Small, exuberant and often loud - if she didn't like a dance, she'd let you know, although that was a rare occurrence as she loved almost all dances. She attended almost all Balkanplus events up until March, when she was having a lot of chemotherapy, and was too weak to do much dancing. She leaves a gap that won't be easily filled, and we will miss her a great deal. We'll miss her exuberance, energy and sheer enthusiasm, and she'll stay in our memories as long as there's a Balkanplus.

I discovered Balkanplus in '91 - and she and her late husband Malcolm were already stalwarts - and would remain so. We also were in Cathy Meunier's weekly group - and when that folded, Malcolm led a smaller group, which I was in as of course was Barbara. (Malcolm unfortunately died some time later)

But my main memories are of her immediately livening up any Balkanplus she attended - not to mention bringing her later new partner Brian into the fold; and even when she started to get sick, how many times would she say something like "I really shouldn't do these dances, but I can't keep away" (although she and Brian also greatly enjoyed the more stately pleasures of Playford Dance).

And finally, I would be rich if I had 5p for every time over the decades she would protest that she didn't know a dance - but once the music started, she would dance - perfectly.


This year Phil and I will be taking over the administration and our thanks go to previous organiser Ian Green - if you would like to go on our email list please let us know.

Woodvale IFDG Costumes

Woodvale IFDG in Borough Green, Kent are having to get rid of some more costumes due to a decline in numbers and storage facilities no longer being available for all our costumes.

Before we discard them, is anyone from the SIFD interested in taking any of these Balkan or French costumes? They are free to anyone who is interested. They would need to be collected, or occasionally we go to SIFD events in London.



Balkan costumes

These were made by ladies from Woodvale, rather than being authentic costumes, as per the photograph.

We have 5 men's costumes, approximately size 38/40" chest plus a boy's aged about 10. The men's all have red waistcoats.

(Balkan costume coloured photo was on the back cover of the October 2023 issue. Ed.)

We have 9 ladies costumes, approximately size 12 to 16. There are 6 with red waistcoats and 3 with black.

We also have a selection of Balkan shoes available, approximately sizes 5 to 7, as per the photograph.



French Costumes (front cover)

Mostly made by the ladies from Woodvale IFDG. We have men's tops and ladies dresses, made up of one man's costume and two lady's costumes per region as follows. The lady's costumes are mostly sizes 10 to 14.

Auvergne region: man's grey smock, lady's grey dresses with red apron.

Bordeaux region: one set of 3 costumes in red stripes, (plus a boy's waistcoat), and one man's and one lady's in purple stripes.

Burgundy region: man's blue smock, lady's blue dresses.

Chalon's region: peasant style costumes, man's blue smock, lady's costumes in blue/grey.

Chalon's region: posh style costumes which came from France in the 1970s. The lady's costumes are only about size 8, made from a nylon material. The man's has a waistcoat, breeches and a long grey overcoat.

Černá Vlna

Černá vlna is a folk song and dance from Moravian Valachia, an easternmost area of the Czech Republic near the border with Slovakia. In full the first line of the song runs as follows: Černá vlna na bílém beránku (Black fleece on a white lamb) and, like in several other folk songs, has no real connection with the rest of the text, apart from being onomatopoetic and scanning and rhyming nicely with it. I have heard several slightly different versions in the past, but the one to which I danced and which stuck in my memory goes as follows:

Černá vlna na bílém beránku. Kam ses mi zatúlal, černooký Janku? Já sa túlám od dědiny k městu, idu sobě hledat bohatú nevěstu. Řikajú, že mi ji nedajú, ale dajú, dajú, a ještě přidajú.

(in my translation)
Black fleece on a white lamb,
Where have you disappeared, black-eyed Johnny?
I've been wandering from the village to the town
In search of a rich bride.
They say they won't give her to me,

In another version, Janek is blue-eyed and travels to meet a miller with a pretty daughter.

But they will, they will, and they'll add something, too.

I learnt the dance many years ago at a Dvorana course in Prague under the guidance of Radek Rejšek, but – I believe – he sourced it from the rich treasure-trove of František Bonuš. On my return from Prague, I remember, I introduced the dance to our little group in Fleet, and it remained in our repertoire for several years afterwards. And, unless I am mistaken, a few years ago when we still enjoyed the annual Dance around the World festival, the Beskydy dancers included Černá vlna in their display.

It was paired with Trnka, which is a different dance from the same geographical area.

By the way, černá vlna is pronounced chair-nah vel-nah, with the stress on chair and vel. And if you'd like to have a go at the dance, I have kept the crib: (Note: "cifra" is meant to be a male show off.)

Trnka

All in big circle, holding hands

1 – 8 8 trnka (hopping) steps to R and pivot on the last step

9 - 16 8 trnka steps to L

17 – 20 (facing centre) R foot slightly forward, wriggle out and in (3 times) + pas de basque

21 - 24 repeat bars 17 - 20 with the L foot

25 – 32 repeat bars 17 – 24, finish facing partner

33 – 40 Trnka – Partners turning with trnka (hopping) step in trnka hold (ie. both dancers holding hands with R arm round partner's waist, L arm behind one's own waist) – progressing forward on the circle while turning – on the last bar partners separate

40 – 48 lady, continues turning with trnka step on her own, progressing forward Man, follow his partner dancing forward with trnka step, handclaps optional

Černá Vlna

Introduction (7 bars)

All holding hands in a big circle in couples (man has his partner on the right)

1 – 4 4 side-steps to the R – swaying arms

5 – 8 4 side-steps to the L – swaying arms

9 – 12 face partner for "cifra" (R foot in the air, turn out and in + pas de basque, Repeat with L foot.)

13 – 15 handclap (optional) and r-hand elbow turn

16 - 22 repeat bars 9 - 15 (cifra + turn)

23 - 44 Repeat bars 1 - 22

Facing partner

45 – 48 holding R hands, 4 side-steps into the circle (ie. men to L, ladies to R – sway arms

49 - 52 repeat bars 45 - 48 outward

53 – 56 man, pas de basque (to R only) + 3 hops in a smal circle to L, starting on L foot, R knee lifted and handclap under Lady, pas de basque (to R and L) + 4 steps in a small circle to R

57 – 59 handclap and R hand elbow turn with partner

60 - 66 repeat bars 53 - 59

67 - 88 Repeat bars 45 - 66
