and general buffoonery, and they have phallic associations.

### Krakoviak (Poland)

Couple dance, mentioned in records in 1510, belonging originally to the region of Krakov, where it was danced by everyone. Later it was adopted by the nobility, in a refined form; and is now danced all over Poland. To gay music in 2/4 time, the couples dance in circular formation, the man with his right arm round his partner's waist, the girl with her left hand on his right shoulder. The couples move into a large circle, then into lines behind one another, moving again into a linked circle. Satirical or flattering songs accompany the dance, the man of the first couple starting the song; or a ballad or madrigal may be sung, the dance varying according to the song. The Krakoviak may also be danced by one couple, when it has more dramatic action. The clink of metal heels, and jingle of brass and silver rings on the men's belts, mark the rhythm of the dance. Costumes are colourful. For the women a patterned skirt with yellow waistcoat over white blouse; high red boots and a head-dress of flowers with long ribbons. The men wear striped trousers tucked into high boots, long tasselled coat, and red cap with peacock feathers at one side. The krakoviok (called in France, Cracovienne) became famous on the stage in 1839, when Fanny Elssler scored a great success in the ballet La Gypsy at Her Majesty's Theatre, London with this dance.
