## more excerpts from 'The Dictionary of the Dance'

by W.G.Raffe

#### Rachenitza (Bulgaria)

Popular dance, usually in 7/16 beat, following a strict rhythm, generally with a piper and one or two drummers. This general dance rhythm (with varying melodies, according to rite and season), may be heard in popular rejoicings - a wedding or a feast - and also at a funeral. In the open, extension of the dance line reveals one or other of the basic hora patterns the circle, spiral, and wavy line; in this manner the group dance precedes the Vulgari ritual of the Netsinari sect. The Ratchenitza, found all over Bulgaria, usually begins as a pair dance, but often becomes general. There is much improvisation on basic steps, with displays of technique by the men, the dance sometimes becoming a contest between two or three dancers. Rhythm is marked by hand movements; in the Dobrudje region arms move in heavy emphasis, thumb and first finger of each hand held together at the tips. At weddings, the Ratchenitza is danced by bridesmaids and groomsmen after leaving the church, and again at various stages during the celebrations.

### Rigaudon (France)

An old dance to lively music in 2/4 time, belonging particularly to Provence. A gay dance of the people, it found favour in chateau and palace ballrooms in the seventeenth century, being popular at the courts of Louis XIII, XIV and XV, and lasting until the Revolution in 1789.

As a Court dance it lost some vitality, but took on added dignity. In England, known as the Rigadoon, it arrived in the last quarter of the 17th century, and became fairly popular. Some authorities state that the dance was called after Rigaud, who "invented" it; others that the name derived from rig, an English word meaning lively, wanton; but neither of these theories seems acceptable.

In Provence, performance of the dance was forbidden in 1664 by the Provencal Parliament, but in the adjacent Dauphine region, the Rigaudon still exists as a folk dance, most country fetes ending with it. The dance contains the jumping step, or pas de rigaudon, peculiar to it in its earlier existence. For any number of couples, partners facing each other, it has only one figure, and is danced lightly and gracefully. The pas de rigaudon (a step with small jumps on the toes) is performed sur place by the man, the woman advancing towards him, holding her skirt on either side, with polka steps. The man salutes his partner; she makes a reverence. While the man repeats pas de rigaudon, the woman retreats with polka steps, then both turn anti-clockwise, each dancing their own step. The sequence is repeated, but instead of saluting his partner, the man takes her right hand and turns her anti-clockwise.

In the 18th century the Rigaudon was given prominence by the famous dancer Camargo (1710-1770) who frequently performed it on the stage.
