'The Dictionary of the Dance' by W.G.Raffe

Lift

In Dance Lift is featured as a feat in ballet (usually too often) an action that requires as much technique as mere strength. Male students are set to practise, in some schools, with sand-bags, or canvas gunny-bags. These should weigh less than the ninety pounds of a dancer, being a dead-weight; harder to shift and lift. The "dance lift" demands close co-operation. The moment of "breath intake" is important, since the slack or "dead weight" body remains heavier. In addition, the girl has to make a slight spring (which should not be so vigorous as to be noticeable), which takes her a few inches upwards. The dance lift is not similar to those used in wrestling or judo, where the basis is contest rather than agreement. The male part of the effort is closely connected with the rhythm of breathing (and consequent state of energy), so that the upward movement must be correctly timed, in relation to the full lungs it is also advisable for the male partner to know where he is taking the girl and why.

(I had to include the above piece because years ago at an Eastbourne workshop I was dancing La Volta..... I have this awful memory of my poor partner desperately trying to heave me up just at the moment I was pushing down ready for takeoff! and um... I'm more than ninety pounds.)

Lekouri (Georgia, USSR)

A dance for men and women, usually performed after the Lezghinka^{*}, in which the man has shown his prowess. During the Lekouri, partners never come face to face, as the dance pattern is continually changed with swift turns by the girl, followed at once by an equally quick turn by her partner. The girl dances, with downcast eyes. The quality of the dance is smooth and lyrical, in contrast to the vigour of the solo Lezghinka which precedes it. Lekoouri is said to represent the cautious following of a treacherous zig-zag mountain path.

Lezghinka (Caucasia and Georgia, USSR)

A male solo dance originating among the Lezghis of Daghestan in the Caucausus, and adopted by the Georgians. A wild, vigorous dance, it is said to imitate the attack of an eagle on its victim. Circling on tip-toe, with small, swift steps, round a dagger on the ground, the dancer suddenly kneels, seizes the dagger in his teeth and rises again.

He wears the Cossak dress of long, belted coat, with soft heel-less boots and fur hat. Because of their mountain homes and the necessity of balancing on narrow paths and ledges, the Cossak can rise easily on to his toes, and the dance shows rapid footwork with little movement of the body. It is sometimes given, without the dagger, as a courting dance. With swaggering gait, the man dances with swift, neat steps, this tip-toe progression contrasting dramatically with the vigorous, wilder steps. The Lezghinko is often followed by the Lekouri* (a more lyrical pair dance), in which case the first dance takes the form of "showing-off" by the man, before he and the girl dance together.
